

Much-Decorated Churchman Due For 'Great Days Of Bible' Event

Due to appear in Roseburg Saturday and Sunday in connection with "Two Great Days With the Bible" is Dr. Mark Talney of Portland, regional secretary of the American Bible Society, who participated in much of the original planning for the two-day Bible event. Throughout the many months of preparation, Dr. Talney has worked closely with the local committee.

The Roseburg Ministerial Association is cooperating with the American Bible Institute in sponsoring Saturday and Sunday the most ambitious of such undertakings ever to be staged in the immediate Roseburg area.

Dr. Talney, formerly secretary of the Student Christian Movement in Canada, received his formal education in Canada. He received his BA degree from the University of Manitoba which he attended on a governor-general's scholarship and where he was also president of the student body. He received his MA from the University of British Columbia.

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After coming to the United States 25 years ago, a return after living in Canada since his early youth, Dr. Talney served Presbyterian churches in Washington and Oregon, including Central Presbyterian Church in Portland. He was for a period of years executive secretary of the Oregon Council of Churches and for the past three years has held his present post.

In addition to many offices held in the Presbyterian denomination, Dr. Talney has been a member of the Governor's Committee on Indian Affairs; member of the interim committee on sex crimes; governor's committee for the handicapped; Civil Rights Commission;

School Bus Driver Wins Damages In Court Suit

The driver of a school bus which collided with the rear end of a car that had stopped to make a right turn off the street was awarded damages by a jury in a trial before Circuit Judge Charles S. Woodrich Wednesday.

Nancy Hamlin, the bus driver and plaintiff in the case, was awarded \$2,500 general damages and \$500.30 special damages from Levi White. The plaintiff originally asked \$15,000 general and \$500.30 special damages for medical care and loss of work.

The accident occurred Jan. 9, 1961, at 3:45 p.m. on W. Harvard Blvd., just east of Shendoan St. Both were traveling west. The complaint alleged that defendant White "suddenly, abruptly and without proper warning" stopped his vehicle, and that the school bus operated by the plaintiff collided with the rear of White's vehicle.

She claimed she suffered lower back, neck, upper back and shoulder injuries, which she claimed were of a permanent nature.
