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Action On Both Tax, CR Bills Doesn't Seem Likely This Year

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Fall's official advent brought home to Congress today a chill realization it probably can't complete action this year on both the tax and civil rights bill labeled 1963 "musts" by President Kennedy.

Final action on taxes this year has been a prime target of the Kennedy administration since January. Three months ago, the President added civil rights to the priority list for this year.

It might have seemed possible back in June to get both bills through the House and Senate in 1963. It doesn't look that way now.

Congressional leaders have

been reluctant to talk about this. One reason is that the choice is a hard one and is certain, either way, to make a lot of people unhappy.

Some civil rights backers currently suspect that when and if the choice is made, taxes will get the nod. That could set off loud and long objections from the cards appear to be falling in favor of the tax legislation, civil rights supporters.

and not entirely as a result of efforts by civil rights opponents. For example, the House will act on the tax bill this week. The civil rights bill hasn't even been approved by the House judiciary subcommittee that has been working on it for months. The efforts of northern Democratic civil rights advocates to carry along Republicans, rather than delaying tactics by southerners, have taken the time.

When the subcommittee, dominated by pro-civil rights members, clears a bill, it must be considered by the parent judiciary committee. Southerners have a strong voice there and are not expected to pass it out quickly. Once that hurdle is cleared, the southern-led House Rules Committee must be by-passed or prodded to act before the House can even take up the bill.

One supporter of the civil rights bill says privately that he would be pleased to see final House action before Dec. 1. That, of course, would make it clearly impossible to get a bill through the Senate by New Year's Day. Southern filibusters could hold up a bill that long without extending themselves.

In the meantime, the tax bill will be in the unfriendly hands of chairman Harry F. Byrd, D-Va., of the Senate Finance Committee. Byrd has made it clear he will insist on lengthy hearings, and he probably would suspend all activity on the tax bill if civil rights action was impending.

Thus, if congressional leaders insisted on Senate approval of civil rights legislation before the tax cut, they might end up with neither. If they make it clear the tax cut has a clear track, they might be able to get that bill through before the end of the year.

Great Books Group Opens Fourth Year

The Roseburg Great Books group will open its fourth year of reading and discussion with an organizational meeting at the Douglas County Library Wednesday at 7 p.m.

Jim Richardson, co-chairman for the past several years, announced the group would be discussing selections from the writings of great authors following the outline prepared by the Great Books Foundation.

The discussion groups will meet every two weeks and discuss new works at each meeting. The Sept. 25 meeting will be on the Declaration of Independence. Copies will be supplied at the meeting.

Many thousands of adults throughout the country have found that learning to think for themselves by reading and discussing great books can be fun, as well as stimulating, said Richardson.

Since 1947, when the Great Books Foundation was incorporated in Chicago as a non-profit organization, groups of 15 to 25 persons in communities from coast to coast have been meeting to discuss books written by Plato, Shakespeare, Thoreau, books as old as the Bible, as new as Freud. They have found the books deal with basic problems as current and important as when they were written.

Meetings are open to all adults in the community, without tuition nor special educational background requirement. Participants may supply their own books, borrow them from friend or library or purchase inexpensive paper-bound editions from the Foundation.

Charge Dismissed In Idaho Murder

CALDWELL, Idaho (UPI) — Probate Judge Edward Lodge said Friday he has dismissed a murder charge against a Weiser man who had been accused of first-degree murder in the shooting death of a Valley County miner.

Lodge said the charges against Jack Burres, 33, were dismissed at the request of Valley County Prosecutor Larry Schoenhut.

Lodge said he ordered a charge against Burres' son, Bob, 35, Ontario, Ore., reduced to second degree murder. The judge made the decisions in a closed preliminary hearing at Cascade, Idaho.

Lodge said earlier information that both men were still charged with the crime was incorrect. He said he has taken under advisement the question of whether the younger Burres should be bound over to district court for trial.

The original charges were filed in the death of Roland Clark, 53, who was shot to death on his property near Big Creek in Valley County Aug. 24.

Three persons were taken to the Cottage Grove Hospital with minor injuries after the car in which they were riding went out of control on U. S. Highway 99 three miles north of Drain Sunday at 10:45 a.m.

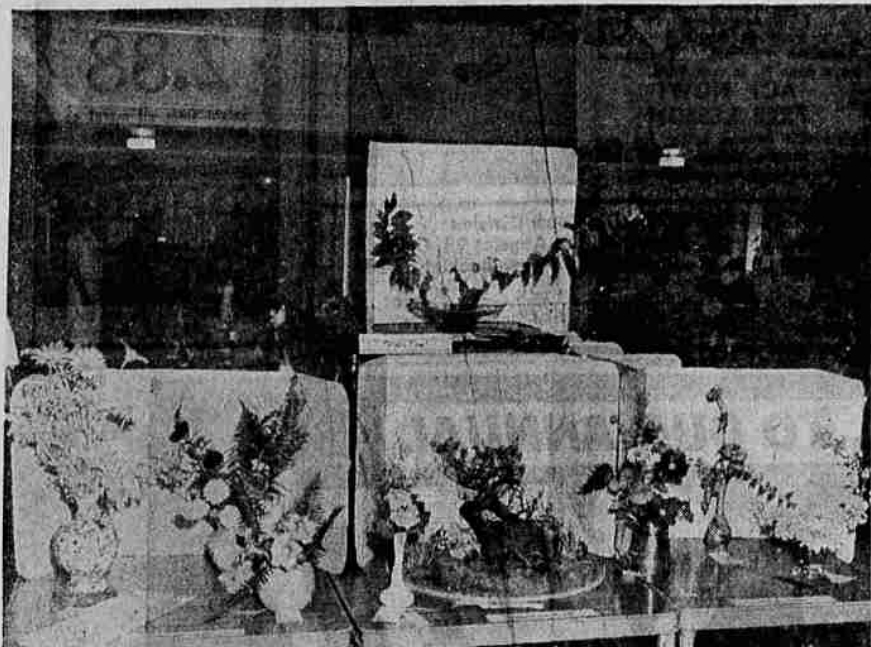
State police report the operator, Vern Lucile Osborne, Star Route, Drain, was driving north, started passing a pickup and lost control. The car went onto the west shoulder of the road and rolled over two or three times.

The operator and children, Rocky Lee, 12, and Cynthia, 10, were taken to the hospital for treatment. Two other children in the car, Kyle Robert, 5, and Kathy Joyce Osborne, age 2, were not injured.

Another accident occurred at the Sutherlin interchange on Interstate Highway 5 at 5:20 p.m. Sunday. A car operated by Mary Forester, Oakland, was traveling north. A second car, traveling south and operated by Harry Greenquist, Roseburg, was towing a vehicle operated by Frederick H. Ammot, Roseburg. Still a third car, operated by Ingolf Rogndahl, Roseburg, was traveling south, towing a boat and trailer and following the Greenquist vehicle.

State police said Greenquist lost control of his car, which started swerving, causing the car he was towing to sideswipe the Forester car. The Greenquist car then went into the west ditch, while the Forester car skidded out of control and hit the boat and trailer which the Rogndahl car was towing.

The disabled cars were towed from the scene, but there were no injuries.
