

Over 100 Nations Have Signed East-West Nuclear Test Treaty

WASHINGTON (UPI) — More than 100 nations have signed the limited test ban treaty approved by the United States Senate by an 80-19 roll call vote today.

Illegal Fireworks Plant Explosion Fatal To 14

CASERTA, Italy (UPI) — An illegal fireworks factory blew up in the heart of this southern Italian town today, killing at least 14 persons and injuring 20 others at least nine seriously.

The injured included Antonio Mariniello, 57, the factory owner, who was reported in critical condition in a Naples hospital. Mariniello's factory was just across the main square from the town hall.

ANGIONEUROTIC EDEMA

Q. Is there a cure for an angioneurotic edema?
A. Angioneurotic edema (giant hives) is a condition in which there is marked swelling, usually about the face. Some cases are hereditary—others are due to allergy. The inciting agent (allergen) may be anything—food, pollen, a drug, or even mental stress. For example, a girl whose angioneurotic edema was being successfully suppressed by treatment, became engaged to be married. Her condition was kept under control until she had a quarrel with her fiancé. Every subsequent lover's spat brought on giant hives.

LOSS OF TASTE AND SMELL

Q. I am 70 years old. About six months ago I lost my sense of taste and smell. Can anything be done to correct this condition?
A. Sudden loss of taste and smell can be due to disturbances in the nervous system which regulates these senses. In some instances severe infection in the sinus area may temporarily interfere with taste and smell. Thorough medical examination is indicated.

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"first step" toward ending the arms race, and U.S. ratification was expected to touch off signs of "second step" tension-easing moves by the Soviet Union. But even the most ardent treaty supporters warned against any quick follow-up action in the disarmament field.

Senate opposition to the treaty sprang from the core of senior southern leaders on military affairs. Chairman Richard B. Russell, D-Ga., of the armed services committee, and chairman John Stennis, D-Miss., of the preparedness subcommittee made early declarations against the pact.

Seven southern Democrats and one southern Republican, John Tower of Texas, lined up with them even before the vote. But the 12 other southerners, including four major committee chairmen, supported the President.

At the insistence of the Joint Chiefs of Staff, the treaty included a liberal withdrawal provision.

Car Crash Victims Show Improvement

David L. Welker, 21, of Roseburg is apparently much better and getting along fine following a spectacular crash of the automobile in which he was a passenger, according to his grandmother, Mrs. Ora Welker of Roseburg.

The driver, Michael S. Blomquist, son of Mr. and Mrs. Harold Blomquist of Roseburg, however, is still in poor condition. He is still on the critical list at the Medford hospital where he was taken for brain surgery. He is still unconscious, but his condition is improved and surgery was reported successful, Mrs. Welker said.

Welker, who is in the Navy, was expected to be transferred shortly to the Naval Hospital in Oakland. He is presently in a Redding hospital. Contrary to first reports, he did not lose an eye.

Blomquist's vehicle went out of control on Highway 99 near an underpass at Redding, jumped an 18-inch high divider strip, and climbed an embankment. Blomquist was thrown onto a road some 25 feet above the highway. His car rolled back down the hill, went some 250 feet north in the southbound lane and caught fire. An unidentified truck driver rescued Welker from the blazing wreck.

Welker, whose parents are Mr. and Mrs. Walter Welker of Roseburg, was on his way home on leave from the service where he was stationed in Texas.

Joint Mule Deer Hearing Is Due

Deer population trends, and range conditions involving the interstate mule deer herd will receive top billing during a two-day jointly-conducted hearing Oct. 3 in Yreka and Oct. 4 in Klamath Falls, according to W. O. Kelsay of Roseburg.

The hearing will be conducted by the Oregon Legislative Interim Committee on Wildlife and the California Assembly Committee on Fish and Game. Kelsay is chairman of the Oregon group.

The Klamath Falls meeting will be held in the Winema Hotel starting at 9 a.m. The public and sports organizations will receive a full opportunity to testify. They are asked, however, to notify the secretary of the committee, Cecil L. Edwards, at 300 Capitol Building, Salem of their intention to attend.



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It permits the United States or any government to withdraw from the pact if it decides that "extraordinary events" related to the treaty have jeopardized its supreme interests. This allows a nation to pull out if any country tests clandestinely or conducts nuclear experiments considered harmful to its security.

Although there is a stated three-month withdrawal notice, Secretary of State Dean Rusk testified that the United States would drop out immediately if Russia abrogated the treaty or began testing in any prohibited area.

Amendments to the treaty must be approved by a majority of all the parties — with the United States, Britain and Russia each having a veto. An amending conference may be called, if one-third of the signatory countries desire, but is not necessary.

Rusk also made it clear that this country would not have to give diplomatic recognition to a Communist government like that of East Germany if it approved the test ban treaty. East Germany signed the pact.

With the Senate vote of "consent," the formal ratification by the executive branch is the next and formal step. Instruments of ratification must be filed by all signatory governments with the three original parties to the treaty.

The treaty enters into effect after the United States, Britain and Soviet Union ratify it and deposit their ratification documents.

Canyonville Firm Gets Bus Contract

A special meeting to open bids on the purchase of a new school bus was held Monday night by the Myrtle Creek School Board, according to Lorraine Birenbaum, correspondent.

The contract was awarded to the low bidder, Canyon Motors of Canyonville. The firm will provide a 30-passenger International bus with a Superior body. The cost will be \$7,872, and delivery will be made about Jan. 1.

Mrs. Birenbaum said there will be no trade-in because the new bus will be an addition to the fleet. The bus will operate on the North Myrtle route. The bus now servicing that route will be used as a spare, she said.

The other two bidders were Sig Felt of Roseburg, \$7,963.85, and Barcus Motors, \$8,123.

An enrollment study made at the meeting showed that the Myrtle Creek schools had picked up 37 additional students since the beginning of the school year. The present enrollment is now 1,763, over 100 more students than last year.

Mrs. Birenbaum said the study also showed that 22 new students came to the area because their fathers are working on the new natural gas line.

Man Pleads Innocent To Narcotics Charge

Two persons indicted by the Douglas County Grand Jury appeared before Circuit Court Judge Don H. Sanders Monday.

Harold E. Stillwell, 35, Reedsport, pleaded innocent to fraudulently obtaining narcotic drugs. His trial will be set at the next docket setting and bail was continued at \$5,000.

John H. McCool, 34, Prescott, Ariz., charged with obtaining money by false pretenses, asked for additional time before entering a plea and his case was continued until Sept. 30, with bail also of \$5,000.

Stillwell is represented by Attorney A. C. Roll and McCool by George Weigum. Deputy Dist. Atty. Phillip Washburn is handling the state's cases.

Judge Sanders has signed an order for Mark C. Huckins to appear and show cause why his two-year probation granted him Oct. 6, 1961, should not be revoked and imposition of sentence, suspended at that time, not be imposed. Grounds are that he has failed to comply with probation terms and contrarily has committed the crime of obtaining money by false pretenses in Lane County. He was convicted there Sept. 11, 1963.

One-Man Fishing Crew Is Reported In Mutiny

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — A fishing boat captain asked the Coast Guard for help today because, he said, his one-man crew was mutinying.

The distress call came from the fishing boat Julia, which was 100 miles west of Monterey, Calif. The coast guard sent a cutter and an airplane to investigate.

The Julia's captain was identified as David Coe of Bainbridge Island, Wash., who said he had not slept for almost 24 hours because he feared his crewman would injure him. He said he had locked himself in his cabin.

Coe told the Coast Guard that in 30 years on the sea, he had never experienced a situation like it.

The Julia left Eureka, Calif., on a fishing trip Sept. 13.

Zoo's Prolific Pachyderms Produce Fourth Offspring

PORTLAND, Ore. (UPI) — The Portland zoo today produced its fourth baby elephant in a little over 17 months and it was hinted another one may be on the way.

The baby girl born at 5:03 a.m. PDT to Tuy Hoa (Tee-Wah) also was only the fourth elephant born in this country in more than 44 years.

It was the second elephant birth here in just nine days. A still-

unnamed boy elephant was born to Pet Sept. 15.

The zoo now has produced two baby boy and two baby girl elephants.

One of the boy elephants made history April 14, 1962, by becoming the first pachyderm born in the United States since 1918. This one, named Packy, now is a playful young bull who is learning tricks.

The other elephant, a female named Mc-Tu, was born to Rosy last Oct. 3.

It is Packy's mother, Belle, whom a zoo official said may be expecting again.

Today's arrival was up and about three hours after she was born, having breakfast. She was described as a little larger than her half brother born last week who weighed 153 pounds.

Jack Marks, the zoo director who fainted from exhaustion after Packy was born last year, wasn't here today. He was attending a convention in Washington, D.C.

The father of all four baby elephants is Thonglow, who was being kept separated from the rest of the zoo's herd.

Before Packy was born the last recorded elephant birth in this country was at Salt Lake City on April 29, 1918. The baby died after its mother refused to nurse it.

U.S. Sets Operation 'Big Lift'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A dramatic Army-Air Force "Exercise Big Lift" to fly 16,000 troops to Germany next month eventually may lead to savings of up to \$300 million annually in the U.S. outflow of gold.

The exercise, largest of its kind ever undertaken and involving the entire 2nd Armored Division, raises the possibility that two of the six U. S. divisions now in Europe might be brought home if it proves feasible to replace them with sufficient speed by air.

That would save \$75 million in U. S. gold now paid out yearly in overseas expenses that cannot be met in foreign currencies.

If support activities could be reduced proportionately, the saving might rise to \$300 million annually for a reduction of two divisions.

Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara, in announcing "Big Lift" Monday, said the U. S. airlift capability has doubled since 1961, and will double again in "the next several years."

Defense leaders never have been willing to concede publicly that there was any thought of reducing U. S. forces in Europe below six divisions, but the possibility has been discussed with the Senate Armed Services Committee. The idea advanced was that there would be no actual reduction in strength if the airlift capability was sufficiently increased.

The gold outflow due entirely to military deployment overseas last was reported at a rate of about \$1.6 billion a year, compared with \$2.6 billion in 1961 and \$2 billion in 1962. The Defense department goal is to get it down to \$1 billion a year.

In addition to the 15,000 troops of the 2nd Armored Division, 1,500 supporting ground forces and 1,500 airmen manning 116 combat planes are to be flown to Europe for the one-week exercise.
