CG's Richards Soars To 5-A-1 Scoring Lead

Cottage Grove fullback Alan Richards took over the scoring lead in Midwestern League football action from teammate Chuck Olds by scoring both the Lions' TDs in their 13-7 triumph over Springfield.

Richards has now scored six touchdowns for a total of 36 points. Olds has picked up 28 points on three TDs and eight PAT kicks.

Sheldon's Jerry Knutson moved up to third behind the two Cottage Grove stars with a 19-point output against South Eugene. Knutson has tallied 21 points for the season.

Ron Leep, pass-catching back for the Roseburg Indians, is tied for fourth with 18 points, while quarterback Jim Beamer, end Gary Heeter and halfback Bob (Smookey) Burgess have each tallied two TDs for the Indians.

Roseburg and Cottage Grove account for seven of the top 14 point-makers in District 5-A-1 play, and the two teams are also tied for the league lead with identical 9-0 records.

This week's game for the Indians

will be played Saturday night at Eugene's Civic Stadium with the North Eugene Highlanders providing the opposition. Friday's league schedule includes Cottage Grove at North Bend, Sheldon at Willamette, Springfield at South Eugene and Marshfield and Thurston at Springfield's Silke Field.

Ruckel In Lead

Larry Ruckel, hard-running middle back, took over the point lead among the Umpqua Valley League players. Ruckel picked up 13 points in last week's game to raise his total for three games to 22 on three TDs and four PATs.

Douglas' Dan Withers ranks second with 20 points, followed by Bill Hubler of Glendale with 19.

The six UVL teams, smarting from non-league setbacks, will open conference play this weekend. The favored Douglas Trojans will host the Sutherlin Bulldogs for homecoming at 11 a.m. Saturday, while the Glendale Wildcats will celebrate homecoming against the Riddle Irish Saturday at 2 p.m. The only game on tap Friday finds the Glendale Pirates at Myrtle Creek to battle the Vikings at 8 p.m.

Top Middleweights Set For TV Battle

NEW YORK (UPI)—Cuban Florentino Fernandez and Joe DeNucci of Newton, Mass., two middleweight knockout specialists, meet at the Boston Arena Friday night in a nationally televised fight that features this week's boxing schedule.

In addition, two champions are slated for non-title bouts. Welterweight king Emile Griffith engages in a 10-rounder with Puerto Rican middleweight contender Jose Gonzalez at San Juan, P.R., Saturday night.

Junior welterweight champion Eddie Perkins of Chicago clashes with Joey Limas of Albuquerque, N.M., in a 10-rounder at Albuquerque Tuesday night.

For the nationally televised Fernandez-DeNucci bout at Boston, Fernandez is favored at 7-5 because of his explosive left hook. Fernandez tried to wrest the middleweight title from Gene Fullmer in 1961 and almost knocked out Gene in the closing rounds but lost the decision.

Oklahoma's Sooners Top Poll; Oregon State Climbs To 15th

NEW YORK (UPI)—If Bud Wilkinson succeeds with President Kennedy's physical fitness program the way he has rebuilt the Oklahoma Sooners, Sonny Liston will be just another guy.

Oklahoma was accorded the nation's No. 1 ranking among college football teams Monday by a landslide ballot in the season's first weekly rating of the United Press International board of coaches.

Alabama was a distant second, Texas third and Big Ten representatives Northwestern and Wisconsin rounded out the top five.

The Sooners, surging back to the eminence they enjoyed in 1955 and 1956 when they were national champions, churned out 304 yards on the ground to upset Southern California, the defending national champion, last Saturday.

Coach Wilkinson, who heads Kennedy's fitness program, guided the Sooners to No. 7 spot last season after three straight years in which they failed to gain ranking.

Oklahoma received 22 first place votes from the 35-man UPI board. Alabama was No. 1 on seven ballots, three coaches picked Texas, and Northwestern, Navy and Pitt polled one each.

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Koufax-Ford Get Starting Nods For Series Opener

NEW YORK (UPI)—Manager Ralph Houk of the Yankees hoped today for "the breaks" and skipper Walter Alston of the Dodgers for "a healthy Sandy Koufax" for the World Series opening Wednesday in Yankee Stadium.

There was a good chance Alston's hope would be fulfilled for Koufax, the golden armed southpaw who will face Whitey Ford, New York's left handed money pitcher, in the first game said on his arrival, "I feel fine." He had been reported suffering from the aftermath of a slight case of the flu.

However, only time — perhaps seven games — will tell whether the Yankees, who have made winning World Series a habit, will get the breaks.

The way Houk sees it, the two teams are so evenly matched that the series could be decided by "the breaks of the game." He doesn't buy the general talk that the Dodgers are inferior defensively.

Pitching Is Factor

He does agree with Alston that pitching, usually the name of the game whether it be for one game or 162, will decide the series providing those breaks even up.

Although the Yankees are considered to have more depth in the pitching department, the Dodgers starting trio of Koufax, Johnny Podres and Don Drysdale and

their relief ace, Ron Perranoski, are accorded a slight edge over the Yankees "big four." They are starters Ford, Al Downing and Jim Bouton with Hal Reniff the No. 1 man in the bullpen.

Houk, cheered by the improvement in the condition of his two outfield stars, Mickey Mantle and Roger Maris, said the Yankees "are in the best physical condition of the season."

Alston was concerned over his pitching — Koufax, Perranoski and Podres.

Has The Flu

Like Koufax, Perranoski has had a touch of the flu.

"Unless Koufax gets sick today or tomorrow, he'll pitch," said Alston upon the Dodgers' arrival Monday night, "and Perranoski is okay."

Among his regulars, Alston had a question mark in rookie third base Ken McMullen. McMullen re-injured a muscle in his left leg Thursday night but Alston thinks he will be ready to play Wednesday. If he isn't, he will shift Jim Gilliam to third base and put rookie Dick Tracewaki, a slick fielder but weak hitter, at second.

Alston refused to name a starting lineup "until I find out if McMullen will play."

Houk named this lineup and batting order for the first game: Shortstop Tony Kubek, second baseman Bobby Richardson, left fielder Tom Tresh, Mantle, Maris, catcher Elston Howard, first baseman Joe Pepitone and Ford.

Beavers Drill On Pass Defense; Knee Injury Sidelines UO'S Post

SEATTLE (UPI)—Coach Jim Owens of Washington said tackle Koll Hagen and halfback Bill Stiffer are doubtful starters for the Iowa game here Saturday.

Quarterback Bill Siler, out with hepatitis, is now feared lost for the season.

Owens had his Huskies working on scoring from near the goal line in drills Monday. Inability to punch touchdowns across after moving the ball downfield has cost the Huskies two close losses to Air Force and Pittsburgh.

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UPI)—One Oregon State man was injured in last Saturday's Colorado game, but three players who missed that game are expected to be back for Saturday night's battle against tough Baylor.

Halfback Bill Sinyard is considered a "doubtful" participant in the Baylor game, but returning to action will be end Doug McDougal, center Dick Ruhl and guard Warren Cole.

Baylor has a brilliant quarterback in Don Trull, and the Beavers Monday drilled on pass defense.

EUGENE, Ore. (UPI)—An Oregon team spokesman said today that junior Doug Post, Oregon's

second string quarterback, suffered torn ligaments in his knee last Saturday while the Ducks were bombing Stanford 36-7.

Post, the regular 1961 quarterback, was out all last year after an operation on the same knee. The spokesman said that Post "will definitely miss several games" because of the re-injury to his knee.

Coach Len Casanova ran the Ducks through a two-hour workout Monday and spent most of the time on offense. Oregon is at West Virginia next Saturday.

PULLMAN, Wash. (UPI)—Washington State, still seeking their first win, Monday worked to fix its leaky pass defense.

The Cougars meet Arizona in Spokane Saturday night.

John Browne, who subbed for injured Herm McKee at fullback during last Saturday's come-from-behind 14-all tie with Iowa, is expected to handle the same chores against the Wildcats.

BERKELEY, Calif. (UPI)—Coach Marv Levy says that guard Jim Norwood has been elevated to the University of California's first team.

Levy put his Bear squad back to work yesterday to prepare for Saturday's battle at Pittsburgh.

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
