Valachi Tells More About Gang Wars In Early '30s

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Cosa Nostra informer Joseph Valachi told Senate investigators today about a mobster who "died of a broken heart" after disgracing himself by showing nervousness after the killing of gangland boss Giuseppe Masseria.

The squat alumnus of the crime combine identified the nervous gangster as Ciro Terranova, Masseria, who was set up for death by his own lieutenants, was murdered in a Coney Island restaurant. Masseria was the leader of the Italian faction in the 14-month Italian-Sicilian gang war of 1930-31.

"Ciro was so shaky in putting the key in the ignition that they threw him off the wheel," Valachi said in describing the episode. He said Vito Genovese, alleged "under the table boss of Cosa Nostra," Terranova and other aides had been present at Masseria's slaying.

Stripped Of Power
Valachi said Ciro began to have what he called the "buck wheats" after the incident and his underworld power began to be stripped away.

"After a while he took it so hard that he just died of a broken heart," he said.

"He disgraced himself?" asked Chairman John L. McClellan, D-Ark., of the Senate investigations subcommittee. Valachi agreed.

Valachi testified about the Masseria slaying, touched upon briefly in Tuesday's testimony, after answering a volley of questions posed by subcommittee members. He disclaimed knowledge of criminal operations in a variety of mid-western cities in language which suggested that he had never heard of the cities themselves.

"Senator, I never heard of Omaha," Valachi said, when Sen.

Carl T. Curtis, R-Neb., asked about policy and horse book operations there.

Valachi, who violated an oath of loyalty and silence sworn in blood and fire, was serving two separate narcotics conspiracy convictions at the time he killed a fellow prisoner he suspected of being his intended executioner. It was after this that he turned on Cosa Nostra and began spilling its inside secrets to government agents.

Gave Livid Account
Valachi came on like gangbusters for the senators Tuesday, giving a murder-by-murder account of the struggle for controls of the New York branch of Cosa Nostra in the early 1930s. He also described in lurid detail his own secret initiation into the crime clan.

At one point during his recital of the initiation ceremony, he told the listening senators and the silent crowd in the ornately paneled hearing room:

"Senators, I need to go no further than what I'm doing — exposing this to you, the press, everybody — this is my doom!"

Subcommittee aides said today Valachi would push ahead with his story of the struggle for control of Cosa Nostra. This includes accounts of the murder April 20, 1931 of Giuseppe Masseria by a rival faction headed by Salvatore Maranzano, and the subsequent doublecross and rubout of Maranzano by killers hired by the late vice lord, Charles (Lucky) Luciano, and Vito Genovese, said by Valachi to be "the boss of all bosses" in Cosa Nostra today.

To Unveil Charts
Senate investigators planned to unveil a set of prepared charts to aid Valachi in giving an up-to-date reading of who's who in

Cosa Nostra's New York set-up. Valachi will draw on first-hand knowledge up to 1959, when he was arrested. After that date he has information acquired in federal prison as a cell-mate to Genovese.

Although much of Valachi's testimony Tuesday dealt with crimes of more than 30 years ago, some of the cases still are in the New York Police Department's "active" files. Prosecutors across the greater New York area were reported by subcommittee aides to be "very much interested" in his disclosures.

Hurricane Flora Gains Strength; Warnings Up

SAN JUAN, P.R. (UPI)—Killer Hurricane Flora pushed 125 miles per hour winds up the Caribbean today and the weather bureau warned the "well developed and dangerous" storm would grow even stronger during the day.

Gale warnings were ordered for the peninsula of Barbados in the Dominican Republic this afternoon and for the peninsula Presque Isle du Sudouest in Haiti tonight.

The latest advisory from the San Juan Weather Bureau, at 6 a.m. EDT, located the season's sixth and fiercest tropical twister near latitude 14.6 north, longitude 68.8 west, or about 330 statute miles southwest of San Juan.

Moving toward the west-northwest at 14 m.p.h., Flora was expected to increase some in size and intensity during the day, the weather bureau said.

"On its present course, Hurricane Flora will pass about 120 miles south of the Peninsula of Harahona early tonight and less than 100 miles south of the peninsula Presque Isle du Sudouest Thursday morning," the advisory said. It warned beach residents of these areas to take precautions against tides five to eight feet above normal.

Flora, which left six persons dead when it roared across the Yucatan Monday, increased in size during the night.

"The older most hurricanes get, the more they spread out," forecasters explained.

Gordon E. Dunn, the nation's chief hurricane forecaster at the Miami Weather Bureau, said the storm posed a threat to the rest of island of Jamaica.

"There is a definite threat that Flora will endanger Jamaica late tonight or early Thursday," Dunn said.

Rusk, Andrei Talk Cuban Crisis Today

NEW YORK (UPI) — Secretary of State Dean Rusk plans at a dinner meeting tonight with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko to hammer at the urgent need for a settlement of the Cuban problems to ease world tension.

Officials said Rusk wants to emphasize the view that there can be no real improvement in East-West relations until Russia pulls the rest of her troops out of Cuba and persuades or forces Fidel Castro to stop trying to Communize his neighbors.

There is little expectation in diplomatic quarters that Rusk will make any headway on the issue at this time. However, American officials believe Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev may be growing somewhat weary of his Cuban burden and inclined to diminish support of the Havana regime. Rusk wants to keep the pressure on the Kremlin.

The U. S. secretary apparently hopes to keep tonight's meeting confined principally to Soviet-American matters, leaving questions of European security and disarmament for discussion at three-power sessions attended by British Foreign Secretary Lord Home.

Rusk may be able to tell Gromyko that the Kennedy administration is inclined to approve Soviet purchases of grain from U.S. suppliers under certain conditions. There also is a possibility he and Gromyko will be able to make progress on some strictly bilateral matters such as a commercial aviation agreement between the two countries and improvement of diplomatic communications.

The Big Three ministers will get together again Thursday night to continue their earlier discussions on proposed arms control and security measures to follow up the nuclear test ban treaty.

Hurler Sets New Record In Strikeouts

NEW YORK (UPI) — Dandy Sandy Koufax blazed his way into the record books Wednesday as he struck out 15 New York Yankee batters to bust an all-time World Series strike out record set by Brooklyn Dodger pitcher Carl Erskine in 1953.

Koufax brought 69,000 fans in Yankee Stadium to their feet in a standing ovation as he struck out pinch hitter Harry Bright to set the record and give the Dodgers a 5-2 win in the opening game of the richest World Series ever.

The only mar on Koufax's record came in the bottom of the eighth inning when Tom Tresh hit a two-run homer.

Koufax was at his fastballing finest, as he became the greatest strike out pitcher in World Series history by fanning Bright on a 2-2 pitch with two outs in the bottom of the ninth inning.

And it was Koufax's battery mate, catcher John Roseboro, who provided the big punch for the Dodgers in the early innings, as he blasted a three-run homer off Yankee starter Whitey Ford in the top of the second inning. Ex-Yankee Bill Skowron came back to haunt his former teammates by driving in the other two Dodger runs.

Koufax, who compiled a 25-5 record on the regular season, went all the way for the victory. Ford, who went into the Series with a 24-7 record, was lifted in the bottom of the sixth for a pinch hitter.

An inning by inning description of the game follows:

Dodgers first
Wills was called out on strikes. Ford threw him only 4 pitches. Gilliam rapped Ford's second pitch to Kubek who threw him out. W. Davis struck out on 3 pitches.

No runs, no hits, no errors, none left.

Yankees first
Kubek went down swinging on a 1 and 2 pitch. Richardson struck out swinging at a blazing fast ball. Tresh was called out on strikes on a 2 and 2 pitch.

Dodgers second
T. Davis grounded out on Ford's second pitch, Kubek to Peppitone. F. Howard drove Ford's third pitch against the centerfield fence at the 457-foot mark for a double. Skowron singled to center, scoring F. Howard.

Tracewski singled to center, Skowron stopping at second. Roseboro hit a 0-1 pitch into the right field stands near the foul line for a home run, scoring Skowron and Tracewski ahead of him and putting the Dodgers in front, 4-0. It was Roseboro's first World Series home run. Koufax fled to Maris. Wills was called out on strikes. Four runs, four hits, no errors, none left.

Algerian Army Vows Loyalty To Ben Bella

ALGIERS (UPI)—The Algerian army pledged its loyalty to "strong man" President Ahmed Ben Bella today, and denounced the rebels who are seeking to overthrow him.

In a statement issued by its political department, the army said it "condemns energetically this attempted counter-revolution and decides solemnly to combat any attack upon the fruits of the revolution."

"It reaffirms its loyalty to the government and people and pledges itself to pursue the struggle for the building up of socialism," the statement added.

Isolate Rebel Region

The army announced its support for Ben Bella as heavily armed loyalist troops moved to isolate the rugged Kabylia region where anti-government rebels have called for his ouster.

The army statement denounced

the insurgent leaders as "ambitious politicians, sick for power and division."

It admitted that a certain number of officers had joined the dissidents, including Col. Mohamed Ou El Hadj, who was ousted by Ben Bella from his command of the 7th Military Region for supporting the movement against the government.

"All this is going on," the statement added, "at a moment when (Portuguese Premier Antonio) Salazar is promising material aid to all counter-revolutions."

Aid Not Described
The statement did not expand on this nor indicate whether it meant Salazar has promised help to the anti-Ben Bella forces.

The army's statement was published prominently in all Algerian newspapers.

It followed a defense ministry denial Tuesday of reports that regular army units were deserting to the insurgents in the Kabylia area.

Other sources here also said there was no truth in the reports. Meanwhile, pro-Ben Bella troops, in camouflage uniforms and carrying sub-machineguns, inched forward in armored vehicles to block communications between Kabylia and the rest of the country.

So far, there has been no bloodshed.

Prospects Look Dim Today For Enactment Of Tax Cut

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Prospects looked bleak today for final enactment this year of a big tax cut in view of a decision by Senate Democratic leaders that civil rights legislation must come first.

Like a broken record, the White House reiterated Tuesday what it has been saying for months: President Kennedy wants both bills enacted this year. Democratic congressional leaders dutifully repeated earlier pledges to press for enactment of both measures.

However, Christmas arrives in 12 weeks and unless the congressional tempo quickens, some lawmakers predict that neither bill will be enacted this year.

Democratic Whip Hubert H. Humphrey, Minn., said, Tuesday

that civil rights would get priority over the tax bill in the Senate. He conceded that this may result in final action on the tax measure being delayed until early 1964.

Taxpayers Wouldn't Suffer
Should this happen, Sen. Russell Long, D-La., predicted it would make no ultimate difference to the pocketbooks of taxpayers. The House last week passed a bill that would reduce income taxes \$11 billion in two annual steps starting next Jan. 1.

If final action on the tax bill is delayed until next year, Long said, the tax relief would be made retroactive to Jan. 1, 1964, as provided in the House bill.

Long is the second-ranking Democrat on the Senate Finance Committee. The administration is counting on him to lead the fight for passage of the tax bill over the opposition of Chairman Harry F. Byrd, D-Va.

The National Leadership Conference, a group of labor, church and Negro leaders spearheading the drive for a civil rights bill, insisted that action must be completed on that legislation this year.

Said Postponement "Fantastic"
The group said in a statement Monday that "any intimation that a civil rights bill may be postponed until next session is fantastic in the light of what has happened throughout the country."

Pirate Ship Hits Cuban Lumber Mill

HAVANA (UPI)—A "pirate ship" attacked and destroyed a lumber mill at Cape Guin, on the northeast coast of Oriente Province, early Tuesday, the government reported today.

After the attack boat "committed the crime," official sources said, "it escaped to the north," a reference to the United States.

(Cape Guin is in the Banes area of Oriente Province where the Castro regime has been building a naval base and constructing Soviet-type patrol craft).

The attack was the first armed blow against the Castro regime in several weeks. It was preceded by three air strikes by rebel aircraft operating from Central American bases last month, and a daring sea raid on an oil terminal complex in the Pinar del Rio region near Havana.

(In Miami, Havana radio reported the sea attack took place at Cape Guin at 2:50 a.m. Tuesday. It said the raider "shielded by darkness" struck its objective, and then ran.

(There was no explanation how the mill was "destroyed," but it was assumed to have been shelled and machinegunned and set afire.

(The official communique over Havana radio was noteworthy in that it represented the first time the Castro regime has credited an attack with achieving its objective. Hitherto, such anti-Castro raids have been represented as successful in only a minor sense).

Side By Side
A road maintenance worker found the two small bodies lying face up, side by side, almost touching, in the leaves and grass under the tree.

Barbara's body was nude. Melissa Ann was wearing red shorts and a white plastic headband which the Federal Bureau of Investigation studied closely for possible fingerprints.

The girls' things were next to their bodies and the rest of their clothes were about seven feet away. Police Chief Claude Lien of suburban Plymouth Village roped off a 50-yard square around the bodies.

Dr. John Coe of Minneapolis General Hospital was assigned to perform the autopsy to determine exact cause of death and whether the girls had been sexually abused.

"It seems certain now that they were kidnapped and slain," Capt. Henry Deason, head of the Minneapolis police homicide division said. "By whom is another question."

The bodies were identified by Melissa's step-father, Melvin Levrett.

Police took Melissa's 23-year-old mother out to the scene where the girls were found. Detective Inspector Calvin Hawkinson said the mother recalled the family had picnicked in Plymouth Village in the past but not near the area where the bodies were discovered.

Vote With Majority
WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sens. Maurice Neuberger and Wayne Morse, D-Ore., cast their ballots with the majority Tuesday as the Senate voted 70 to 15 to extend the Civil Rights Commission for one year.

Police Find Torn Bodies Of Young Kidnap Victims

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn. (UPI)—Sheriff's deputies today combed the woodland area where the torn bodies of two little girls, kidnapped three weeks ago, were found underneath an elm tree.

A pathologist, with a Federal Bureau of Investigation agent by his side, was to examine the victims today in hopes of discovering the precise cause of death.

The bodies of Melissa Ann Lee, 5, and Barbara Foshag, 4, were discovered Tuesday 10 miles northwest of Minneapolis near Medicine Lake in a woods across from Mission Farms, a rehabilitation home for alcoholics.

Searching Another Area
Detective Inspector Calvin Hawkinson said the deputies would not search the immediate area where the girls' bodies were found, but "another area close by."

Since they were last seen getting into the car of a black-haired stranger Sept. 7, dozens of officers and volunteers had probed nearly every square foot of the south Minneapolis tenement district where the girls lived.

"I had a feeling it would be like this," said Barbara's mother, she said an older son had been praying that his little sister would come back safe.

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U. S. Plywood Donates Land For Airport

United States Plywood Corp. has donated 14.6 acres of industrial property to the city of Roseburg.

The tract was presented to City Manager Craig McMicken by R. J. Moore, U.S. Plywood's Roseburg Operations manager. Moore stated it was the company's hope that the additional property would insure the continued operation of the airport by West Coast Airlines and, thus, be a benefit to the city.

The property is located at the south end of the Roseburg airport. McMicken said it is land which is being looked at as a possibility for extending the airport runway.

The city official pointed out that both former mayor Peter B. Serafin and present mayor Thomas Garrison were active in the negotiations which led to the donation of property.

The land involved is known as the Coon Creek Mill property. An old mill structure is the only building on the site.

In accepting the tract, McMicken commented:

"The airport here is more than just the runway itself. It requires open approach areas. This insures a safe approach and may also permit extension of the runway in the future."

"It may also permit road access to the airport from the east, which is, in the long range, a street improvement plan."

"We are very appreciative of the donation."

Umpqua Legion Post Plans New \$25,000 Headquarters

Umpqua Legion Post No. 16, which lost its building in the disastrous blast of 1959, will build a new home.

Legionnaires at a meeting Tuesday night approved a post building committee's recommendation calling for early construction of a 40-by-80-foot building to be located on Legion property just west of the Holiday Inn on SE Oak Street. Cost of constructing the building and finishing the interior is estimated at \$25,000.

Jack George, commander, said an attractive, one-story, cinder block structure will be built. It will face west to look out upon the proposed Gateway Park.

Plans Described
A large picture window at the front of the building (with a display of the Legion baseball trophies to be located on shelves on the interior side of the window) is planned. Glass entrance doors and several picture windows along the west side looking out over the proposed park are other construction features.

The roof, which is rectangular with a slight crown, will extend five feet out from the west side of the building to provide a shelter from sun and rain.

Contractor for the work will be Miller & Dimnick General Contractors of Roseburg. The original construction costs will be \$18,750. The Legion will depend on a substantial volunteer activity to complete the interior finishing.

The building will include two meeting rooms (separated by a floating door partition), kitchen, storage space and rest rooms. It will be situated on the southeast corner of the Legion's 60-by-165-foot lot. Tentative plans call for locating parking facilities on the west side and at the rear of the property.

Committee Named
Building committee members who have been in charge of the planning are Steve Ferche, chairman; George Trapolis, Wonnard Leinonen, Bruce Mellis and Jack George. Gordon Carlson is legal advisor.

Mellis said the Legion is hopeful that construction can be started no later than Oct. 15. Architect for the facility was Lyle Glenn, former Roseburg resident.

The building committee's report to the Legion membership Tuesday indicated the organization had sufficient funds to get the project under way. It is being financed by pledges from Legionnaires and Roseburg businessmen.

After the building is completed, the Legion plans to make it available for public use.
