Weather Continues To Hamper Hunting In Oregon's Forests

PORTLAND (UPI)—The outlook for Oregon deer hunters this weekend continued mostly on the grim side unless weather condi-

tions change.

The State Game Commission reported that weather on opening weekend kept deer bedded down in the thickets during the day with dry ground conditions making stalking extremely difficult.

The best producers last weekend were the higher elevations above the fog line, and in timber and heavy brush along the steeper slopes.

In the Northwest section of the state, bucks have been sticking close to cover in shady creek bottoms. The game commission reports hunting prospects will be generally only fair after the weekend opening barrage which was rated as good. Best bet is the north coastal district.

In southwest Oregon the outlook continues poor after a disappointing opening weekend.

Hunting conditions in the northeast were rated from fair to excellent in Baker and Grant counties, slow elsewhere.

In Central Oregon the Klamath district was a good producer, mostly spikes and forked horns, despite adverse weather conditions. Hunters reported their best luck in areas where there were heavy concentrations of hunters, most notably the Sprague unit.

The report for Southeast Oregon has buck hunting fairly slow until autumn storms drive deer down from higher elevations.

UVL Play Highlights A-2, B Action

A full slate of league game's are on tap this weekend for Douglas County A-2 and B football teams.

Umpqua Valley League play will open with a single game Friday night at Myrtle Creek when the Vikings entertain the Glendale Pirates at 8. Saturday homecoming battles are on tap for Douglas and Glide. The Douglas Trojans will host the Sutherlin Bulldogs at 11 a.m. and the Glide Wildcats will clash with the invading Riddle Irish at 2 p.m. Both the Douglas-Sutherlin and Glide-Riddle games will be broadcast by KQEN.

In Emerald League play the undefeated Drain Warriors will head north to test the power of the unbeaten Junction City Tigers at 8 p.m. Friday.

Bico-Trico B League encounters Friday will feature Crow's Cougars at Oakland against the Oakers, Elkton's Elks will travel to meet the Powers Crusaders and the Yoncalla Eagles will entertain Lowell. All Bico-Trico games Friday will begin at 1:30 p.m. Saturday a single non-league outing is on tap for Monroe's Blue Dragons as they host McLaren in a night game at Junction City.

Camas Valley's Hornets will collide with the Days Creek Wolves at Days Creek in a 3 p.m. Southern Oregon Eight-Man League game, while the Prospect Cougars will be at Canyonville to battle the Tigers at 3:30 p.m. in a non-league outing.

Trojans Favored

The Trojans of Douglas will go into UVL play favored to win the conference crown and a berth in the state playoffs. The Trojans have posted the only winning record among the six league teams in warm-up battles, beating Co-

quille and Gold Beach before dropping a 20-18 decision to Myrtle Point. The Trojans have a well-balanced offensive attack, backed by a rugged defense. Leading the offensive charge will be quarterback Dan Withers and fullback Jim Heard. Sutherlin, on the other hand, has had trouble scoring. The Bulldogs have lost three straight games, and in the three setbacks scored a snigle six-pointer in their opener against powerful Bandon.

Since that time the 'Dogs have been shut out by Pacific and Reedsport. All-league quarterback Mike Ouellette and halfback Don Goertzen are the big-guns in the Sutherlin attack.

Saturday's game at Glide shapes up as a fight between Glide's tough defense and Riddle's offense. The Irish, defending league champs, boast a 1-2 record, and will be out to break a two-game losing streak. The host Wildcats have lost two and tied St. Mary's of Medford in pre-league play. Glide sports a tough defense and a spectacular passing attack with Wade Sumpter handling the aerials.

The Glendale-Myrtle Creek game Friday at Myrtle Creek features two teams that have records of

three losses in practice games. The Vikings field a young team with good passing and a top ground threat in fullback Bob Beanblom. Glendale's Bill Hubler is the leading scorer among UVL players as the Pirates have shown plenty of offense, but appear to be having defensive problems.

Crucial Battle

Drain's Warriors are favored to capture the Emerald League crown this year with Mark Thomas, Jerry Smith and Frank Backus leading the rampaging '11. The Warriors have a perfect 3-0 record, and will be gunning for undisputed control of the league load Friday when they meet Junction City's Tigers, also sporting a 3-0 league mark.

Other Emerald League outings Friday include Creswell at McKenzie and St. Francis at Harrisburg. Saturday Oakridge is at Pleasant Hill and Central Linn is at Elmira.

B Action Slated

Oakland's Oakers and Yoncalla's Eagles are the current favorites in the well-balanced Bico-Trico B circuit. The Oakers boast a 3-0 record for the season and a 1-0 league mark. Kerney and Randy Manley, Keith Crenshaw and Jon

Lamoreaux head the charging backfield. The Eagles, after playing a scoreless tie with Powers, have come up strong to drop Elkton and Crow with powerful offensive showings.

Elkton will be battling to stay in contention at Powers, with the Elks sporting a 2-1 record on the season and Powers boasting a 1-0-1 league mark. The passing of Don Suloff and the receiving of David Abraham sparks the Elks' attack.

In eight-man play Camas Valley is heavily favored to dump Days Creek's Wolves. The Hornets rolled to a 68-0 triumph over the Wolves in an earlier non-counter, and have only one loss against them—that being a one-pointer to Canyonville's Tigers. The Tigers test the power of Prospect in a non-league outing, with both teams figured to be two of the top powers in Southern Oregon 8-Man play.

MEET BRITISH OPPONENTS

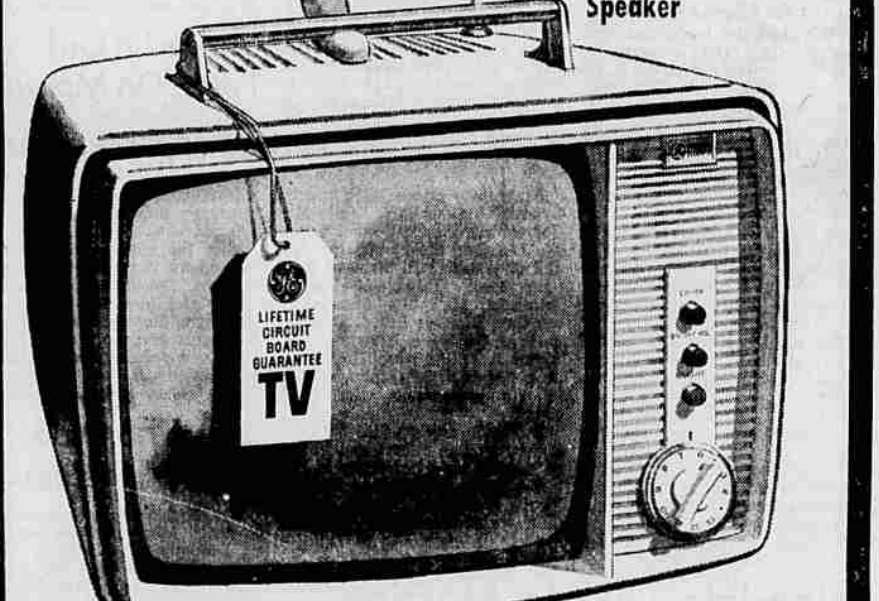

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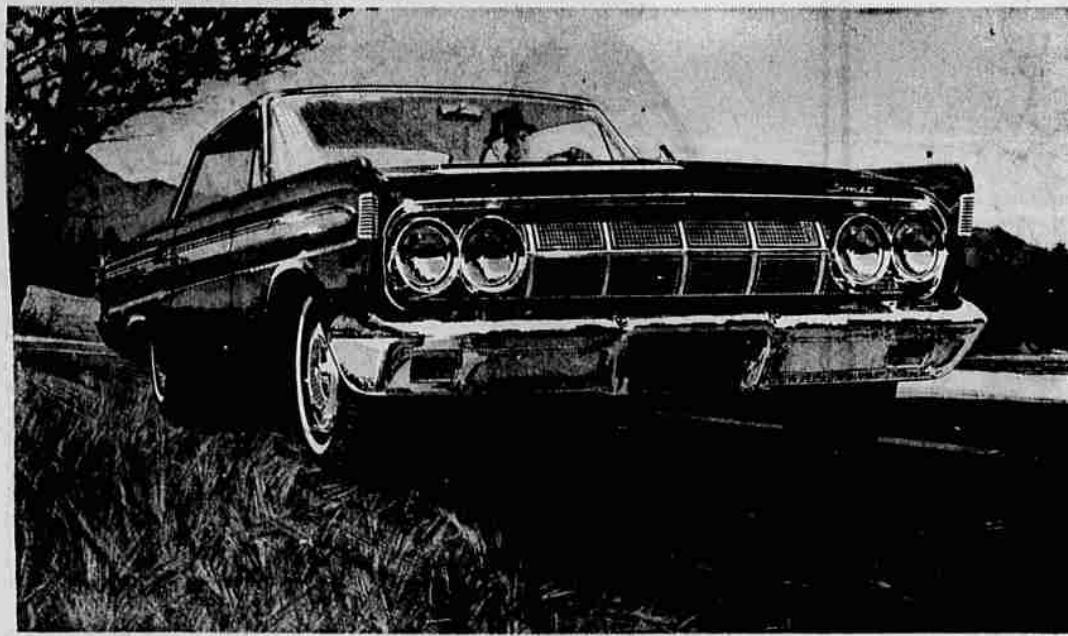
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
