

Former Strikeout King Predicts Koufax Will Fan More Next Time

NEW YORK (UPI) — Sandy Koufax is capable of breaking his own World Series strikeout record the next time he faces the Yankees.

That was the opinion voiced by Carl Erskine, the former record holder, when he wandered into the Los Angeles Dodgers' locker room Wednesday to congratulate Koufax for his 15-strikeout performance in the series opener.

"Sandy may break that record again before the series is over," said Erskine, who 10 years ago

to the day had set the old series mark by fanning 14 Yankees as a member of the Dodgers.

"I'm delighted that Sandy has kept it in the Dodger family, and I think he's the man who deserves to have it," added Erskine. "He's just about the greatest strikeout pitcher of them all, isn't he?"

Asked if he was surprised when Koufax erased his mark, Erskine replied:

"I'm sure no one ever predicted that Carl Erskine would ever break a series strikeout record, but they certainly did for this fellow."

Erskine, a little baldier than he was 10 years ago but just as dapper and affable, then wrapped his arms around Koufax and they posed for photographers and there was a genuineness in the way they grabbed each other.

Koufax, it should be remembered, was a starry-eyed kid on the Dodger club in Brooklyn when Erskine was the star.

"I remember Carl coming to me in the 1959 series when I pitched against the White Sox," Sandy revealed. "He said to me that day, 'Sandy, I'd like to see you break my record.' I knew he was rooting for me today, so I was just a little sad as well as glad when I broke the record."

Joe Becker, the Dodgers' pitching coach, disclosed that a small adjustment Koufax made after the sixth inning helped him set the record.

Elbow Acted Up

In the sixth, Koufax walked two men before retiring Mickey Mantle and Roger Maris on pop ups.

Florida A & M Voted Tops Among Small College Ranks

NEW YORK (UPI) — Florida A&M, trying to shake the bridesmaid role it inherited last season, was off to another good start today as the nation's No. 1 small college football team in the first weekly ratings issued by the United Press International board of coaches.

Coach Alonzo Gaither's Rattlers, who won their 10th straight regular season game last weekend by defeating Lincoln College (Mo.), 44-6, drew seven first place votes for their high scoring performance.

Florida A&M, led most of the way in the 1962 ratings, only to give way to Southern Mississippi in the final three weeks of the campaign. Southern Mississippi has since ascended to major college status.

Delaware, ninth in the final '62 UPI ratings, whipped Lehigh, 30-0, and received two first place ballots. The Blue Hens garnered 121 second place points, 71 less than Florida A&M's 192.

Northern Illinois opened in third place, up three notches over last year's finish, with three first place votes and Lenoir-Rhyne was fourth with the help of two first place ballots.

Central Oklahoma State was named fifth in the opening ratings, down two notches from last season's finale, and Montana State is sixth, followed by San Diego State, and Texas A&I, W.enberg and Eastern Carolina were tied for ninth place.

Wittenberg was the only school among the top 10 that failed to receive at least one first place

vote.

The 35-man UPI coaches board — made up of five coaches from each of the nation's geographical sections — award points on a basis of 10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1 for votes from first through 10th place.
