

Florida Gears For Storm Hit

MIAMI, Fla. (UPI) — Death-dealing hurricane Flora probed the Bahamas with its fringe winds today and threatened Florida with its full 100 mile-an-hour fury.

"Florida is under the gun," said forecaster Gilbert Clark of the Miami Weather Bureau.

The season's sixth tropical storm slowed to a dead walk after hitting the mountain ranges of eastern Cuba.

At 8 a.m., the vicious hurricane, which already has claimed at least 41 lives, was located 70 miles southeast of Camaguey in central Cuba, near latitude 20.7 north, longitude 77.0 west and was moving northwest to west-northwest at 7 m.p.h.

"This storm is very hard to pin down," Clark said. "It is over land and it could go anywhere."

"It could even veer to the south, but right now it is on a course that will bring it directly south of Florida, and this is bad."

Flora had 125 mile-an-hour winds when it slammed into Cuba Friday, dealing the big naval base at Guantanamo Bay a glancing blow.

Although slowed somewhat by its bout with the land, the big storm was expected to rebuild over the flat terrain of central Camaguey Province and the open water.

Winds of hurricane force were reported at Santiago on the south coast and Punta Laeitia on the north coast of Cuba and gale force winds extended out into the Bahamas.

Havana Radio warned residents of Camaguey Province to take all precautions against the furious blow.

A broadcast monitored in Miami today warned Cubans living in the center of the island that Flora was "very dangerous."

The Bahamas, Britain's string of some 700 islands stretching southeastward off Florida's East Coast, began batten down for the storm Friday night.

And residents of the oft-battered South Florida Keys, smashed three years ago by hurricane Donna, waited nervously for late word on the hurricane's movements.

The increasing threat posed by Flora forced cancellation of a planned weekend visit by Emperor Haile Selassie of Ethiopia to the nation's missile test center at Cape Canaveral.

State officials said the visit would have involved a flight from New York to this space port, and the trip had been ruled out by Flora.

Military and civilian agencies at the cape were preparing to "button down" the large rockets and giant launching facilities in the event the threat continues to grow.

The weather bureau said all precautions against dangerous winds, high tides and heavy rains should be continued through central and eastern Cuba and northward through the Bahamas to the area from Acklins to Andros Island.

Local Woman Hurt In Wreck

A 63-year-old Roseburg woman was treated at Mercy Hospital Friday afternoon for injuries received when she was involved in a three-car accident in North Roseburg.

According to state police, Fannie Jane Lamm, of 1128 SE Jackson St., was the driver of one of the vehicles involved in an accident near a pipeline construction project at the intersection of NE Stephens Street and NE Chestnut Avenue at 2:15 p.m. Friday.

State police said the other drivers involved were Tom Eli Roles, 66, of 137 NE Pleasant St., and Leona Mae Guse, 33, of 147 Taft Road. They said the Roles and Lamm vehicles were traveling north on Stephens Street in a construction zone where one lane in each of the north and south bound lanes is blocked off by a barricade. Roles had taken his attention from the roadway to close his right front door that had flown open police reported. When looking up, Roles said, he saw the Lamm vehicle was stopping. His car hit the left rear of the Lamm car, police said. They said the Roles car then bounced into the southbound lane and collided head-on with the Guse vehicle.

Spokesmen at Mercy Hospital reported Mrs. Lamm was in good condition and was due to be released sometime Saturday.

Meanwhile, state police also investigated a one-car accident on Interstate Highway 5 two miles south of Canyonville at 4:45 a.m. Saturday. They said Harlen Eugene Strand, 22, of Glendale, was traveling south on the highway and fell asleep, with his car going out of control and rolling over. The driver was treated for minor injuries at Canyonville Clinic.

NAACP Plans Talks With LDS

SALT LAKE CITY (UPI)—Six members of the local branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People will meet today to draw up a list of civil rights proposals to present to the Mormon Church, an action momentarily preventing picketing.

Albert B. Fritz, NAACP Salt Lake branch president, announced at a civil rights meeting Friday night a committee from the NAACP had met with two high officials of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints Thursday evening. He named the church officials as Hugh B. Brown and Nathan Eldon Tanner, first and second counselors respectively in the first presidency, the Mormon's second and third highest offices.

Fritz said the NAACP agreed on the promise of "good faith" not to picket the LDS 133rd semi-annual general conference on Temple Square entering its second day today when Brown and Tanner said they would "consider" endorsing a civil rights statement. But the NAACP will picket Temple Square next Saturday if the Mormon Church does not present an "acceptable" statement on civil rights before that date, he added.

Winchester Area Residents Vote Nov. 5 On Sanitation District Plan

Residents of the Winchester, Log Cabin and Sweetbriar areas will go to the polls Nov. 5 to vote on the proposed organization of the North Umpqua Sanitation District.

Officials of the Winchester Civic Club, who have spearheaded the drive for formation of the sanitation district, emphasized that residents in the proposed district should understand they are not being asked to vote on the installation of a sanitary sewer system, but rather on the formation of an official district to investigate the feasibility of such an installation.

Should a district be formed, a later vote would be held on the installation of a sewer system itself.

The Nov. 5 election will give residents of the three areas an opportunity to vote on two issues: (1) whether a district should be formed and (2) membership of a board of directors.

Funds Possible

If a legal body is formed, there is a possibility of getting matching funds from the federal government for the project under the

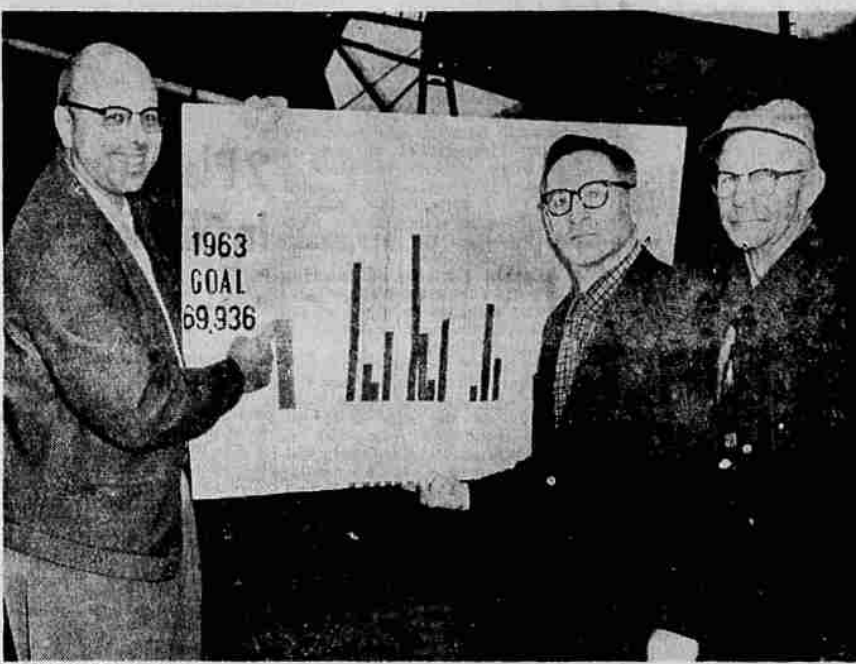

The basic boundary lines of the proposed district would be from the north end of the present North Roseburg Sanitary District to the North Umpqua River at Winchester, running to the freeway on the west and including the Sweetbriar area. In their planning of the tentative boundary lines, officials of the Winchester Civic Club elected to include the area south to the North Roseburg boundary in case a survey should show that connection to the North Roseburg district is the most feasible.

If a district is formed, a survey would be carried out under funds provided by the federal government. If residents then voted to install a sanitary sewer system, the district would repay the survey grant. If, however, they voted against the installation, the federal government would absorb the cost of the survey.

Problem Cited

As to the actual need for sanitary sewers in the areas involved, Douglas County Sanitarian Jack Osborne said the problem of open sewage in several areas has become acute—and has resulted in the sanitary division of the county

Pro-Castro Terrorists Launch Wave Of Violence In Venezuela

CARACAS, Venezuela (UPI) — Pro-Castro terrorists of the Armed Forces of National Liberation (FALN) staged a wave of violence in Caracas and several interior cities Friday night that left at least five dead and 10 wounded.

Police and military forces made at least 200 arrests.

The Communist-leaning FALN terrorists, in an apparent effort to challenge the government's massive countryside display of force in recent days, launched a series of coordinated hit-and-run attacks.

At one stage during the night, army patrol radios picked up an anguished cry of alarm from Pte. Rafael Angel Castillo, who reported that the patrol truck in which he was riding was being ambushed while stopped in the Lidice area. Lidice is a low income apartment house development in the western section of the city.

Suddenly, the frantic cries for help stopped and all that could be heard over the radio was the chatter of machine gun fire.

Fifteen minutes later, when reinforcements arrived, another soldier reported that Castillo had been killed in the ambush.

Almost simultaneously, reports began to come in to police headquarters from a dozen places in the city, where terrorists in speeding cars fired machine guns into crowds or at army or police sentries.

At one political meeting of the Accion Democratica, President Romulo Betancourt's party, four persons were wounded by machine gun fire at the workers' suburban development of El Valle.

Police stations in the Santa Rosa, Lidice and Casalta districts were fired on. There were at least a dozen cases where snipers

Big Baker Fire Is Under Control

BAKER (UPI) — Fire which burned over 9,000 acres of range and forest land in Eastern Oregon was brought under control Friday by Bureau of Land Management crews.

The blaze started Wednesday night during a lightning storm. Some 150 men were expected to mop up the fire today. Seven bulldozers, a helicopter and a mobile weather station from Pendleton were brought in to aid the fire fighters.

The BLM reported all other lightning-set fires in the eastern part of the state were under control today, including one which charred 600 acres on Sinking Water Mountain east of Burns.

Meanwhile rain in western Idaho halted a late-season outbreak of lightning set fires in Boise and Payette National Forests. A Forest Service dispatcher said about half the 35 fires reported were out and the others were under control.

U. S. Newsmen Take Beating As Monk Burns Self To Death

SAIGON (UPI) — A Buddhist monk burned himself to death in the central park square here today, increasing to six the number of such protest suicides since this country's "Buddhist crisis" began in May.

Reporters summoned to the scene by anonymous telephone calls saw the shaven-headed monk set fire to his yellow robe, which apparently had been soaked with gasoline. He sat on the pavement surrounding a traffic circle in the center of the square.

Thousands of Vietnamese rushed to the scene, while whistle-blowing police tried to keep newsmen and photographers away.

New York Times correspondent David Halberstam and two NBC men, newsmen Don Sharkey and television cameraman Grant Wolfkill, were beaten and kicked by police who seized Wolfkill's camera. Sharkey, who was hit over the head with a chair, suffered a scalp wound that took eight stitches to close.

The 50-year-old lumberman died instantly when his car apparently went out of control on U.S. Highway 97 about 35 miles north of Klamath Falls. The accident occurred at about 8 p.m.

Two Hurt

State police report the car, in which Kelsay was riding alone, left the highway, jumped back onto the pavement, then skidded broadside into a car coming from the other direction.
