Myrtle Creek's Vikings got the jump in the Umpqua Valley League football race Friday with a hard-fought victory over the visiting Glendale Pirates, 19-14.

Led by the running of Bob Beamblossom and Ron Westbrook, the Vikings tallied touchdowns in each of the first three periods. Beamblossom, running from his full-back slot, averaged just over six yards-per carry and sparked the offensive unit. Westbrook led the scoring for the winners with a pair of six pointers and one PAT run.

Along with Beamblossom, other defensive standouts receiving special mention from coach Gerry Hassett were Bruce Briggs, Ray Osborne and tackle Fred Pitt.

Bill Hubler, the UVL's top scorer in pre-league games, added to his season's total with a TD and one PAT. The Pirates moved the ball well on the ground, and came close to matching the yardage through the air.

In a thrill-packed finish the Pirates were knocking at the gate with what would have been the winning TD as the gun sounded ending the contest. The Pirates reached the Myrtle Creek seven-yard marker in the closing seconds, then hit paydirt only to have the play called back on a penalty.

Three five-yard penalties in the closing seconds put the visitors back to the Myrtle Creek 22 as the game ended.

The Vikings got the jump in the first quarter to move into a lead they never relinquished. Beamblossom provided the scoring punch when he evaded would be tacklers for the final 23 yards. Westbrook plunged into the end zone for the PAT.

Glendale came roaring back in the second period, with Hubler's one-yard drive putting six points on the scoreboard. Hubler smashed his way into the end zone for the PAT to tie the score at 7-all.

Late in the second quarter the Viks struck again, with Westbrook capping a drive by running over from one-yard out.

The winning points for the home team came in the third quarter when Westbrook broke loose and rambled 17 yards for his second tally of the game.

Fighting from behind the Pirates cashed in through the air for their second TD. Dick Watson picked off a five-yard aerial from H. B. Clark for the score and Wayne Troxel added the extra point on a run.

In losing, the Pirates gained a total of 404 yards not — 209 on the ground and 195 passing. The Viks rushed for 252 yards, 185 of which came in the first half, and picked up an additional 20 passing. Glendale completed 12 of 22 passes and Myrtle Creek hit on two of six attempts. The Pirates recorded the only interception of the game on Myrtle Creek's first play from scrimmage.

First downs favored the losers, 25-17. Both teams lost one fumble during the encounter. The Viks were penalized 50 yards on six penalties and the invaders had 35 yards marked off on five penalties.

Myrtle Creek punted three times for an average of 23.7 yards-per-kick, while Glendale's lone punt traveled 17 yards.

The game was the league opener for both teams, and both had identical 0-3 records in pre-conference duels. Today Sutherland will be at Douglas and Riddle will be at Glide to complete the first round of UVL play.

Canyonville Loses 34-19 Grid Contest

Andy Maurer, a rampaging 200-pound quarterback, spelled nothing but trouble for the Canyonville Tigers Friday in a non-league eight-man grid battle against the Prospect Cougars.

Maurer ran for four TDs, two PATs, passed for another six points and passed for an extra point in leading the Cougars to a decisive 34-19 triumph over the host Tigers.

The loss was Canyonville's first in four starts this season. Next week the Tigers will open South Oregon Eight-Man League play—and during conference outings they will get another crack at the rugged Prospect crew.

Both teams picked up seven points in a hard-fought first quarter, but the Cougars went on the rampage to score 20 points and ice the victory in the second stanza.

Maurer opened the scoring for the Cougars on a 35-yard gallop, then added TDs on runs of 40, one and 87 yards. Prospect's final six-pointer came on an 11 yard pass from Maurer to Jim Wayman. Jerry Wilson ran for one PAT and Maurer passed to John Scott for another.

The Tigers scored their first quarter TD when Steve Gardner climaxed a drive by powering his way over the goal line from five yards out and John Ringen snared a pass for the PAT.

In a fourth quarter surge the Tigers picked up two additional TDs, but could not come up with enough points to catch the visitors. Gardner tallied on a 62-yard pass-run combination from quarterback Mike Heath, and Heath dove into the end zone from the one-yard marker.

Maurer was the big-gun for the Cougars all afternoon. The 6-3, 200-pound sophomore worked out of the spread formation, throwing with either hand and showing amazing running power when he found an opening.

Oakland Oakers Top Crow 35-13 In League Contest

Oakland's Oakers poured on the coal in the third quarter to romp to a 35-13 victory over the invading Crow Cougars Friday in Bico-Trico B League action.

The victory was the fourth in a row for the powerful Oakers, and gives them a perfect 2-0 league record.

Leading by only one point at the halftime intermission, the host crew racked up 21 points in the third stanza to move completely out of reach of the Cougars.

The first time the Oakers got the ball in the first quarter they marched to the Crow seven before losing a fumble. The home team forced the visitors to punt, took over on the Crow 36 and marched to the TD. The big play of the drive was a 22-yard pass from Randy Manley to Kerney Manley. Fullback Jon Lamoreaux powered his way into the end zone from three yards out for the six points, then dove over for the PAT.

Crow scored in the second quarter when Robert Purdy pulled in a 28-yard pass from Jim Denker on a third and 18 situation.

In the powerful third quarter display by the Oakers, they took the opening kickoff and marched 60 yards in eight plays with Kerney Manley going over from 10 yards out. Keith Crenshaw ran the PAT. After forcing the Cougars to punt the Oakers went 59 yards for another TD when Randy Manley traveling the final five yards. Lamoreaux set up the TD with a 32-yard jaunt, and he provided the power for the PAT.

Getting their passing attack back into full gear, the Elkton Elks remained in strong contention for the Bico-Trico B League football crown Friday by rolling to an 18-6 triumph over the host Powers Cruisers.

Interim Group Studies Deer Herd

KLAMATH FALLS (UPI)—A two-state legislative interim committee Friday concluded a round of meetings on the interstate deer herd here. The meetings began in Yreka, Calif., Thursday.

The lawmakers from Oregon and California, concluded it was impossible to pin the blame for the decline of the herd on any one factor. The deer winter in California and summer in Oregon.

Several reasons were advanced for the decreasing deer population, including hunting pressure and the drought of 1960-61, which destroyed much of the browse.

Everett R. Doman, assistant regional forest director for the Klamath reserve, told the committee portions of forest land should be off-limits to cattlemen in order to build up the range for the deer.

Another meeting will be held at Baker, Nov. 6-8.

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
