

Southern Cal's Trojans Edge By Michigan State

Southern California has a long road to travel if it hopes to retain the national collegiate football championship this season and so far the path is full of detours.

The Trojans, beaten last week by Oklahoma, overcame a 10-point deficit Friday night to edge Michigan State, 13-10. Southern California was ranked ninth in the first United Press International ratings and just one more loss this year would kill the Trojan's chances for a second straight crown.

Southern Cal was listless and inefficient for the first three quarters before a home crowd of 39,137, but broke loose for two touchdowns in the final period to win its second game against one loss.

It took a 52-yard run by sophomore Mike Garrett to put the Trojans in the scoring column and veteran quarterback Pete Beathard took charge from there.

Leads Scoring Drive

Beathard, the hero of Southern Cal's victory over Wisconsin in the Rose Bowl last season, engineered a 69-yard drive which featured a 51-yard pass play to Willie Brown. The winning touch down came on a 16-yard pass from Beathard to Hal Bedsole.

Michigan State had dominated play for most of the game and took a 10-0 lead on a 38-yard first-period field goal by Lou Bobich and an 88-yard pass play from Steve Juday to Sherman Lewis in the third quarter.

In other games Friday night, Miami of Florida recorded its second consecutive shutout with a 19-0 decision over Tulane; Jack Concannon scored twice on short dashes to lead Boston College to a 20-12 triumph over Detroit; and

The Citadel overcame George Washington, 27-22.

Tackle Robert Brown recovered a fumble in the end zone for Miami's only touchdown and Don Cifra booted a 33-yard field goal. It was the 14th straight defeat for Tulane.

Several of today's big games will be centered in the Midwest with Army and Navy both testing their early-season successes against Big Ten teams and Notre Dame tangling with Purdue at Lafayette, Ind.

The nationally televised game matches Duke and Maryland in an Atlantic Coast Conference affair at Richmond, Va. Defending conference champion Duke is favored by seven points.

Oklahoma, the No. 1 team in the nation, is idle this weekend. Second-ranked Alabama and third-ranked Texas both face easy tasks in contests tonight.

Alabama is a 23-point favorite over winless Vanderbilt at Nashville, Tenn., and Texas, scheduled to meet Oklahoma next week, is a 22-point choice at home in a workout against Oklahoma State.

Army, easy winner in its first two games, is a six-point underdog at Minnesota, and seventh-ranked Navy, also boasting a 2-0 record, is a seven-point favorite at Michigan. Purdue and Notre Dame are rated even-money.

In important Big Ten clashes, fourth-ranked Northwestern is seven over Illinois and 10th-ranked Ohio State is rated six over Indiana.

Georgia Tech, the No. 6 team in the nation, is favored by five points over Louisiana State; eighth-ranked Pittsburgh is picked by 13½ over California, and Nebraska, which shares the No. 10 spot with Ohio State, is listed as 13 points better than Iowa State.

Oregon State Is Favored Over Baylor Bears Tonight

PORTLAND (UPI)—The Baylor Bears, winners of seven of eight games against Pacific Coast football teams in the past, throw the aerial wizardry of quarterback Don Trull against Oregon State tonight.

Trull led the nation a year ago with 125 pass completions for 1,627 yards, but Oregon State coaches hope they can match him with junior Gordon Queen.

Queen has thrown six touchdown passes in his first two games this fall as a replacement for graduated Heisman Trophy winner Terry Baker.

Neither team has been beaten this year. Baylor clipped Houston 27-0 in its opener last weekend.

Fernandez KO's DeNucci

BOSTON (UPI) — Pretty nearly everything happened when Cuban Florentino Fernandez won his 36th fight and 30th by a knockout.

A five-alarm fire broke out less than a block from Boston Arena shortly before the nationally televised battle Friday night. This produced a mile-square traffic tieup.

But the fun really began when Fernandez, of Miami, cooled middleweight opponent Joe De Nucci of nearby Newton at 2:30 of the fourth round.

Half a dozen youths, waving a Cuban flag and a banner appealing for funds to fight communism, leaped into the ring.

A handful of apparently local rowdies jumped into the ring after the first wave. Fighting broke out in the ring, on the apron, in the press section, and in the stands, where 1,121 paying customers were seated. A few chairs and other debris were thrown.

Police moved in. The unscheduled fighters either scattered or were ejected.

Fernandez went home with a \$4,500 check, most of it from the television receipts. De Nucci, knocked down for the first time in his 43-bout career, got the same amount, once he was revived. And the chances were that the licking ended his television career if not his professional boxing campaign.

Fernandez, almost casual while dominating the first three rounds of the scheduled 10-rounder, said he had begun to wonder how De Nucci withstood his body combinations.

Balding, Phil Rodgers Tied For Whitewash Lead

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — Canadian Al Balding fashioned a four-under-par 68 and ex-Marine Phil Rodgers shot a 70 to share the 36-hole lead with 138 going into today's third round of the \$125,000 Whitewash Open.

Balding, a 39-year-old pro from Toronto, said "all I did was make a lot of putts" Friday during his 33-35 round that trimmed two strokes from his first day, two-under-par 70 at the Whitewash Valley Country Club.

Rodgers, 25, Perdido Bay, Fla., used "common sense" to combat a stiff wind on the 6,807-yard course and had a two-under-par 70 to add to his first-round 68.

Mason Rodgers, Lehigh Acres, Fla., the first-round leader with a 67, slipped to a par 72 and tied for second place with Tommy Jacobs, Bermuda Dunes, Calif. with 139.

The field of some 140 pros and one amateur was cut to the low 75 for the final two rounds. Survivors in the cutoff at 151 included Arnold Palmer, this year's leading money winner, who had a 36-hole, 70-71 for 141; Jack Nicklaus,

who had 148 after soaring to 77 in the second round; Julius Boros, 73-75 for a 148, and South Africa's Gary Player, 71-72 for 143.

Gene Littler, Rancho Bernardo, Calif., was tied with Palmer for third with 69-72—141. Doug Sanders, Ojai, Calif.; Terry Dill, Hot Springs, Ark., and Harold Kneese, Aiken, S.C., were tied at 142.

Don January, Walnut, Calif.; Sam Snead of White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., and Roger Glinesberg, Alpine, N.J., were tied with Player at 143.

Don Larsen, Larry Sherry Appear Headed For Mets, Colts To Bolster NL Expansion

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — Former World Series heroes Don Larsen and Larry Sherry were regarded today as among likely candidates to be served up to the stragglers New York Mets and Houston Colts in a National League move to bolster the expansion teams.

National League president Warren Giles announced Friday night after a 2½-hour NL meeting that all of the top eight teams would make four players available to the Mets and Colts. The tailenders can choose one of the four in alternate bidding, with the Mets winning the first choice by the toss of the coin.

Names also reported to be included on the tentative list were third baseman Don Hoak and pitcher Ryne Duren of Philadelphia; pitchers Harvey Haddix and Elroy Face and shortstop Johnny Logan of the Pittsburgh Pirates; pitchers Bobby Shantz and Sam Jones of St. Louis; infielder Charlie Neal of Cincinnati, and pitchers Billy Pierce and Billy Hoeltz of San Francisco.

Unofficial sources said either Larsen or Pierce was regarded as expendable by San Francisco in the player pool.

In effect, the plan — which stipulates players named must have been carried on rosters Aug. 31 and bring a price of \$30,000 each — assures the eight clubs participating of losing no more than one man. But it also provides these teams with an option to give up any of the four nominees to the Mets and Colts.

Paul Richards, Houston general manager who originally made the proposal to assist the 9th and 10th place teams, said the "spirit of this new plan is fine, but what the quality will be remains to be seen. We'll only know that when we see the identity of the 32 players placed on the list."

Met general manager George Weiss also was cautious in his optimism.

American League officials took no action at all in a similar meeting to discuss the plight of their expansion teams, Washington and Los Angeles.

The NL players, in addition to Sherry of the Dodgers, 1959 World Series hero — and Larsen of the Giants (of 1955 perfect game fame), won't be known until the list is officially submitted to Giles no later than Oct. 14.

But unofficial sources provided names of at least four players per team.

They were:

Philadelphia: Hoak, first baseman Frank Torre, catcher Bob Oldis and Duren.

Milwaukee: Pitcher Ron Piche, infielder Lou Kinchick, and outfielders Bob Taylor and Don Dillard.

San Francisco: Pitchers Hoeltz, Jack Fisher, Pierce and-or Larsen.
