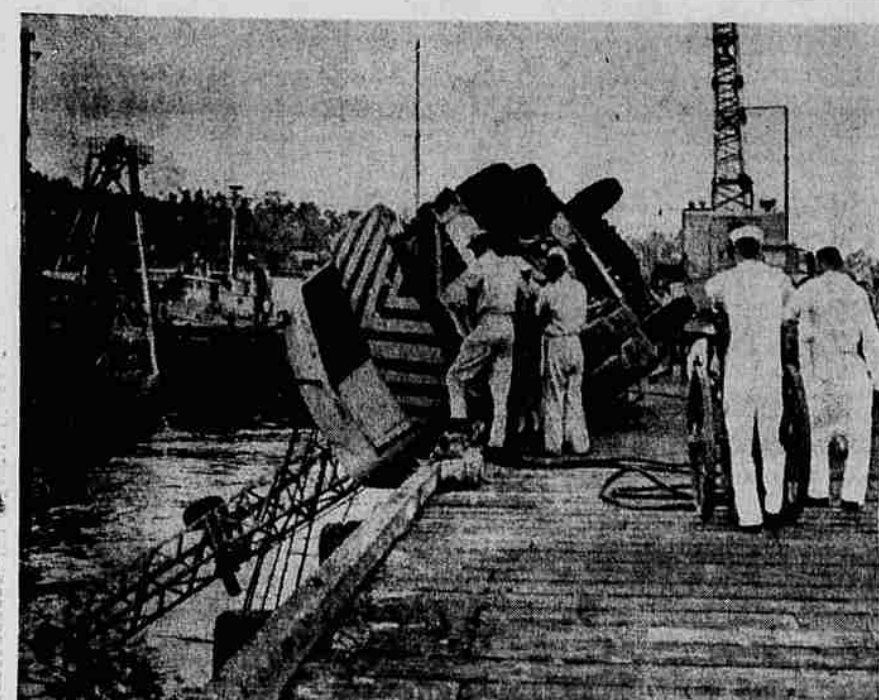

Legislator Charges Sales Tax Campaign Is Real Issue Involved In Tax Referral

SALEM (UPI)—The campaign to get a sales tax in Oregon is the real issue involved in the Oct. 15 tax referendum election, Rep. Ross Morgan, D-Gresham, charged Sunday.

He voiced the opinion at a luncheon during the Democratic State Central Committee meeting held here.

"Some people want a sales tax so bad they are willing to sell the state down the river to get one," Morgan said.

Morgan, who was co-chairman of the legislature's Ways and Means Committee, urged support of the tax measure, and warned "a no vote will set the whole state back."

Kennedy Inks Test Treaty

Heart Attacks Prove Fatal To 2 Hunters

Dodgers Pulled Miracle In Winning World Series

Pledges U.S. Will Retain Vigilance

Two Douglas County men suffered fatal heart attacks while hunting over the weekend and a Grants Pass man is reported in critical condition at Forest Glen Hospital from a gunshot wound through the abdomen.

State police listed Everett Lewis Griffith, 75, of Winston, and Clarence Miller, 63, of Azalea as the heart attack victims.

Howard Franklin Shamel, 49, of Grants Pass, suffered an accidental gunshot wound while reportedly hunting with his brother Lewis Shamel of Grants Pass. The accident occurred Sunday afternoon on Elk Creek in Eden Valley, near the Josephine-Douglas County line.

Details of the accident itself were lacking, but a report from Shamel's examining physician stated the bullet traveled through his liver, stomach and spleen. He lost a lot of blood, as it was about 2 1/2 hours from the time of the wound until he arrived at the hospital by ambulance.

Blood Needed

A call was sent to the Red Cross in Roseburg by investigating state police, and a sheriff's deputy rushed blood from Roseburg for the stricken man.

According to state police, Griffith had parked his car on Hoover Hill Road. When he returned to his car he fell on the west shoulder of the road, where his body was found about 5:20 p.m., Sunday. He still had his rifle in his hand. (See obituary page 2).

Miller was the subject of an all-night search, when he failed to return to a meeting point with a party of four other hunters.

Correspondent Mrs. Gerald B. Fox reports Miller was hunting with his son David, and Lawrence Worley and his two sons, Clifford and Darrell, all of Azalea, Saturday afternoon.

Plan Arranged

They had driven up Russell Creek Road about 5 p.m. to a point where the bridge had washed out, then walked on. The two older men were to take up positions on either side of the canyon, while the younger men drove the deer in their direction.

When Miller failed to rejoin the group, a party of about 50 persons was organized, and they searched from 8 p.m. until 3:30 a.m., then resumed searching about 7:30. Miller's body was found about 8:30 a.m. on a little hill with his gun across his lap.

His body was taken to Ganz Mortuary at Myrtle Creek, and funeral services will be held Tuesday at 2 p.m. at Ganz Chapel. Rev. Arnold Dalke of the Azalea Community Church will officiate, and interment will follow in the Masonic Cemetery in Canyonville.

Heart History Bad

Miller was born Feb. 19, 1900, at Utopia, Kan. He came to the Azalea area in 1937 from Castile, Calif., and had followed carpentry and logging, but was semi-retired. He had a history of heart trouble.

Surviving are his wife, Bernadine Nowlan, Azalea, whom he married Nov. 11, 1939 at Juarez, Mexico; six children, Velma Robertson, Kelsey, Calif.; Yvonne Minear, Kelsey, Wash.; Ronald Miller, Lebanon, Wyo.; John and Sharon Owens, Eureka, Calif.; two grandchildren and four great-grandchildren; two sisters, Mrs. Orlo (Marjorie) Fisher, Salem, and Mrs. Frank (Eileen) Fisher, Azalea, and a brother, Ted Miller, Salem.

Cuba Still Refuses To Sign Test Pact

UNITED NATIONS, N.Y. (UPI)—Cuba announced today that it will not sign the Moscow nuclear test ban treaty until the United States changes its policy toward Fidel Castro's government.

Cuban Ambassador Carlos Lechuga, in a policy speech prepared for delivery in the General Assembly, said also that Castro's government would oppose a denuclearized zone for Latin America unless the United States gave up its Guantanamo Bay base and included the Panama Canal Zone, Puerto Rico and other military bases in the hemisphere in any such agreement.

Lechuga denounced U.S. intervention in Viet Nam, demanded freedom for Puerto Rico, called President Kennedy's alliance for Progress a failure and drew attention to military takeovers occurring in Latin America.

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—It was a baseball miracle, but the Los Angeles Dodgers pulled it off to erase the last remaining vestiges of a choke-up stigma that had haunted them for nearly a year.

They swept the World Series from the once-proud-and-mighty New York Yankees in the face of odds that were 23-1 against them.

But the oddsmakers didn't figure on that gill-edged Dodger pitching, timely hitting and a surprisingly proud Yankee defense which yielded a seventh-inning gift run that enabled the Dodgers to win the fourth game, 2-1 Sunday, with Sandy Koufax pitching another masterpiece.

Actually, the Yankees' Whitey Ford pitched better, yielding only two hits, but the highly-touted Yankee defense let him down.

It was a bitter defeat for the Yankees—the first time they ever had been swept in the 28 Series in which they have played.

To the Dodgers the victory was especially sweet for it wiped out the memory of their 1962 collapse when they lost the National League pennant after having it apparently wrapped up.

Manager Walter Alton of the Dodgers, whose job may have been in jeopardy had he not won the series, admitted he was as surprised as anyone by the Los Angeles sweep.

"I never figured we'd do it in four," said the happy Alton. "I never gave much thought about how many games it would take to win, but if someone had asked me I'd have said six or seven."

Manager Ralph Houk was surprised, too.

Before the series he said he didn't look for either team to win it in four games "because we are so evenly matched."

"The Dodgers have a great club," added Houk, who suffered his first series defeat. "As soon as my players came into the dressing room after the game, I told them they're going to be winning a lot more in the future."

He refused to single out any Yankee player for blame.

As soon as he spoke to his players, Houk went into the Dodger clubhouse to congratulate Alton and the Dodgers.

"If we had to lose," said Houk, a champion in defeat, "I'm glad it was to a club like the Dodgers. I'm glad for Alton. After the frustrating season they had the year before if somebody else had to win I'm happy it was a club like the Dodgers that won."

Houk was nettled by whispers and even some opinions expressed right out that the Yankees did not belong in the same league as the Dodgers.

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—General Manager Roy Hamey emphasized there is "no panic" among the beaten Yankees today and that they probably will stand pat this winter because he still thinks they are the finest club in baseball.

Hamey thus put a prompt stop to any thought the Yankees might make wholesale changes because the Dodgers bowled them over in four straight World Series games.

"Why should we look to make a lot of trades or changes simply because the Dodgers beat us?" he asked. "That's no reason for any panic. We still think we have the best club. We're satisfied."

The Yankee General Manager did add, however, that the club might be interested in obtaining another catcher to back up Elston Howard and possibly another outfielder "if the right man is available."

Most of the Yankees' concern now centers around Mickey Mantle's unpredictable underpinning.

"Everything is 'Okay,'" said Hamey. "If Mickey is okay, then we're okay, too." Hamey said. "All things considered, I thought he did very well in the series."

Within the next few days, Mantle will undergo examination of his left knee to determine whether or not surgery is necessary. If it is, he will be operated on shortly; if it isn't, he will go to Dallas, play golf and follow the fortunes of the Oklahoma football team.

The loss by the Yankees to the Dodgers was the first World Series setback for Manager Ralph Houk, who had racked up three straight American League pennants and two World Series triumphs before running afoul of the Dodgers.

"I think Ralph (Houk) did an outstanding job all year," Hamey said for the express benefit of those who might try to portray the Yankee manager as the scapegoat in his club's four straight defeats.

"That goes for the rest of our players, too," he continued. "You don't scuttle the ship simply because you run into one spell of bad weather."

Comforted Pepitone

The Yankees, with a long-standing habit of never gloating when they win or allying if they lose, all sought to comfort forlorn Joe Pepitone, who shouldered the blame for Sunday's 2-1 defeat in the finale.

"I'm sure Joe feels badly now but when he thinks about it he certainly shouldn't," said second baseman Bobby Richardson. "You can't catch what you can't see."

Pepitone said he couldn't see third baseman Cleto Boyer's seventh-inning throw which he allowed to get by him for a three-base error that led to the winning run.

"I just lost it in the crowd," Pepitone confessed. "The throw was perfect. I should have had it but I didn't see it."

Regardless of that bobble, a rather costly one in that it could mean a difference of \$4,000 to each Yankee player, they still think Pepitone is the best fielding first baseman in the American League and possibly in the majors.

Space Travelers Expected To Wed

MOSCOW (UPI)—Moscow buzzed today with reports that Soviet cosmonaut Andrian Nikolayev and pioneer spacewoman Valentina Tereshkova will marry.

Well-informed sources said the dimpled, 26-year-old Valentina will wed the handsome, 33-year-old "most eligible Soviet bachelor" early this winter.

Russians have been calling them "the star crossed lovers" for months.

There was no formal announcement. But reports of the engagement came from Moscow's suburban "space town," the community of Soviet cosmonauts.

The romance was no surprise. Even as Miss Tereshkova was orbiting the earth to become the world's first woman in space last June, there were reports that there was more than professional comradeship in her friendship with Nikolayev, who had joined Pavel Popovich in the first joint flight of two spaceships the previous August.

Valentina now is on a tour of Cuba. Nikolayev is living at the space town.

400 Are Dead In Flora's Wake

MIAMI (UPI)—Deadly Hurricane Flora made a slow turn northward today and then stalled once again over flooded eastern Cuba to inflict a fourth day of punishment on the region that produces most of the island's food.

Cuban Premier Fidel Castro arrived at Santiago, capital of Oriente, to take personal command of relief operations which appeared from radio reports to be blocked by the continued pounding of torrential rains.

Radio reports of crop and livestock losses, monitored here, began to reach disaster proportions. At noon, EDT, the Miami Weather Bureau located the hurricane's center south of Camaguey, about halfway between the city and the southern coast. This was about the same location the storm took up early today after it drifted slightly northward.

"The steering currents surrounding the hurricane remain quite weak and variable so movement will be very slow," the Weather Bureau said. "However, there are some indications of a trend to a slow northward drift at not more than five miles per hour beginning late today or tonight."

The Weather Bureau warned all interests north of the storm, "particularly the Bahamas," to maintain vigilance.

Carlos Rafael Rodriguez, president of Cuba's Agrarian Reform Institute, reported to the nation on Havana Radio this morning that half of Cuba's rice crop, 25 to 50 per cent of the cotton crop and 40 million pounds of corn had been destroyed. Rodriguez also said poultry farms of central and eastern Cuba had suffered "enormous damage." Chicken and rice are the main staples of the Cuban diet.

Earlier, unofficial radio reports estimated 90 per cent of Cuba's coffee crop, which had just reached maturity in the Oriente mountains, had been destroyed.

Flora's highest winds, which reached 140 m.p.h. when it hit Haiti last Tuesday and caused at least 400 deaths, decreased to 85 m.p.h. today when the center moved back over land.

The winds, however, blew away the Cuban Weather Bureau's recording equipment at the Camaguey Airport.

"The things which happened to us in the field could have happened to anyone," he reasoned.

Excuses Pepitone's Error

Thus did he excuse the downcast Joe Pepitone's failure to hold a throw from third baseman Cleto Boyer which would have retired Jim Gilliam in the seventh inning. As it was, Pepitone lost the ball in the crowd background of the left field stands, and Gilliam raced all the way to third on the error. A few seconds later, Gilliam scored the winning run after Willie Davis fled deep to Mickey Mantle.

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Chinese Red Asks For Soviet Haven

TOKYO (UPI)—A member of a Chinese Communist trade delegation stole out of his Tokyo hotel room before dawn today, drove to the Soviet Embassy, scaled the embassy wall and asked for political asylum.

The Russians promptly granted asylum to Peking interpreter Chou Hong-ching, 44, and refused to turn him over to Japanese immigration authorities, threatening to touch off a major diplomatic incident between Japan and Russia.

At the same time, the chief of the Red Chinese delegation, Tao Heng-hsien, informed the Japanese government he would not leave this country until the defector was returned to Red Chinese custody. Tao is chief secretary of Communist China's elite Engineering Academy.

The Japanese immigration authorities asked the Russians to turn the defector over to them because Chou's visa expired Sunday.

The Soviet Embassy refused.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Kennedy today signed papers formally ratifying the nuclear test ban treaty with a vow that "if it fails it will not be our doing."

"And even if it fails," the President said, "we shall not regret" having signed the treaty which he called "a message of hope for all the world."

The President pledged the United States to "the letter and spirit" of the treaty outlawing all but underground tests. He urged others to do the same.

But he vowed the United States "can and must keep our vigilance" under terms of the treaty, which has been signed by more than 100 nations since it first was signed by the United States, Russia, and Great Britain in Moscow in early August.

Kennedy signed four copies—one for each of the governments of the three original signers of the treaty and one to be put in the U.S. National Archives.

He signed the first copy at 10:04 a.m., EDT in the historic Treaty Room of the White House.

Kennedy said that in the first decade of nuclear energy there has been fear and some hope about how the awesome power would be used.

"Today fear is a little less—hope a little greater," he said in a statement.

Kennedy was flanked by members of Congress, Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson, Secretary of State Dean Rusk and other members of the administration involved in the long process of negotiation and ratification, including Undersecretary of State Averell Harriman, the U.S. negotiator in the test ban talks in Moscow.

Senate Republican Leader Everett Dirksen, Ill., whose Senate speech in favor of ratification helped overcome some of the Senate opposition to the treaty, was among those receiving the 16 pens used in the ceremony.

Kennedy said that what the future will bring in the nuclear field "no one of us will know."

But he said that even if the limited treaty is to succeed all nations must keep both the letter and spirit of the agreement.

"If it fails, it will not be our doing," he said.

Effective Thursday

The pact goes into effect Thursday when the three countries that drew it up deposit their ratification documents in each other's capital.

Kennedy said that "and even if it fails we shall not regret" having signed it.

The Senate voted, 80-19, on Sept. 24 to ratify the treaty.

Critical Mme. Nhu Draws Sharp Rebuke From Father

NEW YORK (UPI)—Mme. Ngu Dinh Nhu Sunday sharply criticized U.S. officials in South Viet Nam and was, in turn, sharply criticized by her father, their country's former ambassador to the United States.

Mme. Nhu and the father, Tran Van Chuong, spoke in separate television interviews about the troubled political situation in the Southeast Asian nation.

The controversial Mme. Nhu, sister-in-law of South Viet Nam President Ngo Dinh Diem, charged that U.S. officials in the country gave the impression of being merely "spectators of a snow."

"They do not give us the impression they are actually fighting with us," she said on a program which was filmed in her hotel suite in Paris.

Denounces Statements

Chuong, who resigned in protest against the Diem regime and its policies, denounced the statements of his daughter as "a very sad case of power madness."

Flora regime, he said, "is so backward, inefficient and oppressive that it has become the greatest asset to the Communists and the biggest obstacle to victory in Viet Nam."

Chuong appeared on a recorded interview with Sen. Kenneth B. Keating, R-N.Y., who renewed his call for a full congressional investigation of the situation in South Viet Nam.

Mme. Nhu said there are "junior" U.S. officials in South Viet Nam who "are betraying the official policies of the American government" by talking openly about the possible overthrow of her brother-in-law's regime.

Many of these officials, she said, publicly discussed their attempts to "kick away" former U.S. Ambassador Frederick E. Nolting, who preceded Henry Cabot Lodge in the Saigon post.

Damages Relationship

She said Lodge's recent criticism of her may not have impaired his relationship with Diem, but has damaged "his relationship with me."

"But maybe I am a good girl and maybe I am a fool," she said, of Lodge's remarks.

Madame Nhu was asked what she might say to President Kennedy if she gets the opportunity to see him during her forthcoming visit to the United States. She replied:

"I think I shall be satisfied to say to him 'Bonjour' (good day), and the rest will come according to the inspiration of the moment."

Chuong predicted that his daughter would spearhead "an all-out propaganda effort in the United States" to publicize the Diem viewpoint. She was, he said, "the strongest headline capturer in Viet Nam."

Algeria Tightens Line Around Rebs

ALGIERS, Algeria (UPI)—Troops loyal to Premier Ahmed Ben Bella tightened a machine-gun cordon today around the mountain stronghold of 8,000 tough Berber rebels who threaten the nation with civil war.

The first major uprising in Algeria's one-year history as an independent nation has so far been almost exclusively a war of words.

Shots were fired for the first time last Friday, when a rebel soldier was wounded and six loyalists captured.

Ben Bella's troops, dressed in battle garb, set up roadblocks around Bida and on the highways to Medea, Michelet, Berrouaghia and Boufarik in an attempt to seal off the insurgents. Patrols fanned out overland.

There were indications Ben Bella was planning to try end the week-old "war" soon by moving with force against the rebels.

The rebels accuse Ben Bella of setting up a dictatorship and ignoring the 2 million Berbers who make up one-sixth of Algeria's population.

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
