Palmer Captains American Ryder Cup Golf Contingent

ATLANTA (UPI) — John Fallon, non-playing captain of the British Ryder Cup team, indicated today he may gamble with youth in an effort to beat the Americans for the first time in this century.

In a surprise move Monday, Fallon teamed Welshman Brian Huggett and Scotsman George Will, a pair of 26-year-old golfers, making their first Ryder Cup appearances. Alternating with the same ball, they responded with an unofficial 67 on the par 70 East Lake Country Club course.

It had been generally expected that Fallon would pair the young golfers with veterans. But although his move was just an experiment the fact that the Huggett-Will team was five strokes better than any other British twosome Monday indicated the experiment was a success.

Fallon is looking for a combination to send against American captain Arnold Palmer and whoever his playing mate will be in at least four sets of foursomes Friday and Saturday — the first two days of the three-day, 32-match Ryder Cup tournament.

For the singles on Sunday, when Palmer expected to play in two of the 16 matches, Fallon may match him with husky Peter Alliss, 32-year-old son of former Ryder Cupper Percy Alliss.

Britain has beaten the United States in only three of 14 previous Ryder Cup matches and never in this century. One of the chief reasons has been the British inability to score well in the foursomes. Last time they were

outscored 6-2 in the foursome and only by one match in 16 singles. When they last won, in 1957, it was by dominating the singles matches.

Battered Rams Prep For Bears

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The Los Angeles Rams looked just about as battered as their record would indicate today as they continued drills for Sunday's game with the Chicago Bears.

Five players had X-rays: Jon Arnett and Dick Bass for sore backs; Lamar Lundy, a shoulder separation; Joe Seibell for possible kidney injury; and David Jones, for a finger injury on his right hand. All X-rays proved negative, although the injuries were painful.

Jim Phillips and Ed Meador suffered slight concussions in the game with Green Bay and Don Chuy had a broken nose. All probably will play this weekend, but reserve center Ken Kirk is out of the Chicago game with a pulled hamstring muscle.

The Rams have lost all four of their National Football League games.

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Sandy Koufax Unanimous All-Star Pick

NEW YORK (UPI) — Sandy Koufax, the Los Angeles Dodgers' 25-game winner and World Series pitching hero, was the only unanimous selection today on the United Press International's 1963 major league All-Star team.

The 27-year-old left-hander, who beat the New York Yankees twice in the World Series after a season during which he struck out 306 batters, pitched 11 shutouts and compiled a 1.88 earned run average, was named by all 24 experts who participated in the UPI's post-season survey.

Also selected on the team were catcher Elston Howard, second baseman Bobby Richardson and pitcher Whitey Ford of the American League champion Yankees, first baseman Bill White, shortstop Dick Groat and third baseman Ken Boyer of the St. Louis Cardinals, and outfielders Hank Williams of the Milwaukee Braves, Willie Mays of the San Francisco Giants and Al Kaline of the Detroit Tigers.

The endurance to maintain top-quality performance over the gruelling 162-game, day-night, two-night doubleheader schedule concocted by baseball moguls was a major factor in the selection of the team. Howard caught in 135 games — a very high total for a catcher — and every other player on the team played in at least 145 games.

Howard hit 28 homers while driving in 85 runs and hitting .287 for a rock-like season performance and Richardson hit .265 in 151 games as the key pivotman in the brilliant Yankee defense during the regular season.

White batted .304 with 27 homers and 109 runs batted in. Groat hit .319 with six homers and 73 rbi's while providing the spark that carried the Cardinals to second place in the NL, and Boyer batted .285 with 24 homers and 103 rbi's and Kaline had 27 homers and 101 rbi's.

Redskin's Boss Says Cleveland Not NFL Shoo-In

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Will the Cleveland Browns make a runaway out of the National Football League's Eastern division?

Cast a dissenting vote from a coach whose team was one of the four whipped by the unbeaten Browns — Bill McPeak of the Washington Redskins.

"Cleveland is no myth," McPeak conceded. "But I think they can and will be licked before the season is over. The Browns are riding an emotional crest right now. They want to win for Blanton Collier and they're playing as good football as they will all year."

McPeak believes the Eastern race won't jell for another two or three weeks.

"It's a pretty even division," Bill allowed. "Philadelphia should have beaten Pittsburgh in their opener, you can't count out the (St. Louis) Cardinals with 56 points against the Vikings, and frankly we should have licked New York last Sunday."

"Before the season, if I could have picked one game I expected to win it would have been our own opener against Cleveland," McPeak said. "The Browns really surprised us. Someone told us they held three squad meetings before they played us, meetings in which the players all talked about having to win for Collier."

McPeak was not discounting his own team's chances, either, despite a 2-2 record including Sunday's loss to the Giants. At this time last year, Washington led the conference with three victories and a tie.

"Right now, we're a better football team than we were last season," Bill insisted. "After four games in '62, we were still just a two-man team — Norman Snead and Bobby Mitchell. This year we've got a more solid defense and a more varied offense. If we can get our passing to click better, we'll beat anyone."

MOSCOW, Idaho (UPI) — Coach Dee Andros of Idaho today commented that his team would have to score plenty to keep up with the rugged Oregon Ducks in their battle Saturday.

"We've got a lot of work to do on offense," he said, reflecting on Saturday's 24-0 loss to Missouri. Andros sent his team through running drills Monday.

SEATTLE (UPI) — Washington, which has lost three straight close battles, today worked out for Saturday's tussle against unbeaten Oregon State.

The first two units Monday worked on the quarterback option play. It was this play that Iowa repeatedly diagnosed and stopped while turning in an upset 17-7 win last Saturday.

CORVALLIS, Ore. (UPI) — Oregon State coach Tommy Prothro warns his squad that winless Washington will be "high" for Saturday's Beaver-Husky battle at Seattle.

Oregon State has rolled up 10 straight wins since dropping a 14-13 decision to Washington last season. The Beavers edged Baylor 22-15 with a last-second touchdown in a Saturday thriller.

Prothro sent his Beavers through a closed-gate practice session Monday.

EUGENE, Ore. (UPI) — Guards Aneur Haggerty and Don Cadenasso were today considered doubtful participants for Oregon in Saturday's game against Idaho.

Haggerty suffered a bruised knee and Cadenasso a deep leg gash as the Ducks blitzed West Virginia 35-9 in their best game of the season Saturday.

Guards Dale Wilson and Mark Richards, also banged up in the West Virginia game, probably will be ready for the Idaho contest.

Coach Len Casanova sent his team through a short workout in full gear Monday.

STANFORD, Calif. (UPI) — Sophomore quarterback Mike Connelly worked out with the Stanford first team Monday in lieu of injured starter Clark Weaver.

Weaver, hurt during Saturday's game against UCLA, may be out for the season.

Ragsdale also ran through plays at his old position and is expected to see some duty there. In fact, coach John Ralston says that Ragsdale is probably his best runner and defensive back and will play as much as possible in future games.

Johnny Boyd To Present Highway Safety Program To RHS Students

The nationally recognized Champion Highway Safety Program, featuring Johnny Boyd, will be presented at Roseburg High School Friday at 9:30 a.m.

Boyd, a veteran of 17 years in auto racing, and an Indianapolis competitor for nine consecutive years will present the program here through the sponsorship of Jackson and Giles Motor Parts.

Boyd was sidelined with mechanical problems early in the 1963 Indianapolis 500 after finishing 10th in 1962. In placing 10th, Boyd started from the 28th position. He is a member of the Champion 100-Mile-A-Hour Club, reserved for those drivers who complete the 500 miles at Indianapolis without relief at an average speed of more than 100 miles per hour.

He is one of eight Indianapolis drivers who spend the school year talking to teenagers throughout the nation. In the presentation, Boyd will stress the responsibilities a driver's license implies.

"We try to avoid the usual do's and don'ts of driving, Boyd says. 'Instead we hammer home points of attitude and responsibility. Most teenagers are excellent drivers with good reflexes and good sense. It's the tire burner, the show-off,

who by his selfish and 'look at me' attitude gives the wrong impression of the group."

In his program, Boyd points out that if drivers would use the same degree of courtesy and mental alertness which is dominant in auto racing, and keep their cars in as good mechanical condition, it would produce a noticeable drop in highway fatalities.

The Champion Highway Safety Program is sponsored by the Champion Spark Plug Co. The program was started in 1954, and since then has been presented to more than 5,000 high schools and nearly five million teenagers.

Boyd will be coached by Tom Keel, Keel stated that the sessions in October will be reserved for training and viewing team prospects, with the actual competition to being in November. He also added that boys and girls are needed in all age groups.

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Sooners Selected Top College 11

NEW YORK (UPI) — Oklahoma maintained its grip on first place and Texas vaulted past Alabama into second spot among the nation's major collegiate football powers today in the weekly ratings of the United Press International board of coaches.

The Longhorns' advance suddenly made their meeting with the Sooners this Saturday at the Cotton Bowl in Dallas a clash between the two top rated college teams in the nation.

Penn State was the only newcomer to the first 10 in the major college list, jumping from 13th to eighth with a 28-7 victory over Rice.

Pittsburgh, Navy and Ohio State also moved up inside the top 10 while upset victims Northwestern and Georgia Tech tumbled to the second ten. The Panthers jumped from eighth to fourth, Navy from sixth to fifth and Ohio State from a 10th place tie to seventh.

Wisconsin, idle last week, held its No. 5 position, Southern California remained No. 9 and Nebraska, tied with the Buckeyes for 10th last week, took over sole possession to complete the 10 elite.

The Sooners, idle last week after their upset of defending national champion Southern California two weeks ago, will be healthy and rested for college football's biggest game of the young season Saturday. They received 21 of the 35 first place votes and totaled 32 points.

Texas trounced Oklahoma State 34-7 to gain the nod over Alabama by the 35-man board of coaches, although the Crimson Tide received seven first place votes to only two for the Longhorns. 'Bama defeated outclassed Vanderbilt, 21-6, but was unimpressive.

Amazing Roger Staubach navigated Navy up a notch with a 26-13 win over Michigan and received one first place vote. Pitt garnered two first place ballots and Ohio State the other.

Texas was a distant second in the 10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1 point distribution for votes from first to 10th places, totalling 257. Alabama had 251 points, Pitt 165 and Wisconsin 151.

Illinois, Arkansas, Oregon and Kansas broke into the top 20 for the first time this season.

Mississippi headed the second 10 for the second week followed by the Illini, upset winners over Northwestern, Duke, Georgia Tech, Northwestern, Oregon State, Arkansas and Missouri. Oregon and Kansas tied for 19th.

Ohio State, No. 7, meets 12th-ranked Illinois this weekend in the only other pairing of top 20 teams.

Another change could take place at quarterback, where Bob by Waters had a rough day last Sunday.

Christiansen says that he will look at Waters and Lamar McHan in practice this week and start whoever looks better.

There was little question the offense needed shaking up after it piled up 61 yards total offense and minus 10 yards passing last Sunday. Both were all-time team lows.
