Mike Crunican paced the Roseburg Indians to victory in the Pilot Invitational cross country meet hosted by Canyonville Bible Academy.

Crunican won the varsity race with a clocking of 12:05 over the two and a quarter mile course. This was a new course record—the fourth in a row set by the Roseburg senior. The old course record at Canyonville was 12:57 set by CBA's Roger Schaffer in 1962.

Ragsdale Back At Quarterback To Lead Charging Stanford 11

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI)—Handy-man Dick Ragsdale, who does everything except whistle at the girls for the Stanford football team, had a new job today—an other new one, that is.

Ragsdale was named by coach John Ralston as one of the men who will handle the quarterbacking chores for the Indians when they meet Rice in Houston Sat-

urday night.

The need for a new quarterback came when Clark Weaver, the No. 1 signal caller, suffered pulled ligaments in his leg in the 10-9 loss to UCLA on Saturday and was lost to the team for the season.

"There are three sophomores who will see action against Rice: Mike Connelly, Dick Berg and Don Cook," said Ralston. "We'll probably start either Connelly or Ragsdale."

"We decided that we'll have to have Ragsdale there to steady the boys, who may be nervous. He was our freshman quarterback two years ago and saw 12 or 13 minutes as a signal-caller last year."

Ralston then admitted that Ragsdale wasn't going to get much rest.

When Dick, a 180-pound junior from Oregon, isn't playing quarterback, he's the No. 1 left half-back. And when he isn't on the offensive team, he plays in the defensive secondary.

"It's going to be tough on him, but it looks like he'll be on the field most of the time," said Ralston.

Ernie Nevers, the all-time All-America who played at Stanford long before Ragsdale was born, figures it's a good idea.

"If he's in shape, I can't see why he can't play both ways," said Nevers. "The same should hold true for other fine players. These days every school tries to play in each game."

"I admit it's fine for the boys. But how are you going to get a team leader to get you going when you are in trouble when, just as the team starts rolling, you take it out and put in another one?"

"I just can't believe that it is possible for a school to field three teams of equal ability."

All this conversation took place at the weekly luncheon of the Northern California Football Writers' Association.

Tom Hamilton, commissioner of the Big Six, watched USC defeat Michigan State and Washington lose to Iowa over the weekend.

Indians Dropped To 2nd On Poll

PORTLAND (UPI)—Medford moved back to the top of the A-1 football list in the Journal coaches' poll today.

The Southern Oregon powerhouse, defending state champion, polled 75 of a possible 80 points to 72 points for second place Roseburg, last week's leader. Medford is 2-1 for the season, losing to Boise. Roseburg is 4-0.

Others in the top 10 included, in order, Grants Pass, Pendleton, Grant, North Salem, Cottage Grove, Central Catholic, Parkrose and Beaverton. Also getting votes were Jefferson, St. Helens, Marshfield, Lincoln and Wy'east.

Phoenix headed the A-2 poll with 74 of a possible 80 points. Others, in order, were Vale, North Catholic, Bandon, Seaside, Brookings, Yamhill - Carlton, Central, and Siuslaw and Gold Beach tied for ninth.

Dodgers Plan For Next Year

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—The four-game sweep of the World Series will not dull the Los Angeles Dodgers into standing pat and self-satisfied in 1964, General Manager E. J. (Buzzie) Bavasi said today.

"Now that we know we can beat the best teams in baseball including the Yankees, our goal will be to try and do it again," Bavasi said.

As the players scattered to their homes and off-season activities, Bavasi and his aides were looking over their minor league rosters to see where the Dodgers could strengthen their team.

"This is the time for us to work harder than ever," he added. "A baseball club can't stand still. We have to keep trying to improve ourselves because if we don't we might slide backwards."

Bavasi, however, indicated that the Dodgers would use the 1963 roster as the nucleus of their 1964 team and try to strengthen it chiefly with the organization's own younger players.

"I don't think we can improve much of the pitching we got this year. It was great and our job will be to keep it up to this year's level. But youngsters like Dick Calmus, Joe Moeller and Phil Ortega will get their chance. And we have players like Dick Nen, Al Ferrara, Nate Oliver and Roy Gleason who spent most of the season in the minors but are just about ready for the majors."

As the victorious Dodgers cleaned out their lockers at the stadium, the glow of their world's championship sweep still was with them. And most of the Dodgers looked ahead to vacations and to receiving their World Series check.

The players receiving full series shares will get around \$13,000, it was estimated by the club although the exact figure will await word from Commissioner Ford Frick's office.

More than \$500,000 will be refunded by the bank. Tickets for the Los Angeles games were sold in strips of three and the game that was not played here because of the sweep was a sellout like the third and fourth contests.

Denver's Salmon Top PCL Batter

SEATTLE (UPI)—Ruthford Salmon of Denver led Pacific Coast League hitters during the past season with a .325 mark according to final, official figures released today.

Billy Cowan, Salt Lake City slugger, finished with the most total bases, 318, led in runs batted in with 120 and also fanned the most times, 148.

Jesus Alou of Tacoma recorded the most times at bat, 648, and collected the most hits, 210. Cesar Tovar, Dallas-Fort Worth, led in doubles with 41. George Williams of Oklahoma City in triples with 12 and Deron Johnson of San Diego was the home run leader with 33. Tovar also scored the most runs, 115.

Alou led in sacrifice hits with 13 and grounded into the most double plays, 21. Carlos Bernier of Hawaii drew the most walks, 98, and Phil Roof, Denver, was hit the most times by a pitcher, 10.

Hiraldo Ruiz, San Diego, led the loop in stolen bases with 50 and grounded into but one double play to lead in that category. Jesse White of Salt Lake City fanned only 38 times to lead that division.

Denver walked away with team honors. It led team hitting with a .281 mark, had the most times at bat, 5,383, most runs, 843, most hits, 1,512, most total bases, 2,411, most doubles 252, most triples 64, most homers 173, and most runs batted in, 868.

Top Contenders To Fight Friday

NEW YORK (UPI)—Aggressive Jose Stable of Cuba and unbeaten Dick Turner of Philadelphia are slated for a nationally televised welterweight contenders fight Friday night at Philadelphia's Blue Horizon Arena.

Their 10-rounder shapes up as the feature bout on the week's boxing schedule, which includes comeback fights by England's wealthy Terry Downes, former co-holder of the world middleweight crown, and by former top heavyweight contender Eddie Machen of Portland, Ore.

Bookie Downes comes out of a brief retirement to campaign as a light heavyweight in a bout with Germany's Rudolph Nehring at London's Albert Hall Tuesday night.

Machen, who scored his first comeback victory on a kayo over Miami's Ollie Wilson on Sept. 18, meets Alonzo Johnson of Rankin, Pa., at Santa Monica, Calif., Saturday night.

For Friday's TV fight at Philadelphia, third ranking welterweight contender Stable is favored at 8-5 over seventh ranked Turner. Turner seeks his 20th victory and 12th knockout in 21 bouts, which include a draw. Stable's 21-2-1 record includes six knockouts.
