Riddle's Irish broke into the winner's circle in Umpqua Valley League grid action Friday night, and in so doing spoiled the homecoming of the Myrtle Creek Vikings.

The Irish, despite 146 yards in penalties, ground out a hard-fought 19-0 triumph.

Taking advantage of a break early in the first quarter the Irish crashed over for their first TD, then went on to add a pair of insurance six-pointers in the second half.

After kicking off, the Irish's Keith Hanson quickly intercepted a pass and returned the ball to the Myrtle Creek three. The Vikings, with their backs to the wall, dug in and held. Moving the ball out to the line, the Irish attempted to punt. The punt sailed high in the air, but traveled only two yards, giving the invaders possession on the Myrtle Creek 11.

Larry Ruckel provided the scoring punch seconds later, crashing over from the six-yard marker with 1:36 left to play in the first

period. Gary Paetz ran for the extra point.

In the second quarter the Vikings scored what could have been the tying TD, but an offensive pass interference call nullified the tally and halted the drive.

Riddle's two second half touchdowns came on pass plays, with Paetz doing the throwing from his halfback spot. Paetz tossed 12 yards to Tom Morrison in the third quarter, then connected on a 10-yarder to Art Fisher in the final stanza.

Playing a rugged brand of football, the Irish were whistled for 12 penalties totaling 146 yards. Myrtle Creek lost 26 yards on four penalties.

The Irish held a 15-11 first down advantage, and outgained the home team, 20-108 on the ground. Passing Riddle completed four of eight attempts for 65 yards and intercepted three Viking aerials. Myrtle Creek connected on five of 14 pass attempts for 21 yards.

The visitors did not punt, while the Vikings punted twice for an average of 19.5 yards—including the fatal two-yarder. Riddle lost the ball three times on fumbles.

Riddle now boasts a 1-1 league record, and is tied with Myrtle Creek and Sutherlin for third place.

The rampaging Drain Warriors, still smarting from last week's setback at the hands of the Junction City Tigers, made short work of the Oakridge Warriors Friday in Emerald League action.

Drain, breaking a 7-7 tie early in the game, romped to a lopsided 48-13 victory to keep its title hopes alive.

The Drain Warriors drew first blood when halfback Mark Thomas capped a drive with an eight-yard jaunt and Frank Backus ran for the PAT. The host 11 came back to tie the count when Dave Crist broke loose and rambled 42 yards. Tim Jenkins ran for the extra point.

Thomas broke the deadlock with a two-yard TD run late in the first period and Roger Rutledge grabbed a pass from Gordon Jensen for the PAT.

Drain iced the victory with a 27-point spree in the second quarter. Rutledge took a 35-yard TD pass from Thomas to start the uprising, then Backus scored on a seven-yard run. Jerry Smith ac-

counted for the next six-pointer on a 25-yard gallop and Rutledge scored on a 38-yard pass from Jensen. Backus and Thomas accounted for three extra points.

The invaders added an insurance TD in the final stanza when Smith broke loose and powered his way over the goal line from 12 yards out. Thomas ran for the extra point.

Oakridge closed out the scoring when Larry Hills connected with Joe Ziegler for 57 yards and the final TD.

Drain outlasted the home crew, 21-6, in first downs, and ran for 474 yards on the ground, compared to 71 for Oakridge. The winning Warriors completed six of 14 pass attempts for 143 yards, while the losers connected on four of 15 attempts for 124 yards. Drain had two pass interceptions, while Oakridge had one.

Oakridge did all the punting — averaging 36 yards each on four kicks. Drain lost two fumbles and Oakridge one. The visitors were penalized 60 yards on six penalties, and Oakridge had two penalties for 10 yards.

In the only other league game, Central Linn blanked Harrisburg, 34-0. Three league counters are on tap today.

Clay Gets No Trouble From Refusal To Fight

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (UPI) — Those who had hoped that cocky fighter Cassius M. Clay would get a verbal knuckle-rapping by the Kentucky State Boxing Commission Friday for ducking out of a fight were disappointed when no punitive action was taken.

Kentucky Boxing Commissioner Bob Evans said he was "greatly disappointed" over Clay's refusal to fight George Chuvalo Nov. 8 here, but said he was unable to take punitive action because no contract existed.

Clay announced last month that he would fight the winner of the Chuvalo-Mike De John fight here Sept. 27, which Chuvalo won by a majority decision.

Camas Valley Tips Prospect 54-7 Friday

Blasting off like they were going into orbit, the Camas Valley Hornets romped to a lopsided 54-7 triumph over the invading Prospect Cougars Friday in Southern Oregon Eight-Man League action.

Terry Volkman paced the murderous Hornet backs, running for three touchdowns, snaring a pass for another and kicking one extra point. Volkman hit paydirt on runs of 15, eight and 20 yards in the first half — not to mention grabbing a 32-yard TD pass from Jim Kiser.

Volkman drew blood twice in the first quarter to put the home team on top to stay. Terry Buel took a pass from Kiser and Gary Dean ran to account for the PATs.

In the 27-point second period, Volkman led off with his third consecutive TD romp — this one going for 20 yards. Mike Priest ran for the PAT. Priest came back with a 70-yard jaunt and Don Lawson scored on a 30-yard pass from Kiser.

The pass to Volkman, a 34-yard pass from Buel to Roger Thrush and Buel's 75-yard gallop with a pass interception put the Hornets out of reach.

Prospect's lone tally came in the final stanza when Andy Maurer battled his way into the end-zone from 24 yards out. Maurer ran for the PAT.

In rolling to the important victory, the Hornets rushed for the grand total of 414 yards and completed 10 of 20 passes for an additional 190 yards. Camas held a 14-7 advantage in first downs. The Cougars gained 125 yards on the ground and connected on 12 of 38 pass attempts for 225 yards. The Hornets boasted two interceptions.

Each team lost one fumble, and in the punting department Camas Valley kicked twice for an average of 35 yards and Prospect punted four times for an average of 26 yards. The Hornets were assessed three penalties for 15 yards and Prospect had five for 35 yards.

The victory gives Camas Valley a perfect 2-0 league record, while the Cougars now sport a 1-1 conference mark.

Remick, Bob Burgess Set Pace For Vital Indian Win

Rolling on undefeated in Midwestern League play, the Roseburg Indians scalped the invading Thurston Colts for their 18th consecutive conference triumph Friday.

In taming the Colts, 34-6, the Tribe increased its current District 5-A-1 record to 5-0. These five victories, added to 13 previous consecutive wins brings Roseburg's string to 18. The last league defeat suffered by the Indians was to South Eugene, 26-13, in 1960.

Taking to the warpath Friday, the Indians took the opening kickoff and marched 61 yards in five plays — scoring before three minutes playing time had elapsed. Starting on the Roseburg 39, Jerry Remick, serving as field general for the Redskins, ripped off 22 yards in the opening play from scrimmage.

Bob (Smokey) Burgess swept right end for another 12 yards before Remick passed to Gary Heeter for a three-yard gain. Burgess broke over left tackle for five yards — moving the ball to the Thurston 19.

On the next play Remick skirted left end, found the going clear and raced into the end zone untouched. Alan Young kicked the point after.

Late in the first quarter the Indians took off again — this time moving 46 yards in five plays. The big gainer of the drive was Burgess' 25-yarder up the middle on a quick opener. Craig Engle, running from the fullback spot, crunched his way for the final six yards and Young's kick was good.

Coming back after the halftime intermission, the Indians forced the Colts to punt, then methodically ground out the yardage for another six points. Burgess opened the drive with a 20-yard spring over right tackle. Engle went up the middle for four yards and Burgess ground out seven yards on a power play to move the ball into Thurston territory.

From the Thurston 48 Remick took off around left end, pitched out to Burgess just as he was being tackled and when the smoke cleared the Indians had gained 32 yards on the play. On the next play Burgess broke into the clear and galloped 16 yards for a TD. Young kicked the PAT.

At this point the Colts came fighting back to get on the scoreboard. Several key passes from Roger Langliers to end Dave Gib-

son led the Colts in a 64-yard march to paydirt. Moving to a first down on the Roseburg eight, the Colts relied on the straight-ahead power of full back Bob Shields for the scoring punch.

Shields carried three times in succession once the invaders got inside the 10 — going over on the third down play from the one-yard marker. Shields' attempted kick for the extra point was blocked.

Not to be outdone, the Indians took the Colts' kickoff and scored again — with the pay-off play being a nine-yard pass from Remick to halfback Ron Leep. Young's kick was good. Roseburg's final tally came early in the fourth quarter, with Dick Gwaltney sweeping right end for the one-yard.

Late in the game, with the Jayvees handling the offense, the Indians had another TD called back on an off-side penalty, then lost the ball inside the 10 on a fumble.

Burgess set the pace on the ground for the Indians, carrying 10 times for 107 yards — an average of 10.7 yards-per-carry. Mike Leep, seeing only limited offensive duty, carried eight times for 55 yards. On defense Mike Leep led the charging Indians with 11 tackles.

Remick, starting at quarterback for the first time, carried four times for 38 yards and completed five of eight passes for 61 yards and one TD.

The Colts were led by Shields in the rushing department. The rugged fullback gained 53 yards on 15 carries, while halfback Nick Rauch had 34 yards on eight carries. Langliers completed eight of 22 pass attempts for 87 yards.

The victory keeps the Indians in a tie with the Cottage Grove Lions for the league lead, with a showdown title set for next week on the Cottage Grove field.
