Breaking loose with a 21-point fourth quarter spree, the Oakland Oakers rolled to a decisive 28-0 victory over the host Lowell Raiders Friday in the lone Bico-Trico B League encounter on tap.

Oakland, following a trade of punts, downed a kick inside the Lowell 10 in the first quarter, then forced the home team to punt. The Oakers took over on the Lowell 35 and marched to the first TD in five plays, with the aid of a 15-yard penalty. Randy Manley provided the scoring punch, driving his way to the end zone from five yards out. Keith Crenshaw ran for the PAT.

Lowell came back hard in the closing minutes of the first quarter, moving to the Oakland 24 before being forced to kick. From this point on until late in the third quarter the game developed into a hard-nosed defensive battle.

The Oakers got a break in the third period when Mike McDonald recovered a Lowell fumble on the Oakland 37. This started the visitors on the drive for their second tally which came in the opening seconds of the final period. A pass from Randy Manley to Dan Andrews accounted for 14 yards, and Crenshaw ripped off big hunks with runs of 24 and 32 yards. From the four-yard marker Kerney Manley came through with a power play for the TD. Kerney Manley ran for the PAT.

Trailing 14-0, the Raiders' de-

fense began to lapse and the Oakers were quick to take advantage. Forcing the home team to punt, Oakland marched from its own 36 for a third TD with Randy Manley romping for 32 yards after penalties had appeared to stall the drive. A 15-yard pass from Randy Manley to Doc Stroop gave Oakland the six points. Kerney Manley dove into the end zone for the extra point.

Oakland's final TD came late in the game, with the Oakers moving 46 yards in three plays. Alan Cherry raced 30 yards for the tally, then ran for the PAT.

Oakland rushed for 303 yards, compared to 84 yards rushing for Lowell. The Oakers completed six of nine passes for 49 yards and Lowell connected on eight short passes out of 11 attempts for 26 yards. First downs favored the winners, 12-5.

Oakland punted four times for a 34 yard average, while Lowell averaged 36 yards on six punts. Each team lost one fumble. The Oakers were called on eight penalties for 110 yards, while Lowell had seven for 95 yards.

Oakland now sports a 3-0 league mark, and a 5-0 record for the season. Coach Chuck Halstead praised his entire team for Friday's win.

## Flemming Backs New Stadium Plan

EUGENE (UPI)—A football and track stadium seating 32,000 to 35,000 persons should be constructed on the site of the University of Oregon's Hayward Field, President Arthur S. Flemming said Thursday.

Flemming said the present system of playing many of Oregon's home football games in Portland is indefensible.

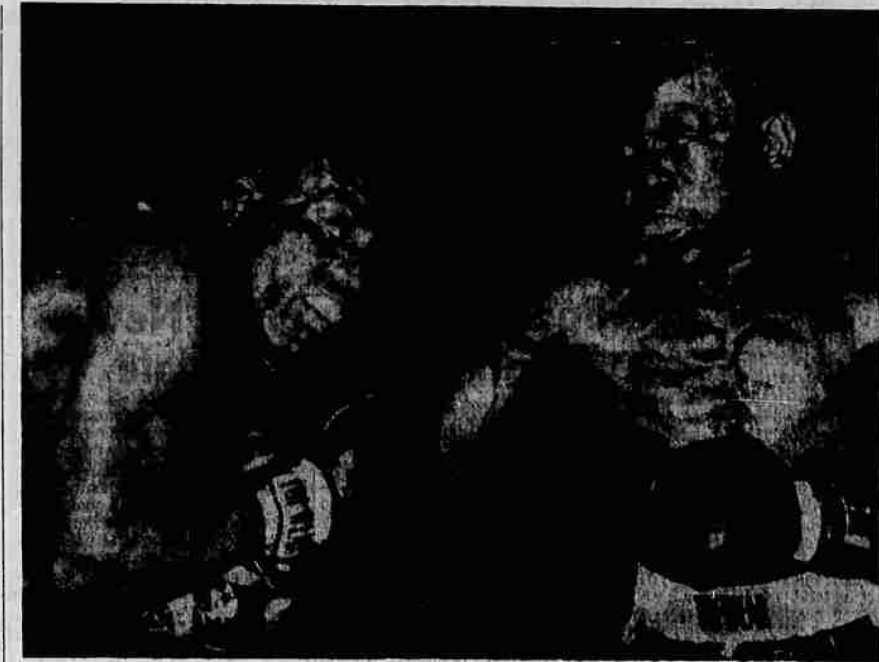
"Students should not have to travel 106 miles to attend home games," Flemming said at a meeting of the Eugene Chamber of Commerce's University Relations Committee.

Auto accidents and time away from classes are invited by the Portland trips, he said.

Oregon plans many of its "home" games at 36,000-seat Multnomah Stadium in Portland because Hayward Field holds only 23,500.

Flemming said he now favors the Hayward Field site, but he has asked the architectural firm of Oving, Skidmore and Merrill for more information. The firm has made a feasibility study, still secret, of possible stadium sites near the university.

Still undecided was the question of whether the university would attempt to build a new stadium or remodel the present one if the Hayward Field site was chosen. However, if the measure loses stadium plans will be put off indefinitely, Flemming said.

## U.S. Ryder Cup Team Floors British 6-2 In Open Round At Atlanta Friday

ATLANTA (UPI)—The United States juggled its powerful Ryder Cup golf team today with the aim of delivering a knockout blow to a battered British team which was floored for a 6-2 count in Friday's opening matches.

Captain Arnold Palmer, who shared in Friday's only U. S. defeat and later in its greatest victory, paired himself with Dow Finsterwald for this morning's four-ball battle.

The Palmer - Finsterwald two-

— young Brian Huggett, who faced Palmer twice in Friday's Scotch foursomes, and Dave Thomas.

The other morning pairings: U. S. Open champ Julius Boros and Gene Littler vs. Peter Alliss and Bernard Hunt; Billy Casper and Billy Maxwell vs. Harry Weetman and George Will; and vs. Neil Coles and Christy O'Connor.

John Fallon, Britain's non-playing captain, sounded a note of despair after his final twosome Friday blew a lead on the final two holes to allow the United States to make a clean sweep of the afternoon rounds.

**Sums Up Chances**  
"We must redeem ourselves Saturday if we are to have any chance on Sunday," Fallon said. There were eight Scotch foursomes today and 16 singles matches Sunday. There are a total of 32 points at stake with teams getting one point for each match won and a half point for each draw.

The British got off to a fine start in Friday's morning round, tying the United States 2-2. Their biggest upset came in the first match when Huggett and Scotsman Will, a pair of 26-year-old Ryder Cup newcomers, beat

Palmer and Johnny Pott 3 and 2. Their lone loss in the morning round came when Casper and Ragan edged Alliss and O'Connor 1-up thanks to a long putt by Ragan on the 18th hole which saved the U. S. lead.

**Sweeps Noon Matches**  
But the afternoon matches were another story as the U. S. team finally began to flex its muscles and ran off four straight victories.

The biggest victory, and the one which attracted most of the crowd of nearly 10,000, was the one Palmer and Casper posted over Huggett and Will.

Apparently stung by the morning upset by the two youngest members of the British team, Palmer benched Pott and brought in Casper for a second run at the two men who beat him earlier in the day.

It was no contest. Palmer and Casper were 5-up after six holes and although they tapered off a bit midway through the match, won handily 5 and 4 without ever being less than 3-up after the fourth hole.

## Syracuse Grinds Out Win Over UCLA; Oregon, Beavers Picked To Win Today

Western football teams were just about ready to throw in the towel to East Coast elevens today after absorbing another convincing setback.

Syracuse opened the Pacific Coast grid week Friday night by grinding out a 29-7 win over puncheon UCLA.

UCLA's air attack was in pretty good shape with 9 of 19 completions for 133 yards, but the Bruins totaled a dismal minus two yard rushing while the Syracuse ground

attack, led by Nate Duckett and Jim Nance, piled up 256 yards. Larry Zeno's 52-yard pass completion to Bryon Nelson accounted for the Bruins' score.

**Eastern Renaissance**  
Eastern powers such as Syracuse, Pittsburgh and Penn State have been rougher on the West Coast teams this year than squads from any other section of the country. Just as the West Coast had a grid renaissance in recent years, it appears that the East Coast is coming back this season.

In action today, old foes South-

ern California and Notre Dame met at South Bend in the 35th renewal of a great series.

The Irish, about the only team around that plays a rougher schedule than the Trojans, are one touchdown underdogs.

Along the Coast, the best game probably was set for Seattle where unbeaten Oregon State met winless Washington. Despite the comparative records, the game was almost even since Washington's defense has been rock-solid all season while the injury-riddled Huskies searched for an offense.

**Blue Devils Favored**  
Oregon and Washington figured to have things pretty much their own way against Idaho and San Jose State, while California was the underdog as it hosted razzle-dazzle Duke.

In contests tonight, Rice meets Stanford in Texas and the Indians were slowed down by the loss of first string quarterback Clark Weaver.

Fresno State invaded University of Pacific for a night game that also figured as a toss up. Although both teams were going nowhere, grid partisans drooled over the line battle between UOP's Don Chackelford and Fresno's Montie Day, a pair of big boys who have the pro scouts looking.

In other games Friday night, Fullback John Evans set up one touchdown with a 51-yard run as Cal Tech blanked Riverside 14-0.

Quarterback Dick Carriere of the Cal Aggies scored twice and passed for 103 yards in a 23-13 win over Chico State.

## Detroit Will Make Bid For 1968 Olympic Games

DETROIT (UPI)—Mayor Jerome P. Cavanagh and his official party leave for Baden-Baden, West Germany, today to make Detroit's bid for the 1968 Olympic Games.

A vanguard of 22 Detroit Olympic Committee members and technicians along with 3½ tons of equipment already is in Baden-Baden for the 45-minute presentation to the International Olympic Committee (IOC) on Oct. 18.

Gov. George Romney will fly over next week to help make Detroit's presentation to the 64-member IOC. The Motor City is bidding against Mexico City, Buenos Aires and Lyons, France.

Detroit's presentation includes a film of President Kennedy supporting the Motor City and a congressional resolution pledging United States support of Detroit's bid.

To dramatize its bid, Detroit Friday completed a 2,571-mile relay in which an Olympic torch was carried from Los Angeles to Detroit by more than 400 long-distance runners.

The end of the run at the City-County Building was witnessed by hundreds of cheering persons and scores of demonstrators who interrupted the ceremony with

shouts and boos.

Hayes Jones, a 1960 Olympic bronze medal winner, handed the torch over to Cavanagh amid jeering from the demonstrators.

They carried signs reading "Is Detroit's Segregated Housing Ready For Olympics?" and sang the integration song, "We Shall Overcome."

## Chicago Bears Picked Over LA

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—The unbeaten Chicago Bears go after their fifth victory of the National Football League season Sunday against the Los Angeles Rams and the oddsmakers say they should get it—by 13 points.

The Rams, working on a string of seven league defeats, seem to lack scoring punch, to say the least—they've made only three touchdowns in four games this season.

## Better Hunting Comes With Cooler Weather

PORTLAND (UPI)—Deer hunting prospects throughout the state improved this week as cooler weather and varying amounts of moisture brought the animals out of the brush to feed.

Until fall storms materialize, the deer remain in the higher ranges in central and southeastern Oregon.

In the western part of the state deer remain bedded down in thickets during the day.

**By region:**  
**Northwest**—Outlook good for the unit deer season in north coastal districts; buck hunting fair to good throughout North Willamette district. In Santiam unit, hunting best in brushy foothills adjacent to agricultural areas. Trask unit good for either sex.

**Southwest**—Success fair to good in Douglas County. In Rogue Valley recent storms have improved hunting conditions, but deer still at high elevations.

**Central**—Prospects poor in Wasco unit; hunting conditions improved elsewhere. Success fair for hunters willing to climb include the slopes of the Cascades west of the Metolius River, the upper Ochoco Mountains, and in the juniper pockets along the Crooked River.

**Northeast**—Unit permit holders should have best success in Grant County. Other potentially productive areas include Wallawa County, especially along Imnaha River; Cheshninus and Sled Springs units, and the Lookout Mountain area of Baker County.

**Southeast**—Buck hunting should be fair throughout the area because of light hunting pressure. Deer scattered and feeding only in the early morning and late evening hours.

The 1963 championship jalopy auto races are scheduled for Sunday at the Medford Speedway, with more than 50 cars expected to be out for this final fender-crunching event.

Top drivers from Roseburg, Grants Pass and Medford are expected to battle for the crown. Feature event of the afternoon will be a 50-lap race for the 30 fastest cars. All other drivers will participate in a 25-lap consolation race.

Plans are being made for a group of Roseburg hardtop drivers to present a special exhibition for the fans.

The Medford Speedway is located seven miles north of Medford off the Crater Lake Highway in East White City. Starting time is set for 1 p.m.
