

Modern Language Document Ordered Back For Rewrite

Vatican Press International (UPI)—Ecclesiastical Council fathers in a surprise vote today sent back for rewriting a document authorizing the use of modern languages and other reforms in the Mass.

The document in question is Chapter Two of the liturgical reform project which the prelates debated for three weeks at their first session last autumn. In a series of votes last week they gave overwhelming approval to 19 specific amendments to the chapter, including four which spelled out in detail authorization for the use of the vernacular—the ordinary language of the people—instead of Latin in large portions of the Mass.

Today's vote was on approval of the chapter as a whole. In voting on the amendments last week the fathers had only two

choices: They could vote yes or no. Today, however, they had a third choice. They could vote "Yes, with reservations."

Since 2,242 ballots were cast, 1,495 yes votes were required to make up the necessary two-thirds majority for final approval of the whole chapter. But the chapter received only 1,417 unqualified yes votes—78 short of the requisite number. There were only 36 flat no votes but there were 781 fathers who voted "yes, with reservations."

The Rev. Frederick McManus, of the National Liturgical Conference of the United States, a prominent advocate of liturgical reform, said there was no reason for anyone to be distressed about today's vote and that "the use of vernacular and other reforms would unquestionably be approved."

Portland Symphony Features Work Of Masters On Tuesday

Tchaikowsky, Handel and Benjamin Britten masterworks will be featured in Tuesday night's concert of the Portland Symphony Orchestra in Roseburg.

The concert, sponsored by the Roseburg Symphony Society and underwritten by a host of businesses, industries and individuals of the county, will start at 8:15 in the Roseburg High School gymnasium.

It will be one of the cultural highlights of the year. As billed

in advance notices, it will involve \$100,000 worth of masterpieces and their \$100,000-plus worth of rare and colorful instruments," Jacques Singer is conductor.

Roseburg is just one stop in a tour of eight communities outside of Portland. It is the fourth time since 1911 the symphony has toured the state.

The 70-piece orchestra's performance will be highlighted by Benjamin Britten's composition, based on a 17th century background theme by Henry Purcell. Mark P. Huber, manager of the symphony orchestra, will narrate the composition.

In the more classic vein, George Frederick Handel's "Water Music" suite and Peter Ilich Tchaikowsky's "Symphony No. 4 in F Minor" will round out the top-notch concert.

Mental Health Talk Is Heard By Local Group

A talk by K. C. Layer, member of the newly organized Douglas County Mental Health Association, was well received at the quarterly meeting of the County Health Council.

Layer, in an address entitled "Blueprint for Action," pointed out the urgent need for "after-care" on the local level for persons returning from mental hospitals. He discussed the responsibility of the community in continuing rehabilitation efforts for the mentally ill.

Dr. James K. Gray, county health officer, defined the activities of his department. These included disease prevention, prolongation of health and active life, promotion of mental and physical efficiency, vital statistics and other basic health objectives.

Letters from officials of Jackson and Yamhill counties were read in connection with a discussion of county boards of health. These counties participate in the county board of health organization, which assists the county court, health department and community on public health matters. The creation of a seven-member board — which serves without pay — has been very successful in those counties, it was reported.

The Douglas County Health Council, headed by Kenneth Clark, was organized in May of 1962 by a group of leading nonprofit organizations in the county. The council is also affiliated with the Southwest Oregon Regional Health Council, comprising Coos, Curry, Douglas, Lane and Lincoln counties.

Auto Strikes Car Towed From Ditch

A 1954 automobile struck a car which was being pulled out of the ditch by a tow truck, causing extensive damage Sunday about 8 p.m., state police report.

The car in the ditch, a 1962 model, had been operated by Clark T. Reed, 21, of Rt. 1, Box 312, Sutherland. Reed was taken to Mercy Hospital in Roseburg by ambulance, suffering facial lacerations and a leg injury. The car was registered to Robert C. Reed, same address.

The accident occurred on the Nonpareil Road, at its intersection with Plat I Road. A tow truck owned by Walt's Towing of Roseburg, had pulled Reed's car out of the ditch and was parked facing east in the east-bound lane.

While fastening the two vehicles together, the 1954 car, operated by Henry Martin Parnell, Box 288 A, Sutherland, who was traveling east, crashed into the rear of the 1962 car causing extensive damage to both cars. There were no injuries.

Tuesday Will Be 'Dry' Day For Vote On Tax

Tuesday, day of the tax referendum election, will be a "dry" day throughout the state, at least as far as imbibing in taverns and cocktail lounges is concerned.

According to Wayne Holzfuss, local liquor inspector for the state, the law reads that "no person shall sell for consumption on licensed premises any alcoholic liquor during the time the polls are open on any day on which an election is held throughout the state." This does not effect sale of packaged beverages at food stores, Holzfuss said, just "on premises" consumption.

State liquor stores are also closed during voting hours.
