

Notre Dame Field Goal Upend USC, 17-14

That engaging ditty, "I Get a Kick Out of You," only registered a dull thud today with Southern California and Stanford who were wrecked by field goals last Saturday as Big Six football representatives again folded on the intersectional front.

A 33-yard field goal by sophomore Ken Ivan gave Notre Dame a 17-14 win over ninth-ranked Southern California and the first win of the season for the Fighting Irish. Then in Houston, Tex., namesake Larry Rice booted a three-pointer that started the Owls toward a 23-13 win over Stanford.

But California, which wasn't expected to do much against Duke, pulled out a 22-22 tie with the Blue Devils who missed three field goal attempts and were penalized a vital 15 yards when the kicking tee was thrown out at the wrong moment.

Next Saturday's Coast schedule brings Ohio State to Southern California while UCLA is at Notre Dame. Stanford at Washington in the weekend's lone Big Six contest. San Jose State at California, Washington State at Oregon State, Oregon at the University of the Pacific at Idaho and Cal Poly of San Luis Obispo at Fresno State.

After Syracuse had methodically worked over UCLA on Friday night, 29-7, Southern California ran into a band of fighting Irish at South Bend on Saturday led by Frank Budka, one of five Notre Dame quarterbacks.

Notre Dame took a one-touchdown lead on Tom McDonough's 62-yard runback of a pass interception. Troy tied the score, 14-14 before the half, then were beaten in the last period on Ivan's field goal.

Stanford, which now has lost three in a row, held a seven-point lead at the half over Rice. But the Owls tied the

score in the next period then cleaned up during the fourth on Rice's three-pointer followed by Dale Callahan's 45-yard touchdown run after he intercepted a pass by Dick Berg.

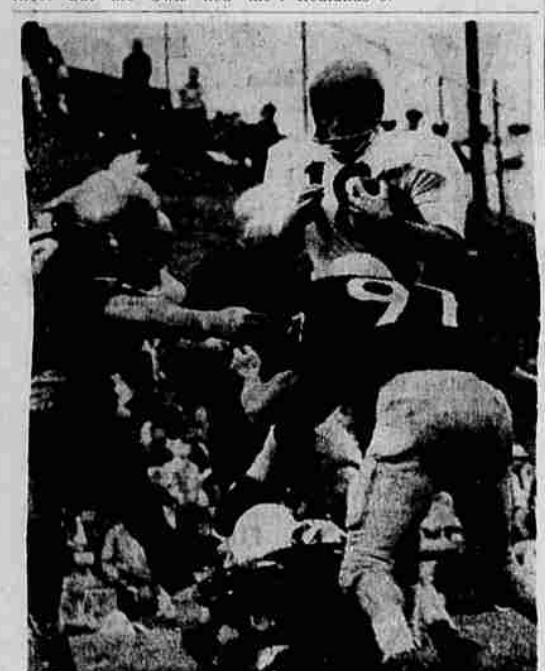
California, which didn't seem to belong on the same field with Duke early in the game, gained a 22-22 tie in the last quarter when quarterback Craig Morton fired a 31-yard pass to batterymate Jack Schraub then flipped to Jerry Mosher for the deadlocking two-point.

With seconds left in the contest, the Blue Devils were penalized 15 yards from the Bear 13 to the 28 for coaching from the sidelines after the kicking tee was thrown out with the clock going.

San Jose State provided a good upset, defeating Washington State, 13-8, on Herb Engel's touchdown from one yard out with three minutes to play. The score came after the swift Clarence Williams of the Cougars had hustled over a two-point conversion for an 8-7 lead. Beaten in all three of their games at kickoff time, the Washington Huskies trampled undefeated Oregon State, 34-7, with Steve Bramwell's 82-yard touchdown run featuring the rout. Charlie Browning added two other TD's for the Huskies from inside the five yard line.

Oregon, with Bob Berry hitting on touchdown passes of 29 and 37 yards, overpowered Idaho, 41-21 in another leading Coast tilt. And Fresno State, getting a lift from Doyle Keith's tie-breaking field goal, waxed the University of the Pacific, 29-7.

U.S. Golf Team Blasts British For Ryder Cup

ATLANTA (UPI) — Arnold Palmer said today that despite the pro and con arguments about the difference in size in the U.S. and British balls, the biggest trouble with the Ryder Cup matches is too much golf in too short a time.

"I don't know of any other golf tournament which plays 36 holes a day for three straight days," Palmer, the U.S. team captain, complained.

He suggested that the Ryder Cup matches should be stretched out to at least four days, perhaps with 18 holes each on Thursday and Friday and then 36 on Saturday and Sunday.

It was hard to get agreement about the type of ball used by each team. Team member Gene Littler, whose 6 and 5 final day win over veteran Scotsman Tom Haliburton was the most lopsided match of 32, insisted the small ball hurt the British around the greens. But Palmer said it gave the British an advantage Sunday because of the wind.

Although Palmer complained about the amount of golf, he had no complaint about how his U.S. team fared in the three-day "grind" that ended Sunday evening at Bobby Jones' East Lake Country Club.

The U.S. crushed the British 23-9 after turning the final afternoon's matches into a 7½ to 1½ rout.

In fact, the U.S. never lost an afternoon match in the three days as they stormed to this country's 12th victory in the 15th biennial Ryder Cup matches.

The British played the U.S. even in 16 morning rounds, winning six and halving four others for eight points.

But, as Palmer aptly put it, the U.S. warmed up with the sun and made a runaway of the 16 afternoon matches — winning 14 and halving the other two.

The U.S. went into Sunday afternoon's final eight singles matches needing just one more victory to capture the solid gold Ryder Cup never won by the British in this country.

Littler, 33, had the honor of winning the decisive point as he all but ran the 48-year-old Haliburton off the course. He was 7 up after nine holes as he toured the front nine in a 3-un-der par 32, took a bogey 5 on No. 11 for his only loss, then closed out the match on No. 13 — earliest end for any of this year's matches.

Brown was simply superb Sunday when he broke loose for two long third-period touchdowns that sent the Cleveland Browns on to a 35-24 victory over the New York Giants in their battle for first place in the Eastern Division of the National Football League. Douglas' Trojans turned on the steam in the final quarter to upend the Glide Wildcats, 28-14, in a crucial Umpqua Valley

League battle Saturday. The host 'Cats displayed a stubborn defense which the Trojans had trouble cracking until the closing minutes of the game. Glide took the opening kickoff and marched 61 yards with sophomore Steve Anderson guiding the attack and Tim Rondeau doing the majority of the ground work. Craig Long's spectacular catch of Stan Young's pass in the end zone was good for the final seven yards. Bob Paulson kicked the PAT.

Douglas, battling from behind, came back with a 56-yard drive on the ensuing kickoff to tie the score. A freak catch of a 31-yard pass provided the Trojans with the tally. Dan Withers tossed the aerial to Ray Shepherd, but the ball was off target and a Glide defender batted the pigskin in the air, and after a short performance of volleyball, Shepherd grabbed the ball out of the air and raced untouched to the end zone. Gary Brown booted the extra point.

Early in the second quarter the Trojans struck again. With Jim Heard leading the charge, the visitors methodically ground out the yardage on the ground. Heard carried over from the one for the TD. The try for the extra point went astray.

The Wildcats came back to take the lead on the next series of plays when Paulson broke loose from the midfield stripe and rambled 50 yards for the tying TD. Gary Hyatt's block on the 27-yard line sprung Paulson loose for the long run. Paulson kicked the PAT to put the Wildcats ahead.

Douglas was once again threatening in the closing sec-

onds of the half when a pass interception by Long on the one-yard line appeared to stop the drive. However, Long stepped back into the end zone to avoid a tackler and was dropped by Pat Patterson for a safety which gave the invaders a 15-14 lead at the intermission.

The remainder of the scoring came in the fourth quarter as the Trojans iced the victory to remain undefeated in league play. Withers climaxed a 58-yard drive by sweeping his own left end for a three-yard TD run and Brown kicked the PAT early in the final stanza. Douglas' final TD came when Heard powered his way over left guard and rambled 17-yards to pay-dirt.

Heard was the big-gun for the Trojans, carrying 19 times for 144 yards — an average of 7.6 yards-per-carry. Brown carried seven times for 55 yards and Withers completed six of 14 pass attempts for 112 yards.

The Trojans held a 19-8 first down advantage, and total net yardage favored the winners, 339-179. Douglas gained 227 yards on the ground and 112 yards passing. Glide rushed for 133 yards and completed four of 10 aerial attempts for 46 yards. The Wildcats intercepted three Douglas passes, but turned the ball over to the invaders three times on fumbles.

Douglas punted three times for an average of 33 yards, while the Wildcats punted four times for a 22.8 yard average. The Wildcats were assessed 65 yards on nine penalties and the Trojans lost 35 yards on five penalties.

The victory gives Douglas undisputed control of the league lead with a 2-0 mark, and the Trojans now sport a 4-1 season record. Glide is now 1-1 in league play.
