

Yoncalla Eagles Bounced In Non-League Tilt 20-6

Stepping out of Bico-Trico B League play to face an A-2 opponent, the Yoncalla Eagles ended on the short end of a fullback Bob Nash powering his 20-6 score against the Mapleton Sailors Saturday.

The Eagles found the going rough early in the game, but their defense dug in and limited the host Sailors to a 7-0 half-time advantage. In the third quarter the Eagles managed to hit paydirt to cut Mapleton's lead to 14-6, but a fourth quarter tally by the home team was more than the invaders could cope with.

Mapleton drew first blood early in the game when Rich Armbruster pulled in a 15-yard pass from quarterback Mike Dahlin. Tim Shepherd ran for the extra point.

This ended the scoring until early in the third period when the Sailors struck again, with Richard Wales climaxing a drive by diving into the end zone from the three-yard marker.

Nash took care of the honors on the final Mapleton TD by twisting and turning for 16 yards and another six points.

The Sailors were paced by Nash throughout the game. In addition to racking up two TDs, the rugged fullback gained 98 yards on 11 carries.

The loss was the first of the season for the Eagles who sport a 3-0-1 record in league play.

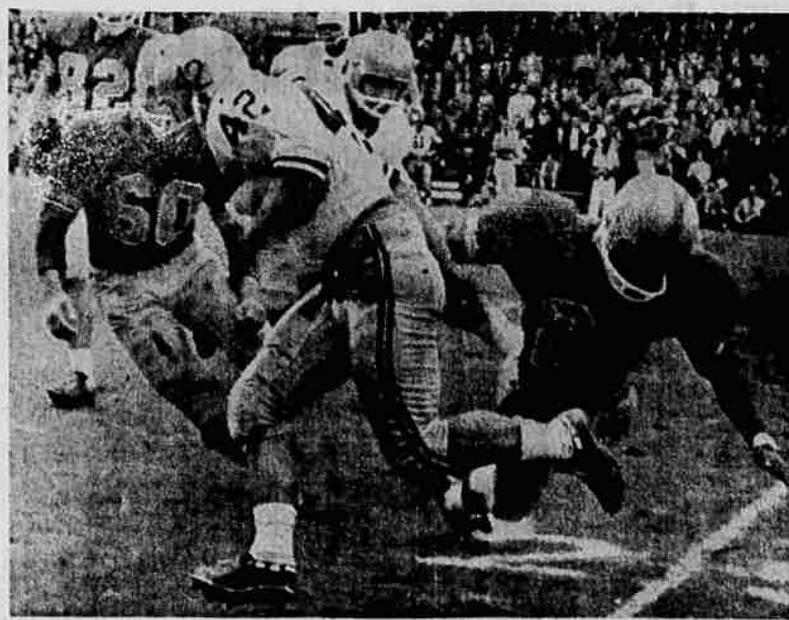

Oregon's Raging Ducks Stomp Idaho; OSU's Win Streak Ended

EUGENE (UPI)—Oregon's high scoring Ducks put their offensive show on regional television next Saturday afternoon against the Arizona Wildcats from Tucson.

Coach Len Casanova's speed-boys scored their third straight victory Saturday, romping over Idaho 41-21 before 19,200 fans here.

The "Firehouse Four" backfield of Bob Berry, Mel Renfro, Larry Hill and Lu Bain had a field day.

Berry completed 9 of 11 passes for 186 yards and two touchdowns. He had a 39-yard scoring toss to end Rich Schwab and one of 57 yards to Renfro.

Renfro, in addition to taking in the long scoring pass, was his usual versatile self. The all-American also switched to quarterback briefly in the third period and looked sharp, moving the Ducks to two first downs and completing his first two passes.

Hill scored twice, once on a four-yard run and the other time on a 35-yard runback of an intercepted pass.

And Bain also scored twice, on runs of 9 and 10 yards.

Idaho tied the game at 7-7 in the first quarter on quarterback Gary Mires' one-yard sneak.

But the Ducks broke it wide open in the second period. Idaho got its other touchdowns in the second half a 19-yard pass from Mike Monahan to Bill Scott and a one-yard run by Rick Naccarato.

Coach Len Casanova said he

still didn't know how good his Webfoots were. The Ducks have now beaten Stanford, West Virginia and Idaho by lopsided scores after an opening 17-7 defeat at the hands of Penn State.

Oregon State faced the job of pulling its battered football forces back together today after a shocking 34-7 loss to Washington here Saturday.

It was the first loss in 11 games for the Beavers and the first win in four tries this year for the Huskies, who failed to score more than one touchdown in each of their first three contests.

"We've been doing the same thing all along, only this time we did it better," Washington coach Jim Owens said after the contest.

"There was a kind of feeling. We've been frustrated so long and then the kids make and intensify a really good effort," Owens added.

Oregon State did not score until the last play of the game. Washington jumped off to a 7-0 lead in the first quarter on Charlie Brown's four-yard touchdown plunge. Steve Bramwell returned an OSU punt 92 yards in the second period for a 13-0 halftime lead and Brown scored again on a one-yard

plunge for 20-0 edge after three quarters.

Then the Huskies caught the Beaver secondary asleep twice in the fourth quarter and scored a 28-yard pass and a 45-yard pass.

Reserve quarterback Warren Woodworth led the Beavers 70 yards for their only score. He got the touchdown on a 15-yard run. Gordon Queen, the Beaver's starting signal-caller, completed only 5 of 11 passes for 67 yards.

"They just took it from us in every way possible," said OSU coach Tommy Prothro.

"Washington was a mighty good team. It had a good rush to blitz our passer and our protection wasn't very good. Our safetymen didn't rotate on pass defense, and that hurt us badly."

The Huskies thrilled the crowd of \$5,000 by rolling up 259 yards on the ground and 180 in the air, compared to 139 on the ground and 100 in the air for Oregon State.

Oregon State's next foe is Washington State Saturday at Corvallis. The Cougars also were upset Saturday, 13-8 by San Jose State.

LC Takes Linfield; SOC Topples EOC

Lewis and Clark's surprising Pioneers held first place in the Northwest Conference football standings with a 2-0 record today.

The Pioneers—with quarterback Bill Henselman throwing two touchdown passes—upset defending champion Linfield at Portland Saturday afternoon.

The Wildcats suffered their first regular season loss in 25 games and their first defeat in 14 conference contests.

The decision left Lewis and Clark with a 4-0 record and Linfield with a 3-1 mark for the season.

College of Idaho shut out Whitman 13-0 at Caldwell in the only other conference game.

Pacific defeated Oregon College of Education 27-0 at Forest Grove and Willamette dropped a 19-0 decision to British Columbia at Vancouver in nonconference games.

Defending champion Southern Oregon rolled over Eastern Oregon 48-18 at La Grande and Portland State won over Oregon Tech 26-7 at Klamath Falls in Oregon Collegiate Conference games. The wins gave first place 2-0 records and a tie for first place in the conference standings.
