## Algeria Routs Moroccan Troops

## W. Germany Marks End Of It's Adenauer Era

BONN (UPI)—The "Adenauer era" came to an end at high noon today as the West German chancellor officially retired from the government and returned to his parliamentary seat as a deputy.

"Der Alte", just three months short of his 88th birthday, thanked the German people for their help, then returned to the seat he left 14 years and one month ago today to become the first West German chancellor.

"But I won't just listen," he promised the parliament. "I'll talk, too."

Reviewing his years in office, beginning in the days when this country was a rubble heap and ending when it is the world's second greatest trading nation, Adenauer told parliament proudly:

"We Germans can again walk with our heads up."

He said the greatest development of his administration was the recovery of friends in the world.

When he came to power, he said, the Germans name was a curse.

Today, the German name again rings true, he said.

Warring Against Deals

He warned his successors against trying to make a separate deal with Russia in hopes of reuniting West Germany with Communist East Germany.

"The solution of the German problem," he said, "is not possible only between us and the adversary. We need our friends. Thank God we have found friends in the world. Imagine what Germany would be today if we had not again found friends."

Adenauer, dressed in his customary black cutaway and striped trousers, made his last appearance as chancellor before the parliament that first elected him in 1949.

He will keep his Bundestag seat, representing his home district of Bonn and surrounding area, and will be the oldest member of the house.

But the Adenauer era, one of the most remarkable and challenging periods in German history, was over, and the nation awaited the start of a new era Wednesday when Ludwig Erhard becomes chancellor.

Jacques Singer and his touring orchestra will present German composer George Frederick Handel's flashing "Water Music" suite; Benjamin Britten's "Variations and Fugue on a Theme of Purcell" and Russian master Pyotr Tchaikovsky's "Symphony No. 4 in F Minor."

The concert is being sponsored by the Roseburg Symphony Society, with the aid of 67 underwriters from the community and 14 patrons. Tickets are on sale from any Roseburg society member and will be sold at the door.

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## King Threatens New Marches In Birmingham

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI)—Negro leader Martin Luther King Jr., bitterly denouncing the city's rejection of his desegregation demands, threatened Monday night to lead demonstrations of "more numbers than any man can count."

"We will demonstrate until they integrate," he told a rally of more than 1,000 Negroes. But he did not say when such segregation protests, which brought around 2,500 arrests last spring, would begin.

King spoke several hours after Mayor Albert Boutwell said that solution of the city's racial problems "will never be done in response to threats or deadlines from anyone." Boutwell referred to a demand by King that the city hire 25 Negro policemen within a two-week period ending next Monday or face new racial demonstrations.

Boutwell's executive assistant, W. C. Hamilton, said civil service regulations requiring a six-week clearance check for new employees would make it "impossible" to meet King's deadline without an act of the legislature.

Boutwell said an "intensive and completely impartial survey" was being made to determine the best kind of police force for Birmingham and he would not permit "other interests to intervene or defeat" that study.

Other racial developments:

Clinton, La.: A Louisiana court Monday issued a warrant for the arrest of James Farmer, national director of the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE), for leading racial demonstrations. Farmer failed to show up for a hearing Monday against Negroes charged with violating a restraining order against picketing white merchants.

Gastonia, N.C.: Several hundred Negroes picketed two segregated movie houses Monday night without incident. It was the second consecutive evening of picketing.

Tallahassee, Fla.: A group of white Florida State University students carrying "Ban the Ban" placards picketed an off-campus hangout Monday to protest its refusal to serve Negroes.

Jacksonville, Fla.: A hearing was scheduled in U.S. District Court Wednesday on a suit to enjoin St. Augustine city officials from interfering with anti-segregation demonstrations.

New York: The Congress of Racial Equality (CORE) said it would stage demonstrations today when five demonstrators jailed five days ago are released. The five had been arrested in demonstrations protesting alleged discrimination in union hiring practices at the Rutgers housing project in Manhattan.

Birmingham: Gov. George C. Wallace denied in a television address Monday night that Birmingham is experiencing economic setbacks because of racial troubles.

Jackson, Miss.: The Mississippi Supreme Court Monday was asked to uphold a lower court order saying that Byron De La Beckwith, accused of slaying of civil rights worker Medgar Evers, is not required to have a mental examination.

At 1:15 p.m. the DFPA crews were called to the Rice Creek area south of Dillard where a fire broke out of control and burned 120 acres of green timber and logged-over areas. The firemen were assisted in controlling the blaze by the loggers employed by George Heath. The fire was controlled at about 3:30 this morning.

A non-permit fire on the property of Charley Hahn on Buckhorn Road east of Dixonville got out of control at 2:13 p.m. Monday and covered an area of 40 acres in grass and brush. DFPA crews had the fire controlled by 6 p.m.

A slash fire in the Windy Creek area east of Days Creek burned an area of 15 acres on Forest Service land and one acre on DFPA land late Monday afternoon. The South U. Douglas crew and loggers from the area extinguished the blaze.

YOUTH DENIED ASYLUM

RECHNITZ, Austria (UPI)—A 14-year-old Hungarian youth escaped across a mine field to the Iron Curtain Saturday only to be denied political asylum, Austrian authorities said today.

The young locksmith will be sent back to Hungary because of his age, they said.

## Korth's Resignation Expected To Bring Nuclear Ship Jangle

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Navy Secretary Fred Korth's resignation was expected today to fire up a controversy in the Pentagon and Congress over the future of the nuclear power for naval ships.

Intentionally or otherwise, the Texas' retirement decision served to emphasize a dispute that has smoldered for many months between the Navy and the Defense Department over the speed with which the fleet should shift to atomic propulsion.

A congressional inquiry already had been planned on the basis of Defense Secretary Robert S. McNamara's opposition to a second nuclear-powered aircraft carrier. It conceivably could be hastened and almost certainly will pit Vice Admiral Hyman G. Rickover, the atomic power expert, against McNamara in a dramatic congressional controversy.

More than a decade ago, Rickover and a few congressional supporters practically forced nuclear propulsion of submarines on a hesitant Navy. But today the outspoken admiral has the support of the Navy from Korth on down, and of the Atomic Energy Commission (AEC) in pressing for a speedier switch to atomic surface ships.

Korth submitted his resignation Monday and President Kennedy appointed Paul Nitze to fill the post.

Registration for the general sessions to begin at 2:30 p.m. today is continuing with more out-of-town arrivals hourly, according to the committee from the host church. Upwards of 300 persons are expected to be present as delegates to the three-day convention.

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## Poodle's Driving Hard On Trailers

When a French poodle which has never taken a driver's training course gets horsing around with the horsepower in an automobile parked in a trailer court — somebody's trailer is going to get whacked.

This old French poodle "proverb" was proved Tuesday morning at the Central Trailer Court at 1561 NE Diamond Lake Blvd. in Roseburg.

Trailer court manager Les Lester said a woman who resides at the court had pulled her car up near her trailer, taken it out of gear and left it idling. And she left her French Poodle in the car while she went to her trailer for a minute.

It seems the poodle put his front feet on the steering wheel to stand up and get a better view of the surroundings and one of his feet hit the shift lever, putting the car into reverse. That seemed to be the extent of his driving skills, however, as the car made a calm, uneventful trip across the court yard—until a parked trailer happened to find itself right in the car's path. It was just a minor whack into the side of the trailer, which didn't do any great damage to the car or trailer.

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## First Lady Not Alarmed By Fighting

ALGIERS (UPI)—The Algerian government said today Algerian forces have driven Moroccan troops from two disputed Sahara outposts in a two-day battle.

A bulletin, broadcast at 1 p.m. (9 a.m. EDT) by the government-controlled Algiers Radio, said:

"Troops of the Algerian National and Popular Army (ANP) have cleared out the Hassi Beida and Tinjoub sectors."

The announcement followed official reports in both Algiers and the Moroccan capital of Rabat that fighting had resumed today.

The posts are in a border area claimed by both nations. Radio Algiers said that "thousands of Algerians" are besieging barracks to ask for arms "to defend the threatened western frontier."

Extent Unknown

There was no immediate indication of the numbers of men involved in today's fighting nor the extent to which the combat zone had spread.

But reports of Monday's recapture of the two posts by the Moroccans said 1,000 men were engaged on each side.

Today King Hassan awaited the arrival in Marrakech of two Algerian emissaries to discuss the border dispute.

King Hassan said in a television speech Monday night he was willing to settle the dispute through talks.

The Algerian government claimed Monday night that thousands of Moroccan troops supported by planes and tanks invaded Algeria Sunday night and Monday morning and penetrated 20 miles into Algerian territory before being contained.

A government communique said Algerian troops were holding their ground against Moroccan attacks at the desert outposts of Hassi Beida and Tinjoub, which were occupied by Algerian troops last week in fighting in which 10 to 20 Moroccans were reported killed.

There was no mention of Hassi Mouni, a third oasis taken by Algeria last week.

Claims Fighting Violent

"The fighting is extremely violent," Foreign Minister Abdel Hasi Haziz Bouteflika said. He said the Algerian air force would go into action if necessary to repulse the Moroccans.

(In Paris, the newspaper Figaro reported from Taguimite in extreme southern Morocco that at least 10 Algerians were killed in a two-hour battle over Hassi Beida and Tinjoub.)

(The Moroccan government said in Marrakech that its troops had recaptured the border posts but did not specify whether there had been any fighting or casualties.)

(King Hassan II of Morocco said in Marrakech Monday night that his nation was ready to defend its dignity and "impose respect for our national territory and the integrity of its frontiers.")

(Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy, visiting Marrakech on vacation, was reported to be aware of the situation but "not alarmed" by it. She planned to continue her stay until Wednesday or Thursday, it was reported. Marrakech is about 200 miles from the scene of the fighting.)

Said Crisis "Vague"

(John Ferguson, U.S. ambassador to Morocco, said in Marrakech Monday night that the crisis was a "vague affair" in which "the Algerians occupied the villages along the border and the Moroccans have recaptured them.")

(There has been some movement of forces but on a smaller scale than thought," Ferguson said.)

Hassi Beida, Tinjoub and Hassi Mouni lie along the poorly defined desert frontier area southwest of the Algerian caravan junction of Colomb-Béchar. The area is about 200 miles southeast of Marrakech and 550 miles south of Algiers.

Both nations agree on the location of the fighting but each claims the territory as its own. Morocco, which achieved independence from France first and then harbored Algerian rebel troops, charges that France created the problem by its inclusion of Moroccan territory within Algeria.

## Swing Mishap Claims Child

A 3½-year-old Roberts Creek area boy was fatally injured early Monday evening when the swing set in which he was playing toppled over and he was struck by one of the upper bars on the set.

Scott Kelley Ticer, son of Mr. and Mrs. Lloyd Ticer, was fatally injured while playing on the swing set at his home, the examining physician told The News-Review. The accident occurred about 8 p.m. The boy died this morning.

He was born Feb. 23, 1960, at Safford, Ariz. He had lived in the Roseburg area for the last month, coming here from Safford.

Survivors are his parents; two brothers, Lloyd Lee Jr. and William L.; a sister, Sheila Kim, all of Roseburg; his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Iva Hennessey of Safford; paternal grandmother, Mrs. Bessie Ticer of Waxahachie, Tex.

The body will be taken to the Caldwell Funeral Home at Safford, where funeral services will be held. Long & Shukle Memorial Chapel is in charge of local arrangements.

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## Council Approves Documents For Elderly Housing Project

Roseburg's City Council Monday night approved preliminary documents which will initiate local application for a federal-financed housing project for elderly persons.

The council okayed a motion by Robert Norton to adopt a resolution which provides city approval for the Douglas County Housing Authority to proceed with planning the housing units.

The resolution also authorized the housing office to make a request to the Public Housing Administration for a federal grant not to exceed \$6,000 for surveys

and planning in connection with a low-rent housing project of about 30 dwelling units.

Pact Executed

The resolution also executes a cooperative agreement between the city and housing authority. In this agreement, certain responsibilities of the city are defined.

In another action, the Public Works Department was instructed to prepare plans and specifications for a street improvement project on West Greenwood Street after receiving a petition from property owners asking for a street assessment district.

The paving project requested would extend on Greenwood from Harvard south to the terminus of the street. The petition requested a standard paving section of 35 feet width back to back of curb, with no side walks.

Seven separate properties were represented by the signers. The signers indicate they represent 62.4 per cent of the front footage involved.

The council also adopted plans and specifications for improvement of the municipal swimming pool, as recommended by the city Park and Playground Commission, and called for bids for West Coast F-27s.

Improvements to the pool will include a new filter system, recirculation system modification, new boiler and hot water generator, bathroom remodeling, storage building and windbreak.

A report from the Planning Commission recommending denial of a setback variance request for Lot 34 (Maynard's Works Department was instructed to prepare plans and specifications for a street improvement project on West Greenwood Street after receiving a petition from property owners asking for a street assessment district.

The council instructed the city attorney to prepare an ordinance setting public hearing on the annexation request is 3:26 acres lying immediately east of NW Vale Court.

On the recommendation of the Mayor Thomas Garrison, the council moved to enlist the services of Robert T. Lamson, a Seattle aviation consultant, in connection with the airport problem. Lamson will be employed to make an airport analysis to determine if anything can be done to make the facility operational, and called for bids for West Coast F-27s.
