Mrs. Doerner Returns Home

Last summer Mrs. Charles (Olive) Doerner set out on a trip with her daughter's family that took her by air to Singapore.

Before arriving, there, the party visited Honolulu, Hong Kong and Bangkok. Her daughter, Maurine, is the wife of Larry Aenis, the newly appointed regional manager in southeast Asia for the Ortho Pharmaceutical Co., a branch of Mead and Johnson Drugs. Mr. and Mrs. Aenis have a 2½-year-old daughter who accompanied them. Mrs. Doerner was a houseguest of her children for seven months, in Singapore.

The eight-room—\$500 a month home that the drug company furnishes for the family in the British American section of the city is beautiful in setting and style, and the furniture is of the choicest teakwood. The spacious lawn is terraced and planted richly with fine shrubs and flowers.

Because Mrs. Doerner is a registered x-ray technician she was especially interested in the way they conducted their work in the Oriental hospital and made friends of Dr. and Mrs. Thabandansen, the former administrator for the government hospital there. The head of the southeast Asia Plan-

ned Parenthood, a Mrs. Goa, became a close friend also of Mrs. Doerner. These three were members of the church she attended there. Because of the language barrier she could not often attend the church of Rev. and Mrs. John Lu whom she had entertained in her home at Melrose a few years ago when he spoke at the Melrose Community church. They carry on the work of the Chinese Native Evangelism group—similar in scope and activity to the American Sunday School Unions of this country.

The Wesleyan Methodist church conducted all their services in English, though the congregation is composed of Chinese, Indian, Malayan and Caucasian peoples. The pastor is an American missionary by the name of Teilmann who had been born and educated in the United States, interned in a Japanese Concentration Camp during World War 2 and a chaplain throughout the Korean war.

Mrs. Doerner was impressed with the close home ties in Singapore. The discipline is firm but loving and there is very little juvenile delinquency. She observed a deep reverence in the worship services on the part of adults, young people and little children. Of special interest to her was the splendid Junior Church program that the Wesleyan Methodist Church had. The dress of the children was colorful: All Chinese boys wear short or long black trousers with white tunics to church while the girls wear black trousers with bright tops. The Malayan boys and girls all wear wrap around skirts—just a strip of bright colored material and a long blouse to their knees over this, but when they all go to school everybody wears uniforms. The skirts for the girls and trousers for the boys will be in a bright color, perhaps red, orange or blue—depending on the school colors, but all the skirts and all the blouses for school are always white.

Because the family had a maid and house boy full time to take care of the meals, the laundry and the housecleaning tasks, Mrs. Doerner was free most of the time to take care of her little granddaughter, Kelly (Kelleen Noel). Though Kelly was only two years old she quickly picked up bits of several different languages and will no doubt be quite versatile at the end if her parents' two year assignment there.

The drug company for which Larry Aenis works plans to send the family back to America via a delightful trip through Europe. Mrs. Doerner is still considered part of the "Family Plan" and her children are urging her to return soon, perhaps next summer, so that she, too, may accompany them to Germany, France, Italy, England and as they finally land back in New York in the summer of 1964. She is presently working in the offices of Drs. Holst and Weaver.
