

# School Board Gives Architect Green Light On Building Plans

Eugene architect John Briscoe Wednesday night received the green light on his preliminary plans for a three-story building addition to Roseburg High School from the District 4 School Board.

Briscoe presented colored slides showing the interior classroom arrangements as well as exterior views of the new building in relation to the present high school complex. Total budgeted amount for the building is about \$422,000.

The first story of the building will be a "commons," or special type of multipurpose room which can be used for student lunchroom activities as well as for division into team teaching areas. The middle story will be a mathematics section and the language arts department will be located on the upper story.

One board member commented after the presentation that this was the most functional and realistic building he's seen designed for Roseburg's schools in a long time.

## Indian Cave Hit By Abuse Of Visitors

The Dog Creek Indian Cave area, made accessible this year by trail development, is already suffering abuse at the hands of visitors, reports Mrs. Arthur Selby, correspondent.

Located in the North Umpqua Ranger District of the Umpqua National Forest, the cave is three miles by trail from Dry Creek Store. The store is 49 miles east of Roseburg.

The cave is an authentic historical site. Original pictographs on the walls of the cave, artifacts scattered throughout the area, and piles of animal bones within the cave, give evidence that early Indian hunters lived and camped there, according to Richard D. Harlan, publicity officer at Steamboat Ranger Station.

Since the cave area was made available to the public about one year ago, there is evidence of visitation by modern civilization. The area—which includes other geographical phenomena such as natural arches, rock chimneys and rare plant known as kalmiopsis lechiana—has been dug up and screened, presumably for artifact souvenirs.

Harlan said the piles of animal bones are now scattered carelessly over the cave floor, and the original pictographs including pictures of animals, people and the Indian calendars have been added to by modern civilization. Harlan said the modern pictographs indicate the modern civilization has a degenerate mind.

This request was made by Oregon State University and the state Department of Education.

Deller said that if utilizing an intern in this program resulted in attempts to offer vocational courses in ninth grade in the junior high schools, this might be a wise course to follow. He said he thought the board should give some consideration to this as an elective course for ninth graders. There are presently 47 students taking vocational agriculture in the three-year high school.

The board ordered school district attorney George Neuner to draw up specifications for bids on a contract for providing buses for District 4 transportation. Present holder of this contract is Ellison Transportation Co. of Roseburg. Bid specifications will be offered as soon as they are completed.

School Board member Don Kruse was appointed as District 4 delegate to the Oregon School Study Council.

## Tito To Visit White House

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Marshal Tito of Yugoslavia, the "independent" Communist who seeks friendly ties with both East and West arrives today for an informal but highly significant visit with President Kennedy.

The Yugoslav president, fresh from a Latin American tour, was flying to Washington (11:45 a.m. EDT) from Williamsburg, Va., where he arrived Wednesday from Mexico City.

Tito was spending only six hours in the U. S. capital. He planned to return to Williamsburg for the night and fly to California Friday. He is scheduled to address the United Nations before leaving for home Oct. 25.

## Gets Official Welcome

While his visit was listed as informal by the State Department—in an apparent effort to forestall criticism in Congress—Tito was to get the red carpet treatment usually accorded an official state visitor.

A 21-gun salute and other military honors were scheduled when his helicopter sets down on the White House lawn. The only exception to the routine: no parade through the city was planned for Tito.

The White House and State Department, fearful of possible refugee demonstrations against the 71-year-old ex-partisan leader, kept his public appearances to a minimum.

Kennedy and Tito were expected after an afternoon (5 p.m. EDT) conference to issue a communique. The Yugoslav leader has indicated he will talk with newsmen after the White House meeting.

## Sutherlin Board Approves Plans For Music Facility

Final plans for music room facilities at the high school were approved by the Sutherlin School Board at its last meeting and a call for bids was authorized. Payne & Struble is the architectural firm.

The new facilities will replace the cottage and band room being used presently. By constructing music facilities, it will be possible to eliminate the hazard of the band room protruding into Fourth St. and convert the structure to needed classroom space. Renovation of the band room may be delayed temporarily by a shortage of funds, according to Mrs. William Blakeley, correspondent.

A report on classroom enrollments was heard by the board. Presently, the Sutherlin district has an all-time high of 1,375 students. It was pointed out by Supt. Ray Mullen that four elementary grades are overcrowded, even though an additional classroom was opened this fall. Some primary grades average in excess of 30 children per room, and several intermediate grades have "wall to wall" children, it was reported.

Upon the recommendation of the superintendent the overcrowded condition at the second grade will be alleviated by setting up a temporary classroom in the East School library. The board authorized hiring an additional teacher as soon as one may be retained. The superintendent was also authorized to hire a parttime teacher aide to assist teachers in other crowded classrooms. Enrollment trends are being carefully watched and additional classroom construction could become a very real possibility if enrollment excesses continue, Mullen said.

## Two Jail Escapes Net 10-Year Term

BURNS (UPI)—Leonard Bogue, 17, whose two escapes from the city-county jail brought about the resignation of a jailer, was sentenced to 10 years in the Oregon Correctional Institution Wednesday.

Bogue, of Salem, was sentenced by Circuit Judge Jeff Dorroh Jr. on a grand larceny charge. He also received a concurrent three-year sentence for unlawful flight from custody.

Bogue broke out of the jail Sept. 28 and again last Saturday while awaiting a court appearance on auto theft charges. Both times he locked jailer Harold Weatherhead in a cell and took his keys. Each time the lock had to be drilled off to free the jailer.

After a 36-hour stay behind bars the last time, Weatherhead resigned.

Judge Dorroh ordered a presentence investigation for Patrick Penrod, 18, of Salem, who joined Bogue in the first escape. John King, 27, of the U.S. Air Force, who was Bogue's partner in the second escape, is still at large. Bogue was arrested Monday in Salem.
