

LA Dodgers Get \$12,794 Share Of Series Money

NEW YORK (UPI)—In major league baseball it sometimes does not matter whether you win or lose but how many people you attract to the game.

A case in point is the New York Yankees who were not quite an artistic success in the 1963 World Series, bowing to the Los Angeles Dodgers in four straight games. Yet it was disclosed Wednesday by Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick that the Yankees regulars will receive a record losers cut of \$7,874.32 per man, or \$485.14 more than New York got for defeating the Cincinnati Reds in the 1961 Series.

To the victors go the bigger spoils, however, and so those Dodgers who were voted a full share will each receive a sum of \$12,794 per capita, an all-time Series mark. Both sums are the result of the first \$1 million player pool in history.

To achieve the record figure, which is \$1,562.82 more than they earned for winning the 1959 Series from the Chicago White Sox, the Dodgers voted 32.8 shares, including 29 full cuts. The Yankees, on the other hand, voted 35.75 shares with



ERNE KNOX dies after fight

Knox Death Being Probed

BALTIMORE, Md. (UPI)—A doctor from the Baltimore medical examiner's office said Thursday that the body of deceased boxer Ernie Knox weighed only 153 pounds—considerably less than the 178 pounds announced at the weigh-in for his fatal bout.

Dr. Charles S. Petty said Knox' body was weighed three times to make sure that observation was correct.

Knox, 26-year-old Baltimore hood-carrier and part-time boxer, died Wednesday morning from brain injuries after being knocked out Monday night by heavyweight Wayne Beetha of New York.

The weights for that bout were announced as 205 for Beetha and 178 for Knox. Upon learning of the latest disclosures, the Baltimore state attorney said that a state boxing commission records of the fight between Knox and Beetha would be presented to a special session of the city grand jury today.

Dr. Petty, in commenting on the discrepancy between the weight of Knox' body and that announced at Monday's weigh-in, said:

"I would consider it unusual if the victim lost more than five or six pounds in the two days that elapsed between the time he was weighed for the fight and the time I weighed the body. All you had to do was look at the body to see that it didn't weigh 178 pounds. 'It is inescapable,' Dr. Petty continued, 'that the guy (Knox) just didn't weigh that much.'"

Brian Sternberg Continues Battle To Walk Once More

SEATTLE (UPI)—Three and a half months ago Brian Sternberg was literally on top of the world. He held the pole vaulting record of 16 feet, 8 inches and his future looked bright. The sky was his limit.

Today, the accomplishment of which he is most proud, is that he can sit up, although only for short periods and in a wheel chair. In many ways, that is more of an achievement than his setting a world vaulting mark.

This brave new world of Brian Sternberg began on the night of July 2 when he came down on his neck while doing acrobatic tricks on a trampoline, a device on which he was most proficient.

The accident caused a spinal injury that left him paralyzed from the neck down. He was taken to the University Hospital here and there he has been since.

From the beginning, doctors have told the 20-year-old University of Washington student

the exact truth of his situation. Spinal cord damage is not easily repaired. Chances are he is grounded for life.

But Sternberg refuses to resign. He started self-therapy by trying to move a finger. His persistence paid off. What would be considered minimal achievements to the average person become feats of strength to Brian.

He not only can move his fingers now, but his arms as well. His next goal is to turn the pages of a book, and soon, perhaps, with the help of a special mechanical device he may be able to feed himself.

His doctors refused to predict how far Brian will progress but they agree that so far his progress has been satisfactory within the limits of his nervous system.

Brian, himself, is looking forward with faith to the day he can crawl out of his hospital bed and walk out the door for good.

And in preparation for that time he now spends his days fully dressed, just like the students on the campus.
