

Details Of Hatfield's Proposed Cuts In Oregon Budget Revealed

SALEM (UPI) — Details of a proposed \$43.6 million cutback in state services, called for Wednesday by Gov. Mark Hatfield, were revealed today.

Basic school support would be cut \$10.8 million and capital construction for higher education and community colleges would be slashed \$11.2 million.

Cuts in general fund agency operating funds would amount to \$21.6 million.

Enactment of a one-shot speedup of withholding tax collections would add \$12 million to the biennium's receipts.

Legislative approval is needed for the basic school cuts, and the one-shot revenue speedup.

The cuts and added income would total \$55.6 million. Anticipated fund reversions of from \$2-to-\$4 million would keep the state's general fund operations in the black.

Largest slash in operating funds \$6.1 million, is in the Board of Higher Education's budget.

State institutions were slashed \$3.5 million.

Welfare services were cut \$2.9 million.

The Department of Education was slashed \$1.5 million.

The \$3.2 million for salary increases for state employees was eliminated, as was \$1.5 million for higher education faculty pay hikes.

The Finance and Administration Department ordered all agencies to put the cuts into effect immediately.

Officials said they would be unable to determine how many state employees would be laid off until some time next week.

Slashes in other departments ranged from \$399 to more than \$566,000.

The Department of Education was slashed \$1.5 million.

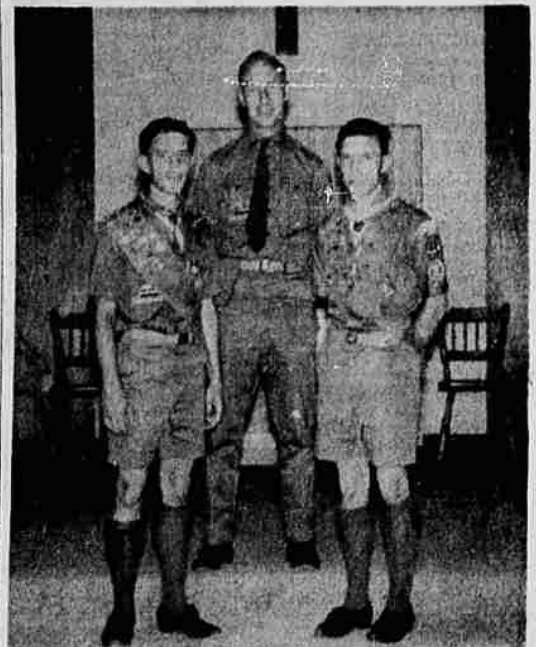

Soviet Wheat Sales May Cost Taxpayers

SPOKANE (UPI) — Sales of wheat to Russia may prove most costly to the American taxpayer-consumer than a lot of them realize, a grain official said recently.

Merrill D. Sather, executive secretary of the Pacific Northwest Grain Dealers Association, said Canadian and proposed American wheat sales to Russia already have pushed the wheat market up.

"For every cent per bushel the price of wheat in the United States goes up, the cost to the American consumer is about \$15.5 million," Sather said.

"It will take only a two-cent average increase over the crop year to offset the \$30-million which the U.S. Department of Agriculture estimates will be saved in a year in storage costs

by reducing our surplus by 150 million bushels," he said. Sather explained the increased costs would result from higher subsidy payments on the wheat we export and higher prices on the wheat we use domestically.

DROUGHT TO CONTINUE

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Weather Bureau says the dry spell will continue along the Eastern Seaboard but the central United States should get some drought relief.

In a 30-day weather outlook, issued Wednesday, the bureau said precipitation is expected to remain subnormal in the eastern quarter of the nation, except in the extreme southeast, but "substantial rains" should occur over the central states.
