BONN, Germany (UPI) — Chancellor Ludwig Erhard said today his new government supports continued U.S. negotiations with the Soviet Union aimed at partial agreements to relieve cold war tensions.

Hunter Slays Big Bull Elk

A candidate for the 1963 hunting season's meanest and least sportsmanlike gun-wielder came to light this week when loggers in the Vincent Creek area near Greenacres came upon the dead carcass of a magnificent elk.

The elk had died in a beaver pond where he had obviously sought water to overcome the fever from a gunshot wound. He had been shot in the right shoulder and abandoned in the woods, to hobble away and die.

The creature had an antler spread of 38 inches, and his antlers carried seven points. He weighed an estimated 800 pounds. State police were referring disposition of the huge carcass to the State Game Commission biologist.

State patrolmen Bob Snyder of the Game enforcement division and Arlen S. Mard brought the elk into Reedsport. They pointed out that the careless gun-wielder could be charged with at least two serious game offenses: Killing elk out of season and wanton waste of a game animal.

He could be subject to up to \$500 fine and six months in the county jail on either charge.

The elk had lived about four days after being wounded, it is estimated.

Nhu Says S. Viet Nam People Have Lost Confidence In U.S.

By NEIL SHEEHAN SAIGON, South Viet Nam (UPI) — Ngo Dinh Nhu, brother and political adviser of President Ngo Dinh Diem, said Thursday that the Vietnamese people "have lost confidence in the United States."

Ngo, like his wife Mme. Ngo Dinh Nhu a frequent critic of U.S. policy here, repeated charges that U.S. intelligence officials tried to stage a coup against the Ngo family.

He spoke to a group of foreign newsmen in an interview at the presidential palace amid new Communist claims of victories in the guerrilla war against Diem's government.

Broadcasts from Hanoi, North Viet Nam, claimed that Communist Viet Cong guerrillas had killed or captured 75,000 enemy troops — including 600 Americans — in the first nine months of this year.

They claimed 350 aircraft shot down or hit and the

struction of 4,752 "strategic hamlets," a series of fortified villages developed by Nhu. He said the same was true of "relations between the United States and the whole of the underdeveloped world." He did not elaborate.

Ngo criticized the U.S. curtailment of commercial aid to Viet Nam, part of the \$1.5 billion the United States was spending daily here.

He said if the suspension of commercial aid continues, "it will certainly affect the war effort" and would force his government to dig into its foreign exchange reserves.
