

Snowdrops, Crocuses In Now, Will Be First Spring Bloomers

The snowdrop (Galanthus) one of the earliest of the spring flowers, sometimes appears before the snow is entirely off the ground. It grows from a small bulb and has somewhat grass-like leaves and snowwhite, drooping blossoms.

The whole plant is but 4 to 6 inches high. The bulbs are quite hardy. They should be planted 2 inches deep and 2 or 3 inches apart in the lawn or in the border.

"Snowdrop" is also the name of a plant in the amaryllis family. It gets its name from its very delicate white blossoms which seem to be made of snow and grows in many parts of the world. It is one of the hardiest outdoor plants. In England the people call the plant the "Fair Maid of February."

They are easy to cultivate as the bulbs can be planted in a sheltered place in early fall and left to themselves and require very little attention.

Another early blooming flower is the crocus.
