Rodriguez Decisions S. McClure

NEW YORK (UPI)—Former welterweight champion Luis Rodriguez of Cuba probably will get another shot at the 147-pound crown in February because of his impressive victory over previously unbeaten Wilbert (Skeeter) McClure, middleweight contender.

Matchmaker Teddy Brenner of Madison Square Garden, where Rodriguez unanimously beat McClure in their nationally televised fight Friday night, said today:

"I'm pretty sure I can match Luis and champion Emile Griffith for a third title fight in February."

Rodriguez, who won and lost in two title fights with Griffith this year, felled 24-year-old McClure of Toledo, Ohio once and gave him a close-quarter battering before about 4,500 in the Garden's first Friday-night television fight in three years.

The 10-round decision broke taller and heavier McClure's professional victory string at 14 straight. And despite the many low punches that Skeeter complained about to the referee, he praised Rodriguez as a "great fighter" because of his persistent, close-quarter attack.

Well-spoken McClure is a graduate of Toledo University and a winner of the Olympic light middleweight title in 1960. Although 26-year-old Rodriguez weighed only 150½ pounds to McClure's 159½, he was favored at 2-1 because of his speed, stamina and ruggedness.

Saints.

Smith Opens Scoring
Jerry Smith opened the scoring for Drain Friday night when he powered into the endzone from the Creswell 11 yard line.

Early in the second quarter, Mark Thomas made it 12-0 by pounding over from the 5 yard line. Thomas came back later in the same period to score from the 2 yard line. Smith ran the point after touchdown following Thomas' second score and put Drain out in front 19-0.

Also in the second quarter, Smith plunged over from the one yard line to send Drain ahead 25-0.

Lakey Intercepts
Following a scoreless third period, the Warriors scored their final touchdown when wingback Don Lakey intercepted a lateral in the Creswell backfield and ran 40 yards for the score.

Starting fullback Frank Backus and Thomas were both injured during the game, but neither seriously.

Statistic-wise, it was Drain all the way, as they picked up 412 yards rushing and 128 passing, as compared to 67 on the ground and 24 in the air for Creswell.

Drain had 12 first downs, to six for the Bulldogs. Drain completed five of 14 passes and had two intercepted, while Creswell completed four of 15 and had four intercepted. Punting, Drain kicked once for 35 yards, while the Bulldogs averaged 33 yards on five kicks. The Warriors were penalized 13 times for 95 yards, while Creswell drew one five-yard penalty.

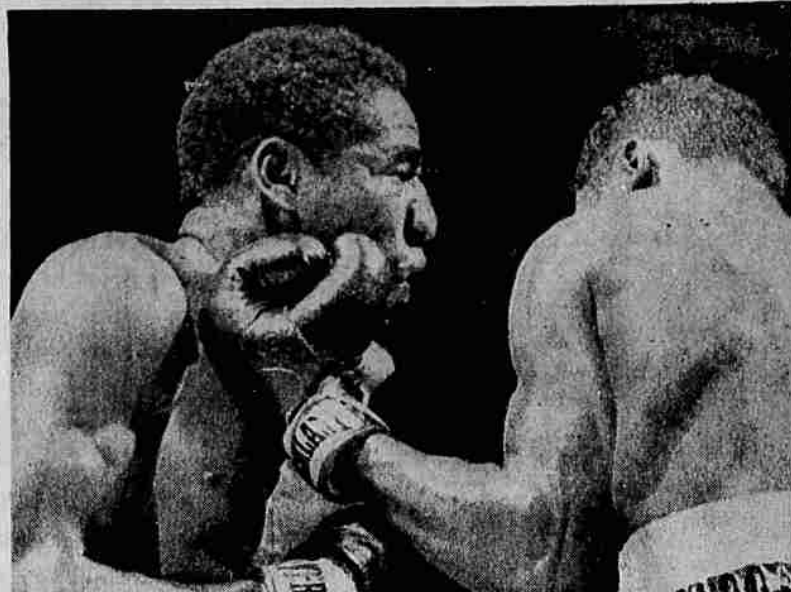

Elk's Hide Roundup Brings Good Results

Mickey Mantle's Surgery Is Termed As Successful

NEW YORK (UPI)—Mickey Mantle's knee operation was "a complete success" and the New York Yankees are hoping to see him in tip-top shape again when he reports to spring training in February.

Dr. Sidney Gaynor, the Yankees' team physician who performed surgery for the removal of cartilage in Mantle's left knee at Lenox Hill Hospital Friday, said "everything went according to plan."

Mantle, given a general anesthetic for the operation, was resting comfortably in his hospital room today although he was receiving no calls.

"There's no reason why he shouldn't be able to report to spring training on time," Gaynor said. "And by the start of the season he should be completely recovered and ready to play."

The Yankees' physician pointed out the operation was less serious than one which Mantle had performed for torn cartilage in his right knee during November of 1953, after which he reported to spring training

Crunican Tops Mark At CC Meet

Mike Crunican continues to break records nearly every time out of the starting blocks, but the Roseburg Indians have had their share of trouble in winning cross country meets.

Crunican set a new course record at Grants Pass Friday as he toured the 1.8 mile course in a record shattering eight minutes and 57 seconds. The victory gives Crunican a perfect record of five straight victories—four of which have been new course records.

However, despite the Tribe's triumph, the local team could do no better than a second place finish. The three-way meet was won by the host Grants Pass Cavemen with 37½ points, with Roseburg placing a close second with 41½ points.

Medford's Black Tornado runners came in a tight third with 43 points.

The Indians appeared to have the meet won as Gary McClung was running well up in the top six going into the final 600 yards. At this point Gary McClung lost a shoe and finished the race on the rocky terrain with one bare foot—and as a result dropped back to 11th place in the final order.

Bill McClung came in third for the Indians with a 9:27 clocking, nipping Grants Pass' Daryl Close at the finish line. Close was timed at 9:28.

Other Indians placing in the meet included: Barry Grant, tie for 12th; Lloyd Veach, 14th; Don Delaney, 18th; and John Gutierrez, 19th.

In the Jayvee action Grants Pass took team honors with 16 points, followed by Roseburg with 82 and Medford with 88. Four Grants Pass Jayvees crossed the finish line in order to pace their team. Darrell Elliott was the top finisher for the Indians reserves. Elliott came in eighth with a clocking of 10:13.

Smokey Scores 3 Times In Vital 20-13 Victory

Bob (Smokey) Burgess' brilliant one-man show salvaged the Midwestern League lead for the Roseburg Indians and kept their perfect season's record intact.

Burgess emerged as the hero, rushing for 232 yards and running for all three Roseburg touchdowns, as the Tribe nipped the previously unbeaten Cottage Grove Lions, 20-13, Friday in a District 5-A-1 crucial at Cottage Grove.

The fleet Roseburg halfback thrilled the many fans who traveled north to see the battle with TD gallops of 71, 47 and 36 yards. Burgess carried the ball 15 times for 232 yards—an average of 15.5 yards-per-carry. As a team the Indians gained only 263 yards on the ground.

Along with the spectacular running of Burgess, a pair of costly Lion fumbles added the Indians' cause. On the first drive of the game the home team bobbled on the Roseburg 22, then with less than three minutes remaining to play in the contest another Lion fumble gave the Indians possession on their own 14. Jon Burnham, defensive star, recovered both vital fumbles which halted Cottage Grove drives.

Alan Richards, Cottage Grove's super-star, rambled for 129 yards on 21 carries as the rugged Indian defense was unable to stop the hard-charging left halfback. Charles Darden added 75 yards on 12 carries for the Lions, while Mark Henningsgaard completed 10 of 17 aerial attempts for 127 yards. Henningsgaard had an 8-10 record in the first half.

Defensive standouts for the Indians were Mike Leep, Burnham and Dick Gwaltney. Mike Leep was credited with 15 tackles. Burnham had 12 along with his two timely fumble recoveries and Gwaltney collected 10 tackles.

Hampered by penalties, the Indians had trouble getting started in the all-important district 5-A-1 counter, and as a result the Lions drew first blood. Midway through the first quarter the Lions got the ball on their own 11-yard marker.

With Richards and Darden eating up the yardage on the ground and Henningsgaard throwing to the same two backs, the Lions marched 89 yards in 12 plays. The payoff play came as Richards took a pitchout and swept around his own right end for the final 17 yards. Charles Olds kicked the extra point, and with two seconds left in the first quarter, the Lions enjoyed a 7-0 advantage.

Burgess and the Indians wasted little time in evening the score. The kickoff was returned to the Roseburg 38 just as the first quarter ended.

On the first play Jim Beamer was trapped behind the line

of scrimmage for a nine-yard loss—thus setting the scene for Burgess' 71-yard scamper. Burgess took the ball on a quick opener, burst through the line over his own left guard and before the Lions could figure out what was happening the Roseburg speedster was in the clear, where he outtraced the defenders. Alan Young kicked the PAT, and with a mere 45

seconds of the second quarter gone by the score was deadlocked at seven-all.

Late in the first half the Lions used Richards' power and Henningsgaard's accuracy passing to march to the Roseburg 15 before the invaders dug in and stopped the drive.

Returning fired up after the halftime intermission, the Indians were quick to capitalize on Burgess' speed again. Mike Leep returned the opening kick to the Cottage Grove 49 and Craig Engle picked up three yards on the next play. Burgess, breaking into the clear on the same quick opener, galloped untouched to paydirt—47 yards this time. Young's kick was blocked.

The Lions came roaring back with a drive of their own. Taking over on the Cottage Grove 14, Richards ripped off 18 yards on the first play and a 15-yard penalty against the Tribe moved the ball to the 45-yard marker. Following two short gainers, another 15-yard penalty aided the Lions.

Richards hit the right side for 12 yards and Darden went off left tackle for five to put the ball on the Roseburg 22.

At this point Henningsgaard connected with Olds on a quick look-in pass on the 18-yard line. Olds side-stepped would be tacklers, raced across the field and down the left sideline for the TD. Olds' kick was off to the right.

The Indians clinched the win only seconds later, taking the ensuing kick 60 yards in four plays. Engle's 20-yard gainer around left end set up the scoring play. On a second down situation Burgess battled his way over right tackle, taking the pitch from Beamer right at the line of scrimmage, kicked up his heels for 36 yards and the deciding tally. Young kicked the extra point.

The victory keeps the Indians at the top of the heap in Midwestern League play with a 6-0 record, while Cottage Grove now is in second with a 5-1 mark. Marshfield has a 4-1 record, and will play South Eugene tonight. The Indians have a showdown battle set with the Marshfield 11 Nov. 2 on the Pirates' home grounds.

In spite of having the biggest score, the Indians found themselves on the short end as far as the game statistics were concerned. Cottage Grove held a 22-10 advantage in first downs, and the Lions gained a net total of 339 yards, compared to Roseburg's total of 295. All of the Lions' edge was in the air where they had 127 yards, while Roseburg completed only two of six attempts for 32 yards. Penalties set the Indians back 75 yards.

Riddle 11 Edges Sutherlin 32-26

Mike Markham fired four touchdowns passes to lead the Riddle Irish to a thrilling 32-26 win over the Sutherlin Bulldogs in an Umpqua Valley League game at Riddle Friday night.

Markham tossed the pigskin for two touchdowns in the first half and then came back with another pair of pitches into paydirt in the third quarter to pace the Irish to their second UVAL win in three outings. The Bulldogs now have a 1-2 league mark.

Ruckel Top Runner
On the ground, it was fullback Larry Ruckel leading the way for the winners, as he picked up 150 of the Irish's 184 yards gained on the ground. Alan Grauf paced the Bulldogs by scoring twice and adding a pair of extra points.

Grauf got things started out on the right foot for the Bulldogs in the first quarter as he powered his way into paydirt from 21 yards out early in the period. A run attempt for the PAT fell short.

Riddle came bouncing right back, as Markham, a junior passing ace, fired a 13-yard touchdown toss to Charles Preston. Riddle's running try for the PAT also failed, and the score was knotted up 6-6 at the end of the first quarter.

Midway in the second quarter,

er, Markham once again found the mark, this time hitting Art Fisher with a 6-yard touchdown pass. Tom Morrison ran the point after, sending Riddle out in front 13-6 at the half.

Markham Hits Again
Riddle moved out in front 19-6 early in the third quarter when Markham connected with Gary Paetz for 15 yards and another touchdown. After an exchange of the ball, the Irish fumbled on their own four and Sutherlin recovered. On the first play from scrimmage, Grauf powered over from the four, to make it 19-12.

Markham and Paetz joined forces again that quarter, with Paetz taking a 10-yard pass from the junior quarterback for the Irish's fourth touchdown.

Behind 25-12, the Bulldogs kept right after the Irish and scored on a 26-yard run by Randy Denley early in the final period. Grauf ran the PAT to make it 25-19.

Ruckel broke over from three yards out for the Irish with six minutes left in the game and

then ran with the extra point to make it 32-19.

Facing a clock as well as the Irish, Sutherlin bounced right back with a 53-yard pass from Don Goertzen to Mike Ouellette and Grauf once again ran the PAT, making it 32-26.

Sutherlin got possession of the ball again, and traveled all the way to the Riddle 8 yard line before time ran out on them. Paetz and Art Fisher received the nod as the Irish's top defensive players of the game, while Markham and Ruckel got the nod on offense.

In the statistics department, Sutherlin picked up 17 first downs, as compared to 16 for Riddle. The Bulldogs out-gained the Irish 212 yards to 184 on the ground, but the Irish won the passing contest with 141 yards to Sutherlin's 132. Riddle completed 9 of 15 passes and Sutherlin connected on 7 of 10, having one intercepted. Riddle lost four fumbles and the Bulldogs lost two. Punting was pretty even, with the Irish averaging 34 yards on two punts and

the Bulldogs 32 yards on two kicks. The Irish were penalized five times for 75 yards and the Bulldogs five times for 65 yards.
