Unleashing a determined attack, the Elkton Elks recorded a thrilling 13-6 upset victory over the host Oakland Oaks Friday in a crucial Bico-Trico B League grid encounter.

The Oakland defeat moved the Yoncalla Eagles into the No. 1 position in league play with a 3-0 record, in spite of the Eagles being idle Friday. The victory for the Elks kept them in the running for the conference crown, moving Elkton into a second place tie with the Oaks. Elkton and Oakland sport identical 3-1 league records.

Elks Dominate Play
Elkton dominated the game from start to finish, though it took a fourth quarter tally to clinch the victory. After an exchange of punts early in the game, the Elks downed the Oaks on the Oakland three-yard marker.

Oakland tried three running plays, then punted—giving the visitors possession on the Oakland 28. Six plays later quarterback Don Suloff put the Elks in the lead as he scored on a sneak from one-yard out early in the second quarter.

Later in the same period, the powerful Oaks grabbed a punt on their own 35 and marched for the tying TD in two plays. After a five-yard gainer, Keith Crenshaw broke loose over a tackle hole and galloped 59 yards for the six points.

In the third quarter the Elks completely dominated the play, though they could not score. The winners had drives to the Oakland 30 before punting, to the 25 before losing the ball on

a fumble and to the Oaks 20 before running out of downs. While sparkling on offense, the Elks held the home team to a minus six yards rushing in the third quarter.

Oakland Starts Drive
At the end of the third period Oakland started a drive from its own 17, and went to the Elkton 19 before running out of steam. Elkton took over at this point and surged to the game deciding TD.

Suloff connected with John Levenhagen for a 47-yard pass, then hit Gary Brooks for a 18-yarder. Following a couple of running plays, Suloff took to the air again and gained 12 yards on a pass to Levenhagen which moved the ball inside the Oakland one-yard line. Suloff scored on a keeper three plays later after two passes fell incomplete. The PAT was added on a pass from Levenhagen to Chuck Swinehart.

Suloff, Ken Adams and Levenhagen paced the Elkton running attack, while Les Jones played an outstanding game in the line. Randy Manley was the top carrier for the Oaks. Statistics for the game found the Elks getting 11 first downs, gaining 105 yards rushing and 103 yards passing on seven of 10 completions. The Elks intercepted one pass, punted three times for an average of 32 yards, lost one fumble and were penalized twice for 24 yards. Oakland had nine first downs, 160 yards rushing, completed eight of 16 passes for 83 yards, punted four times for an average of 28 yards, lost one fumble and was penalized five times for 25 yards.

In other league action Friday the Powers Cruisers rolled to a 14-6 victory over the Lowell Raiders.

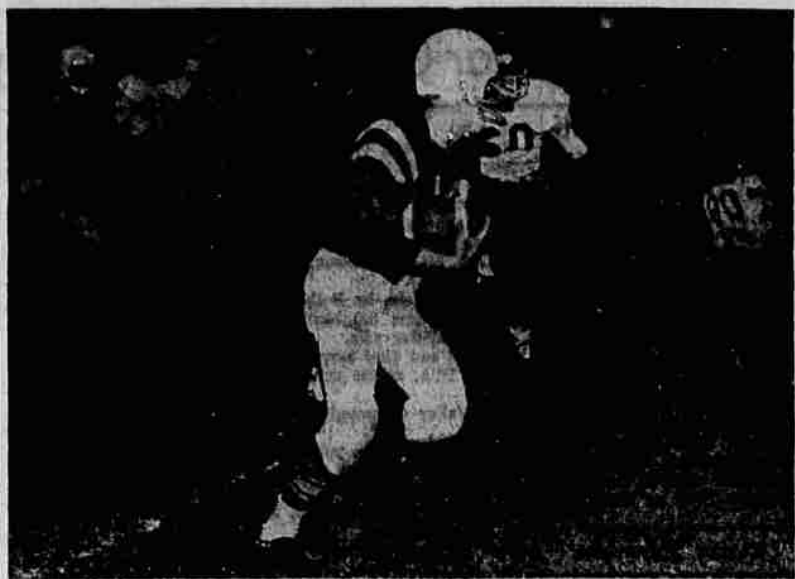

GAINS SECOND ROUND
BARCELONA, Spain (UPI)—Barcelona gained the second round of the European Cup of soccer winners tournament on Wednesday by completing an aggregate 5-1 victory over Shelbourne of the Republic of Ireland in the final game, 3-1.

Breaking in their new lights, the Douglas Trojans continued to dominate Umpqua Valley League play Friday by rolling to a decisive 44-7 triumph over the invading Glendale Pirates.

The victory gives the Trojans a perfect 3-0 record in conference play with only two games remaining. The Trojans still must face the Riddle Irish, 2-1, and the Myrtle Creek Vikings, 1-1.

Douglas wasted little time, scoring first with only one and a half minutes of playing time having elapsed. The Trojans kicked off to start the game, then recovered a Glendale fumble on the first play from scrimmage. Two plays later Dan Withers tossed a 25-yard TD bomb to Russ Anderson.

Heard Pounds Over
Later in the first quarter the home team struck again, this time with fullback Jim Heard breaking loose and diving the final three yards.

Heard was the big-gun for the Trojans as he carried nine times for a total of 78 yards and accounted for three TDs. Heard's six-pointers came on runs of three, 21 and one yards.

In calling the signals, Withers guided the Trojans to one of their best appearances of the season. The flashy quarterback completed seven of 14 aerial attempts for 123 yards and two TDs. In addition he scored in the second quarter on a 20-yard romp.

After building up a 13-0 first quarter lead, the Trojans romped on to a 25-0 halftime advantage. Chuck Person tallied six points on a 46-yard pass-run play in the second period and Withers broke loose for his TD run.

In the third quarter Heard powered his way for 21 yards and another TD, while the two fourth quarter scores came on a one-yard run by Heard and a 19-yard jaunt by Don Mincher.

Pirates Score
The Pirates closed out the scoring when Chester Buck galloped 13 yards to paydirt. Gary Brown kicked two PATs for Douglas and H. B. Clark ran for Glendale's extra point.

Though the invaders held a 13-9 advantage on first downs, Douglas outgained the Pirates, 194 yards to 146 rushing. Passing the winners completed eight of 18 passes for 191 yards and Glendale connected on three of

Storer Seeking Eagle Franchise

PHILADELPHIA, Pa. (UPI)—George B. Storer of Miami, Fla., Friday confirmed that he had made an offer to buy the Philadelphia Eagles, who have set a \$4.5 million price tag on themselves.

Frank McNamee, a stockholder of the team, said that "a stockholders' meeting would be called and that a report would be made to them. Stockholders already have authorized McNamee and Mike O'Neill, a team executive, to negotiate for the sale of the Eagles to a "responsible person."

Bob Hall, former Yale athletic director, in another offshoot of the sale plans, said he has been turned down by the Eagles after making an offer for them. Hall, at a news conference, said that he was representing a syndicate of 15 persons and that 51 per cent of the money would come from Philadelphia. McNamee confirmed Hall's offer. He said the bid was made by telephone and that Hall sought to inspect financial records of the Eagles to justify their asking price.

Gay Brewer, Bob Harrison Hold Lead Over Top Names In Sahara Tourney

LAS VEGAS, Nev. (UPI)—Gay Brewer and Bob Harrison, a pair of obscure professionals who rank far below such golfing greats as Arnold Palmer and Jack Nicklaus, went into the third round of the \$70,000 Sahara Invitational golf tournament today holding a shaky one stroke lead over the field.

The two professionals turned in sparkling performances Friday to post 137 totals for 36 holes of golf.

But as brilliant as they were, the rest of the star-studded pack stayed on their heels. There were 24 men, including Palmer and Nicklaus, within five shots of them.

"It's not a very big lead," said Harrison. "But I'd still like to have it when we finish the round today and again tomorrow."

Breaks Course Record
Harrison cracked the course record Friday when he fired a sizzling seven-under-par 64 with nines of 33-31 without a single bogey.

Brewer had an entirely different day. He was two over par with a pair of bogies on the front nine, but came storming back with a 31 on the back nine, built with two birdies and an eagle—the latter coming when he cranked in a 60-foot putt on the par five, 495-yard 17th hole.

But even these tremendous displays were overshadowed by a record-shattering 30 shot by Nicklaus on the back nine of the Paradise Valley Country Club course. Nicklaus, who had a big 75 opening day, posted a 66 for a 141 total—back in contention and only four shots away from the lead.

Tied for second, only one shot behind the leaders, were first-round front-runner Al Geiberger, who had a 71 for 138; and Canada's George Knudson, who posted his second straight 69.

In contention with 139s were Claude King, Art Wall, Al Johnson, Ken Venturi, Chi Chi Rodriguez, Lionel Hobert and Ted Kroll.

It took a score of 147 or better to make the cut for the final 36 holes today and Sunday. Among those failing to make it were former National Open and Don Whit. Palmer had 142.

"In this age of fast travel, when you can get from New York to Los Angeles or San Francisco in five or six hours, I can't see any reason why there should be one day of between the games," said Webb.

Webb, visiting some of his properties here while seeing the \$70,000 Sahara Invitational golf tournament, said he had talked to Frick about the layoff between Series games before.

"He said it was taking too much of a chance to schedule the games without a day off," said Webb. "But I can't see it."

"Millions of people get all worked up about the World Series. The excitement is at fever pitch. Then there is a big let-down while the teams take that day off."

"It was just one of those things," he said. "Just one little play one way or the other and we could have been a winner. We went into the first game against the world's greatest pitcher. We could have been out of trouble and right in the game with one key play. But it didn't come off and we got beat."

Mexico City Had 1968 Olympic Games Sewn Up From Start, Leaders Agree

BADEN - BADEN, Germany (UPI)—Delegates to the 60th session of the International Olympic Congress (IOC) agreed today that Mexico City had the 1968 Olympic games sewn up "almost from the start" and that Detroit virtually never had a chance.
