### American Held

VIENTIANE, Laos (UPI)—Communist Pathet Lao forces announced today they are holding one of three Americans who were aboard an Air America plane shot down by the Reds last Sept. 5 in southern Laos.

The Pathet Lao said they also were holding four Asians who were aboard the ill-fated plane. The plane, on a supply mission for right-wing forces and civilians in the area, was carrying two other Americans, who are still unaccounted for.

Air America has not yet released the names of the three American crew members.

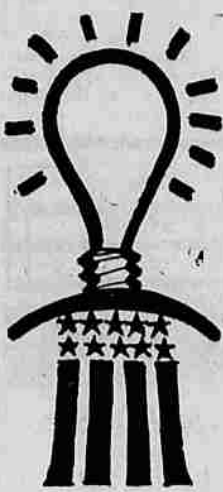

We certainly need these leaders, yes. But the cost to train them has gone up. Colleges are feeling the pinch. Many need new classrooms, laboratories, teachers.

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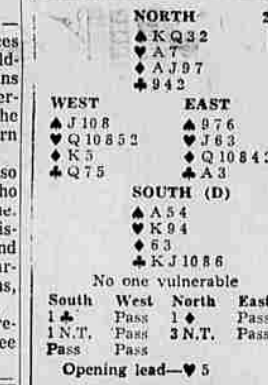


## Best Defense Is to Attack

Passive defense consists of making some lead that can't possibly cost you a trick. It works occasionally, but most of the time the winning method is to attack.

Thus West has his choice be-



South will duck the first heart in both hands and will have to win the second heart in dummy. Then he will lead a low club from dummy and it will be up to East to play second hand high and go right up with the ace. This sort of play is a great strain for many bridge players and there are plenty of occasions for a duck, but this is not one of them. East can see that he isn't going to set this hand unless his partner can produce a club trick and he wants to be able to let his partner make the club trick after the heart suit is cleared up and not before.

Once East rises with the ace of clubs he leads his last heart and while South can struggle along and try all sorts of complicated plays in the other suits he is going to wind up behind the eight ball.

Q—The bidding has been: South West North East 1♠ Double Rdbie. Pass

You, South, hold: ♠K76 ♥A4Q ♦J654 ♣A103 What do you do?

A—Pass. West will surely run away from the redouble.
