

Packers Face Title Drive Minus Services Of Starr

GREEN BAY, Wis. (UPI)—The top spot with the Bears, up the injury jinx, which has set losers at San Francisco played havoc with other top contenders in earlier weeks. Starr was tackled by Cardinal cornerback Jimmy Hill on a Bay Packers, robbing them of the man that makes the offense go, Bart Starr.

The Chicago Bears, Detroit Lions and Baltimore Colts have all lost front line players to injury in their effort to stop the Packers from grabbing a third successive National Football League crown.

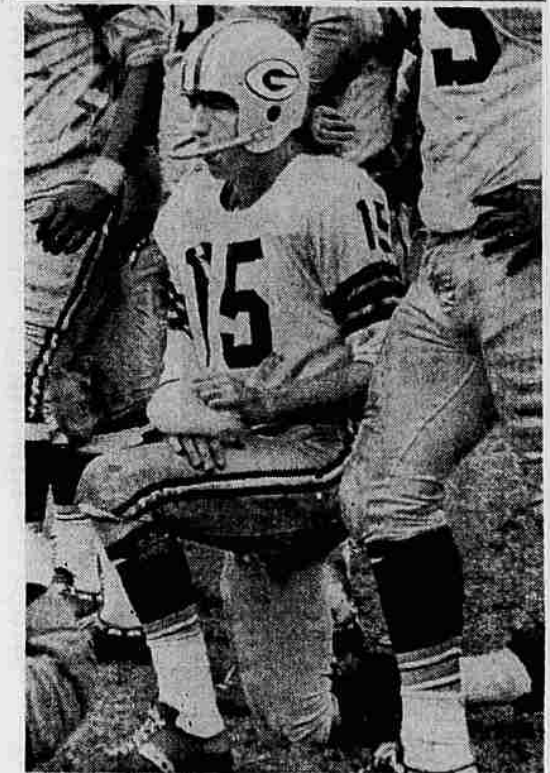
Now Starr, who guided Green Bay to NFL titles in 1961 and 1962 and who led the league in passing last year, is lost for an indefinite period with a hairline fracture to a bone in his throwing hand.

An unconfirmed report said he could miss as much as six weeks action.

The injury came just as the Packers made it into first place in the Western Division for the first time this season and just as they were heading into what is probably the roughest part of their 1963 schedule.

Green Bay meets the Colts, Lions and Bears away from home in three of their next six games. Only the Minnesota Vikings are scheduled for Green Bay, with Pittsburgh and San Francisco slated for Milwaukee appearances.

Starr was hurt in the third period of Sunday's 30-7 victory at St. Louis. The win was Green Bay's fifth in a row and tied the defending champs for 14.

International Fight Show On Tap Tonight In London

NEW YORK (UPI) — This week's boxing will be topped by a big international show at London Tuesday night when world champion Carlos Ortiz and Sugar Ramos meet other opponents in non-title fights, supported by two other Trans-Atlantic bouts.

There will be no nationally televised fight this week because the sponsors have pre-empted Friday night fight-time for a documentary—as the sponsors can do four times a year.

However, on Friday night at Madison Square Garden an excellent non-televised 10-rounder between middleweight contenders Rubin (Hurricane) Garter of Paterson, N.J., and Joey Archer of New York is slated. Carter is ranked No. 1 by the World Boxing Association; Archer, No. 6.

Promoter Jack Solomon's big London show Tuesday will be staged at the 10,000-seat Empire Pool in suburban Wembley. He expects a sell-out.

At Wembley, lightweight champion Ortiz of New York meets Maurice Cullen of England in a non-title 10-rounder.

Cullen, with a 24-2 record, is top contender for Dave Charnley's British lightweight title. Feather champion Ramos of Cuba and Mexico squares off against Sammy McSpadden of Scotland in an over-the-weight 10-rounder. McSpadden has lost only once in his 17 starts.

Umpqua, Rogue Salmon Runs Big

Oregon anglers on the Rogue River found a salmon bonanza 15, with another month or two of the salmon season still to go. Only the completed seasons of 1952 and 1953 exceed the total mouth of the Rogue and adjacent catch so far recorded in this century.

The big news on the Rogue was the tremendous run of spring chinook going upstream to the spawning beds. The count over Gold Ray Dam as of September 15 was just over 41,000 chinook, the highest count reaching waters above Gold Ray since 1942. Only the 1942 run exceeded this year's run but only by about 2,000 fish.

Game commission releases of the lower Rogue more than 7, spring chinook in the Rogue 400 angler trips were recorded system reared under exacting with a reported take by anglers research requirements showed of almost 4,200 salmon by Sept. well throughout the spring run.

Biologists using SCUBA gear observed many marked adult springers in resting pools in several sections of the river covered. At the egg-taking station on Big Butte Creek, 103 of 209 adults captured for the hatchery egg-take bore game commission marks.

The Umpqua also showed a fine return of spring chinook salmon. As of Sept. 15, the tally over Winchester dam on the North Umpqua was just over 11,000 chinook. This is the first time in the history of the counting station that the run has exceeded the 11,000 figure.

Spawning ground counts show increases in most areas surveyed. For the third year biologists used SCUBA gear to survey sample sections of the South Umpqua where the tally showed a 57 per cent increase over the spawning counts of last year.

A five-mile section of Rock Creek was surveyed and showed a 700 per cent increase over the spawning ground counts of 1952. Marked fish made up over 50 per cent of the count. In addition, biologists tallied 255 chinook salmon in a two-mile section of Rock Creek above the regular sampling section.

Although incomplete, indications are that about 21 per cent of the spring chinook run in the Umpqua originated from game commission plants.

Richards, Heard 5-A-1, UVL Scorers

Cottage Grove's Alan Richards continues to lead the Midwestern League point-makers, but the gap is rapidly being closed by Marshfield's Jerry Button.

Richards picked up six points Friday in Cottage Grove's 20-13 loss to the Roseburg Indians to rank first with a total of 78 points. Button crossed the goal line twice Saturday for the Pirates of Marshfield to account for his ninth and 10th TDs of the year—bringing his point total to 60.

In the Umpqua Valley League scoring race Jim Heard of Douglas took over first place with a three touchdown performance against Glendale. The hard-running Trojan fullback has now scored eight TDs and two PATs for a total of 50 points.

Following Richards and Button in the Midwestern League point race is Ken Snoddy of North Bend with 56 points and Jerry Knutson of Sheldon with 54 points. Chuck Olds, Cottage Grove, ranks fifth with 39 points—15 of which have come on PAT kicks.

Roseburg's Bob (Smokey) Burgess moved up to sixth by racking up three TDs in leading the Indians to the crucial win over the Lions. Burgess has scored six TDs. Ron Leep is the only other Roseburg player among the top 10 scorers, ranking 10th with 24 points.

Heard is followed by teammate Dan Withers in the UVL scramble with 38 points, while Riddle's Larry Ruckel has scored 35 points.

In Midwestern League play the Indians of Roseburg are leading the league with a record of 6-0, followed by Cottage Grove and Marshfield with identical 5-1 records. This week's schedule sends South Eugene's Axemen to Roseburg for the Tribe's homecoming battle Friday night. Other Friday games will find Marshfield at Springfield, Willamette at North Bend and Thurston will meet North Eugene in Eugene's Civic Stadium, Saturday the Cot-

lidge Grove Lions will attempt to get back on the winning side when they face the Sheldon Irish in a game scheduled for Civic Stadium in Eugene.

Douglas' league-leading Trojans will face a rugged UVL test this week hosting the Riddle Irish Friday night. The Trojans boast a 3-0 league mark, while the Irish are 2-1 and are tied for second with Glendale. Other UVL games Friday night will find Glendale at Glendale and Myrtle Creek at Sutherland.

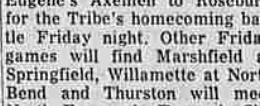
