Representatives Of Extension Units Hear Symposium On Youth Guidance

A training day for women representatives of extension units of all parts of Douglas County met at the Extension Office in the courthouse Tuesday.

Uppermost on the program was an afternoon teen-age vocational guidance symposium. Maxine Johnson, county extension agent in 4-H work, acted as moderator. She explained that symposium members were present to tell how students may best obtain guidance and information on job placement.

Mary Tomlinson, counselor at Douglas High School, dealt with high school counseling. She said high school counselors help the student to assess his strengths, interests and weaknesses and what to do about them. The counselor helps him look at things realistically and assists him in deciding on his goal in life. She stressed that it was most important for parents to understand and give support to the high school counseling program. It is also important, she maintained, that the facilities available in schools be used as much as possible.

School Urged

Conrad Clune, youth counselor for the state Employment Agency, said his work dealt mainly with high school students, dropouts, graduates who do not intend going on to college and ex-servicemen.

He said it was very hard to find jobs for dropouts, and said that by 1970 there would be 74 million of these young people seeking work. For this reason, Clune said, those in this category are urged to return to school, or get into some other training which would enable them to find jobs.

Alex Kennedy, coordinator for vocational education in Douglas County, answered the question, "What are Vocational Schools?"

He explained the apprentice, vocational education and trades and industries programs. Ap-

Council Bishops Approve Modern Language Prayer

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—Ecumenical Council fathers today overwhelmingly approved a proposal to let Roman Catholic bishops and priests say their daily prayers in their own language.

The proposal authorizes the bishop of any diocese to substitute modern languages for Latin in the breviary or divine office which Catholic clergymen and religious must say daily.

A council press spokesman emphasized that the permission to use modern languages in the divine office must be granted by a bishop "in individual cases" and is supposed to be reserved for situations in which a particular priest has unusual difficulties praying in Latin.

He said the text of the document stresses that Latin ordinarily will be maintained in the breviary and indicated that bishops were not expected to use their new authority to grant blanket dispensations for use of modern languages.

The vote was 1,904 to 131, well above the necessary two-thirds majority.

It was the last and most important of 12 amendments to the fourth chapter of a liturgical reform document which the fathers have been considering on and off since the Ecumenical Council first convened in the fall of 1962.

After the vote, the fathers continued debate on another document concerning the role of the laity in the Catholic Church.

Archbishop Lawrence Shehan of Baltimore, Md., voicing the concern felt by many American bishops, urged deletion of one brief section of the document which he said might be misconstrued as outlining a Catholic position on church-state relations.

BERKELEY, Calif. (UPI)—University of California officials have reported that 1,000 or more qualified students will be denied admission to the Berkeley campus next fall because the school will have reached its capacity.

It will mark the first time in history that students might face disqualification even though they meet the academic requirements.

State Education Board Junks Plans For College Buildings

SALEM (UPI)—The State Board of Education today junked the planned \$1.3 million community college building program, adopted a curriculum guide for community colleges, and approved two school district reorganization plans.

Acting on orders from the governor after last week's tax election defeat, the board indefinitely postponed allocation of the following community college construction funds:

Blue Mountain \$248,270, Central Oregon \$206,890, Clatsop College \$90,370, South Western Oregon \$331,030, Treasure Valley \$206,890, Eugene Technical-Vocational \$124,000, Portland Community \$69,230, and Salem Technical-Vocational \$73,200.

Approval of the curriculum and course eligibility guide for community colleges came after board members expressed the hope that the Board of Higher Education would adopt a similar guide for programs and lower division courses.

Coordination Asked

Public Instruction Supt. Leon P. Minear said while the state board liked specific outlines for courses, higher education traditionally avoided specific outlines. Board members felt there should be more coordination in setting guides for community

His report will be followed by an open forum discussion of the "Faith Forward" program, which is to be moderated by D. O. Stapleton, vice president of St. Paul's congregation.

The Rev. Mr. Hinrichs is the executive secretary of the Northwest District of the Lutheran Church in America and is a cousin of D. W. Hinrichs, pastor of the host church.

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Extension Leaders Hear Health Talks At Session

Nettie Ulmer, Douglas County Health Department nurse, at a training day Tuesday for extension leaders, explained the county health program, especially in regard to communicable disease.

She stressed the importance of immunization for adults as well as children, pointing out that many diseases, such as tetanus and diphtheria, are far more liable to strike adults.

Also on the program at the morning meeting was a film, "Passport to Tomorrow," the home nursing story. Explanation of the home nursing program was given by Norman Thunhofer, chairman of the Douglas County Chapter of the American Red Cross.

Frank Von Borstel, county extension agent, explained 4-H club work and discussed the wide variety of projects available. He emphasized that 4-H is not just for farm youth.

Mae Montgomery, chairman of the Associated County Women of the World in Douglas County, explained the world fellowship program. This year, instead of studying a foreign country, units will learn more about Alaska, she said.

About 50 women were on hand at the meeting which concluded at noon. The afternoon session was devoted to a teen-age vocational guidance symposium.
