

Navy Is Favored Over Pittsburgh In Saturday Tilt

NEW YORK (UPI) — Nine of the nation's 10 top-ranked college football teams are rated favorites in next Saturday's games leaving it up to third-ranked Pittsburgh to demonstrate its ability to beat Navy.

The Middles are ranked "only" 11th — eight notches below Pittsburgh — but the odds-makers rate them a five-point choice on the strength of the brilliant quarterbacking of Roger Staubach. Staubach passed the Panthers dizzy last season to give Navy a 32-9 rout and the odds-makers apparently expect him to do it again.

First-ranked Texas is a two-touchdown choice over Rice, second-ranked Wisconsin is picked by eight points over Ohio State and fourth-ranked

Illinois is a 10-point pick over UCLA.

Rounding out the top 10, Alabama is 26 over Houston, Mississippi is 28 over Vanderbilt, Oklahoma is 23 over Kansas State, Auburn is idle, Northwestern is 5 over Michigan State and Southern California is 13 over California.

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Palmer, Nicklaus Seek To Boost French Golf

PARIS, France (UPI) — Fifty years ago an unknown Frenchman by the name of Francis Ouimet put golf on page one in the United States. Today a couple of Yankees named Arnold Palmer and Jack Nicklaus are doing the same thing in France.

Golf mushroomed in the U.S. after Ouimet defeated two famous British golfers, Harry Vardon and Ted Ray, in a play-off to win the U.S. Open championship in 1913.

The game is far from popular in France — there are only 15,000 golfers in the country — but the appearance here of Palmer and Nicklaus in the Canada Cup and International Golf Association matches is expected to give golf in this country the same shot in the arm that Ouimet gave it in the States.

Palmer, golf's leading money winner, and Nicklaus are heavily favored to defend success-

fully the team title which the U.S. won in the matches at Buenos Aires last year. Then Palmer, who this year became the first golfer ever to exceed \$100,000 in official money winnings, teamed with Snead to win the team title.

Palmer showed he was ready for the challenge Tuesday when, off the plane which brought him from the U.S. only a few hours earlier, he shot a three under par 33 on the front nine of the St. Nom la Breche course, 12 miles from here.

Later, he played a couple of more holes with Nicklaus, the young U.S. Masters and PGA champion, who just Sunday brought his money winnings only a few dollars short of the \$100,000 mark by winning the Sahara Open at Las Vegas.

Palmer, completely recovered from the buritis which had bothered his right shoulder, praised the course, one of the most lush in Europe with its brilliant green fairways, exacting greens and rolling acres.

"Actually," grinned Palmer after his warmup session, "it's just like playing in Philadelphia, Akron or anywhere else back in the States."

Lewis & Clark Now 13th

NEW YORK (UPI) — Delaware, the highest scoring team in the nation, ran up its lowest point total of the year Saturday, yet jumped from third to second place today in balloting for the country's No. 1 small college football team, a scant seven points behind leader Northern Illinois.

The Blue Hens, defending eastern champions, defeated Ohio University, a major college team, 29-12, to draw 12 first place votes, the same number as Northern Illinois, and 261 points from the 35-man United Press International Board of Coaches.

McNeese State climbed one rung to 11th, Western State (Colo.) advanced from 20th to 12th, and Lewis and Clark jumped from 17th to 13th. Fresno State slipped from a 12th place tie to 14th and St. John's (Minn.), tied for 14th a week ago, settled into a 15th place tie with East Tennessee State, which is making its first appearance of the year in the top 20.

Florida A&M, which walloped Morris Brown, 66-0, still fell a notch to third with four first place votes and 238 total points.

Top-Rated Tribe To Face Axemen

Roseburg No. 1 rating will be at stake again this week when they host the South Eugene Axemen in a Midwestern League (District 5-A-1) battle Friday at Finlay Field.

The Indians, boasting a 6-0 league record and currently holding down undisputed control of the league lead, nosed out the powerful Medford Black Tornado team for first place on the prep polls this week.

While the Indians will go into their homecoming game undefeated, South Eugene has been able to record just two wins in six starts. However, the Axemen are not to be overlooked as they have been improving each week, and have been on the short end of some close scores.

With the Axemen invading Roseburg in hopes of an upset, other Friday league games will find Marshfield at Springfield, Willamette at North Bend and Thurston will meet North Eugene at Civic Stadium. Saturday Cottage Grove and Sheldon will square off at Civic Stadium in Eugene. All league encounters will begin at 8 p.m.

Featured prior to the game this week will be the Thursday night bonfire and pep rally, with the homecoming dance to be held after the game Friday. The homecoming queen will be

crowned during halftime at the game.

As a team Roseburg will enter Friday's game with an advantage of nearly 700 yards over its opponents. The Indians have passed for 475 yards and have gained 1,260 on the ground for a grand total of 1,735 yards. The Tribe boasts a 79-69 first down edge, and have outscored the opposition, 131-32.

Bob (Smokey) Burgess is the spark-plug of the ground attack, leading the league in this department. Burgess has carried 51 times for 607 yards — an 11.9 yards-per-carry average. The fleet halfback leads the team in scoring with 36 points. Fullbacks Craig Engle and Mike Leep follow Burgess in the rushing department with averages of 5.9 and 4.5 yards-per-carry respectively.

Passing the Indians have Jerry Remick and Jim Beamer. Remick has completed seven of 11 tosses for 73 yards and a .632 completion percentage. Beamer is connecting at a 57.1 clip, sporting 28 completions for 49 attempts.

Gary Heeter ranks as the top pass receiver with 17 catches for 182 yards and three TDs. Ron Leep has pulled in nine aeriels for 143 yards and four TDs.

Sophomore Alan Young handles the punting for the Indians,

on 25 tries. Beamer kicks off and is averaging 43.3 yards-per-kick on 26 attempts. Young's talented toe has accounted for 11 successful PAT kicks.

Engle leads the team in punt returns with seven for 50 yards. Jon Burnham has returned five for 132 yards and Ron Leep has caught one punt. Burnham, Ron Leep, Mike Leep and Tom Thomas have each returned two kick offs, while Dick Gwaltney has returned one.

Ortiz Wins 'Unpopular' Decision Over Britisher

LONDON (UPI) — Coal miner

Maurice Cullen of Shotton, Eng., today demanded a title fight with lightweight champion Carlos Ortiz because of the unpopularity of Ortiz' non-title 10-round referee's decision over him here Tuesday night.

Only a knockdown in a blazing last round enabled Ortiz of New York to emerge as one of the four Western Hemisphere winners in the big trans-Atlantic fight show before a sellout 10,000 at the indoor Wembley Empire Pool.

Ortiz weighed 138 pounds; Cullen, 136½.

In another non-title bout, world featherweight champion Sugar Ramos of Mexico City stopped helpless young Sandy McSpadden of Scotland in the second round. They were scheduled for 10.

Ramos, 126-pound champion,

scaled 135; McSpadden, 138.

Heavyweight Jeff Davis of Las Vegas, Nev., also scored a technical knockout over Jim Cooper of England at the end of the seventh round because of bloody cuts about the eyes. Jim is the twin brother of British Empire heavyweight champion Henry Cooper.

Davis registered 198½; Cooper, 201½.

In the only 15-round match on the program, Bahama-born Gonco Brennan won the vacant British Empire middleweight title on a decision over Ireland-born Mick Leahy of Coventry, Eng. The Empire title was vacated by Dick Tiger of Nigeria after he had won the world title last year.

Brennan weighed 157½; Leahy, 159½ — just under the 160-pound limit.

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
