Crucial A-2, B Games Set For County Teams

Crucial league encounters are on tap for Douglas County A-2 and B football teams with title hopes this weekend.

In Umpqua Valley League action the spotlight will be on Douglas where the Trojans are entertaining the Riddle Irish Friday. Douglas leads the league with a 3-0 record, but the defending champion Irish could throw the race wide open as they enter the game with a 2-1 mark.

Other UVL battles Friday night will find Glendale's Wildcats invading Glendale to clash with the Pirates and the Myrtle Creek Vikings will be at Sutherlin to face the Bulldogs. All UVL games this week will begin at 8 p.m.

Drain's Warriors face a "must" game in Emerald League competition if they are to keep their title hopes alive. The Warriors will travel to Eugene Saturday to take on the rugged St. Francis Saints at 1 p.m.

A full round of games is scheduled for the Bico-Trico B League teams. The leading Yoncalla Eagles will face a stiff test at Junction City Friday night when they clash with the Monroe Blue Devils. Kickoff time is 8 p.m. Elkton's Elks and Oakland's Oakers, currently tied for second place with one loss each, will both be at home Friday. The Elks will host the Crow Cougars and the Oakers will entertain the Lowell Raiders. Both games will start at 1:30 p.m. The Powers Crusaders will be at Florence to face the Siuslaw Warriors Friday in a non-league outing at 8 p.m.

Southern Oregon Eight-Man League play will find the Canyonville Tigers at Prospect to meet the Cougars at 2 p.m., while the Camas Valley Hornets will head for Butte Falls and an outing with the Loggers at 1:30. Canyonville and Camas Valley are currently tied for the league lead.

The Trojans of Douglas can sew up at least a tie for the UVL title when they take on the rampaging Irish. Douglas boasts a perfect league mark, and has a 5-1 record for the season. Riddle is 2-1 in league play, and has been strengthened by the return of quarterback Mike Markham.

Douglas has a strong defensive unit to back up a well balanced offensive attack. Quarterback Dan Withers and fullback Jim Heard set the pace for the offensive unit. Heard leads the league in scoring, with Withers following in second place.

Riddle has a deadly passing attack and a fleet backfield which presents explosive breakaway threats. With Markham back to throw, the Irish could surprise the favored Trojans. Along with Markham, top

Berra To Be Named New Manager Of NY Yankees

NEW YORK (UPI) — Yogi Berra has the last laugh today. Once the ugly duckling of baseball who as a young player was ridiculed and taunted by players with half his ability, the 38-year-old Berra will be officially designated as the new manager of the New York Yankees.

An open secret since Ralph Houk succeeded to the general manager's chair on Tuesday, the formal announcement will be made by club President Dan Topping at noon (EDT) during a press conference at the Savoy-Hilton Hotel.

Berra's salary is expected to be \$50,000 a year — 100 times what he received when he signed his first contract with the organization in 1943.

Then Berra — a far cry from the shy kid who told St. Louis fans honoring him with a "night" in 1947: "I want to thank everybody who made this night necessary" — will take the microphone and outline his plans for rallying the Yankees from their four-straight disaster at the hands of the Los Angeles Dodgers in the World Series.

Berra is expected to reveal that he rejected several managerial offers from other clubs because he had been tipped by the front office that he was to become the new manager of the Yankees.

The official announcement of Berra's appointment will cap a career which started on the sandlots of St. Louis.

Born on the "Hill" in St. Louis on May 12, 1925, Berra took naturally to athletics and played hockey and football as well as baseball. His natural sport was baseball, however, and he entered the Yankees' farm system in 1943 when he signed with Norfolk in the Piedmont League.

After spending 1944 and 1945 in the Coast Guard — he went ashore on Normandy Beach in the invasion of Western Europe — Berra was moved to the Yankees' International League farm club in Newark. He played seven games at the close of the 1946 season and reported the next spring to Manager Bucky Harris a serious candidate for a regular job.

Although ridiculed at first because of his linguistic and parlor-room faults, Berra's exceptional batting ability and his inherent instinct to make the right move on the field quickly established him as a big league star.

SF Warriors Nip St. Louis

You can't elbow Al Attles of the San Francisco Warriors without paying the penalty.

Attles saw red — and some blood — in an elbow skirmish with Zelmo Beaty of the St. Louis Hawks Wednesday night. He returned to the court with a patch over his left eye and tossed in the key points that earned the Warriors a 99-95 victory at St. Louis.

The Hawks carried a 72-67 bulge into the fourth period when Attles and Beaty engaged in their skirmish. Attles shook off the injury quickly, tying the score at 74-44 and then tossing in a follow-up basket to put San Francisco ahead to stay.

Attles finished with 19 points and teammate Wilt Chamberlain added 22. Bob Pettit was high man for the Hawks with 24.

The Los Angeles Lakers overcame a 19-point first period deficit in downing the Detroit Pistons, 124-116, and the Baltimore Bullets handed the New York Knickerbockers their fourth straight setback, 115-106 in other games.

The Pistons roared to a 28-9 lead in the opening minutes and were ahead 34-23 at the end of the first period. Then Jerry West and Elgin Baylor went to town to push the Lakers into a 57-54 halftime bulge. West scored 31 points, three more than Baylor.

Walt Bellamy's 45 points and 24 rebounds paced the Bullets to their victory over New York. Art Heyman, the Knicks' prize rookie, strained an ankle muscle in the first quarter and didn't return to action.

Proceeds from the tournament will go to the Jaycee scholarship fund and the Staten Island Rehabilitation Center.

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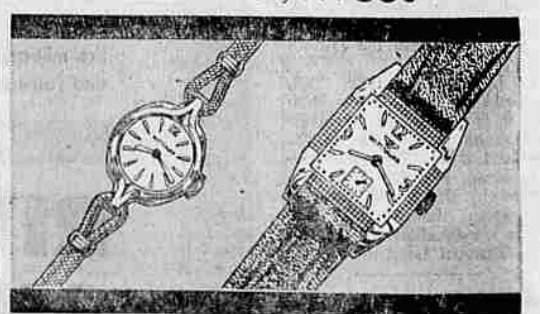
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
