NEW YORK (UPI)—Oregon was rated as a three-point favorite over Washington and Oregon State was listed as a seven-point underdog against Syracuse by the nation's football odds-makers today.

UO Ducks To Battle Washington

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene — Oregon's high-flying Ducks, riding the crest of a four-game winning streak, tackle rebounding Washington Saturday at Multnomah Stadium in the annual renewal of one of the nation's most exciting football rivalries.

Coach Len Casanova's Webfoots, following an opening game loss to Penn State, have reeled off four straight victories with All-American halfback Mel Renfro and nifty quarterback Bob Berry leading the way.

Renfro has keyed the ground attack and served as a prime passing target, while Berry has been sensational in sparking Oregon's overhead game.

Together they give the Webfoots one of college football's most awesome one-two punches. With these two classy performers running wild, Oregon has been ranked among the nation's total offense and scoring leaders all season.

Against the Huskies, the high-powered Webfoots will be facing one of football's toughest and most tenacious defenses. Rick Redman, an offensive guard and defensive linebacker, rated as the finest lineman in the country according to Oregon coaches and he'll anchor the rugged Washington defense.

In addition to usual defensive prowess, Coach Jim Owens' squad has also come up with several new offensive wrinkles, including a dangerous passing attack.

Quarterback Bill Douglas is a top-flight passer and he's found willing targets in ends Jake Kupp and Al Libke and halfback Ron Medved, who also rates as a fine runner.

The Huskies will be at full strength for the annual encounter with the Webfoots with fullback Junior Coffey ready for action after missing four games with a foot injury.

Indian Jayvees Score Victories

Roseburg's Jayvee gridgers added two more victories to their unbeaten record by downing Crater, 19-0, and edging North Bend, 6-0, in recent outings.

The Indian reserves now boast a 6-0-1 record, with the lone tie being a scoreless duel with Crater in the opening game of the season. The Roseburg Jayvees will close the season Nov. 2 at Grants Pass against the Grants Pass Jayvees.

In tripping North Bend, the local team climaxed a thriller in the final 36 seconds of play when quarterback Roger Helliwell tossed a 16-yard TD bomb to end Dale Pfeiffer. The scoring play was set up when linebacker Joe Gamez intercepted a North Bend pass.

Coach Cliff Allen singled out Bill Elliott, Tom Rees and Bill Cooper for their defensive play.

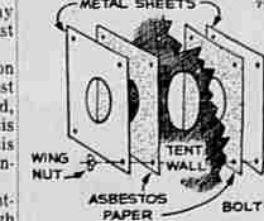
Helliwell paced the Indian Jayvees to their win over Crater, passing for one TD and running for another. The first six-pointer came as Helliwell threw a 20-yarder to flanker-back Alan Young. Tom Bates, running from a halfback spot, galloped 25 yards for the second TD and Young kicked the PAT.

The final score came as Helliwell scampered seven yards to paydirt.

Defensive standouts for the Tribe Jayvees were Elliott, Gamez, Cooper, Rees and Pfeiffer.

Beavers Head East For Tilt With Syracuse

Oregon State's rejuvenated football team, 30-6 winners over Washington State here last week are ready for one of the toughest foes the Beavers will meet this year—Syracuse.

Coach Tommy Prothro's scrappy club meets the East coast's top-ranked Syracuse Orangemen in Syracuse, New York Saturday.

Quarterback Gordon Queen, hitting his receivers with sporadic accuracy, completed 12 of 22 passes — three for touchdowns — in guiding his team to victory over Washington State. Queen has thrown for 10 touchdowns in five games this year.

The indomitable Vern Burke caught his fifth and sixth touchdown passes for the year. The Beaver end made six receptions against the Cougars to boost his season's total to 19.

Oregon State pass protection was its best of the season, and the Beavers defense functioned in good fashion. Washington State never seriously threatened after Oregon State built up a 16-6 halftime lead.

Happy as the staff was to have beaten Washington State, no elusions are due about Syracuse. The orangemen blanked Penn State last Saturday, 9-0. And, too, it was Penn State that handed Oregon its only defeat of the season earlier at Portland.

Assistant Coach Joe Francis, who scouted Syracuse, said, "They're big and strong, and they'll come straight at you." He pointed out that from tackle to tackle they average about 245 pounds; the ends 225 pounds. Their size is by far the largest Oregon State has faced this year and their line is reportedly stronger than Washington's.

Weyerhaeuser Opens Area To Elk Hunters

The Coos Bay Branch of the Weyerhaeuser Company is expecting to play host to about 2,000 elk hunters next Saturday morning. As in past years, the Company's Millicoma Forest Tree Farm will open certain of its gates for weekend hunting.

Phillip Hogan, Woods Manager for Weyerhaeuser, announced that the following gates would open:

Matson Creek Gate, located 10 miles above Allegany on the Company's paved logging road will open at 6 a.m. Saturday morning. All hunters must check out by 6 p.m.

The Tye Gate, located on Agony Ridge, half a mile west of the Bateman Lookout road, will be open on the same basis as the Matson Creek Gate. This gate is reached via the Elkton-Sutherlin highway.

In the South Fork area, hunters will be checked through the Williams River Gate located 23 miles above Dellwood. The Fall Creek Gate will not be opened, but this area will be accessible to hunters via the 7070-7072 spur reached through the Williams River Gate. The Williams River Gate will open at 6 a.m. also.

The Vaughan area located 5 miles above Dellwood will be open throughout the season.

Free hunting maps will be available at all gates and further information can be obtained at the Company's woods headquarters at Allegany.
