'Spooky' Event Due Yoncalla

A rendezvous of all goblins and witches of North Douglas County will be held Halloween night right outside of Yoncalla in an old haunted house, it was learned here today.

Children of the entire area have been invited to come and see — and try to get away without being caught — according to Mrs. Robert Eckstein, chairman of the ways and means committee of the Scotts Valley PTA, the organization that has arranged for the spooky gathering.

The old house, Mrs. Eckstein announced, is about six blocks north of Yoncalla on the road to Drain. The ghouls promise to put up a sign.

"The gathering of the Halloween creatures will begin at 4:30 p.m. on Oct. 1 and continue till the witches and goblins and friends vanish into the darkness of Halloween night," according to the committee.

A token admission will be charged, and the proceeds will go to benefit the Scotts Valley PTA group plus the class trip for the eighth grade at the Yoncalla grade school.

Donations for the event include 60 sheets of plywood from a Roseburg plywood firm for construction of the maze inside the "haunted" house; 280 two-by-fours from a Yoncalla firm; models from a Yoncalla retail store; and costumes from a church guild rummage sale. A Yoncalla feed store supplied the necessary paint to dress up the setting. The "haunted" house is by courtesy of Mr. and Mrs. Clayton Mill.

Mrs. Otto Feucht, president of the PTA, announced that there would be refreshments for those who survived the trip of horror. She stated that the spooks will be in evidence both before and after the High School Homecoming bonfire.

This will be Halloween fun for the whole family, Mrs. Feucht said.

Barry Favored In Primaries

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Highly placed Republicans now class Sen. Barry Goldwater of Arizona as the favorite to win crucial presidential primary contests in New Hampshire and California.

In both states, Goldwater is expected to collide with Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York. The New Hampshire primary March 10 is the nation's first. California will close out the presidential primary season June 2, six weeks before the GOP National Convention.

New Hampshire is regarded as a critical test for Rockefeller, who needs to make a good showing there to stay alive as a candidate for the presidential nomination.

TRANSFER ORDER ADDS PARK SITE

The Douglas County Court today signed an order transferring 1.7 acres of tax foreclosed lands administered by the County Land Department to the County Park Department bringing the total number of park sites to 39.

The area of 1.7 acres in size is located on the Smith River County Road 12 miles from its junction with U.S. 101 at Gardiner.
