

# Sandy Koufax Is Named Winner Of Young Award

BOSTON (UPI) — Sandy Koufax, the Los Angeles Dodgers' spectacular strikeout artist, today was being touted as a good bet to couple the National League's Most Valuable Player award with the Cy Young Award.

This "double" has been accomplished only once. In 1956, the year the Cy Young Award was introduced, Don Newcombe, then pitching for the Brooklyn Dodgers, walked off with both honors.

Koufax was named Thursday night as the 1963 winner of the Young award as the outstanding

fingers crossed. He has already assured himself a good pay hike for next season and as a double award winner he will have additional ammunition when he negotiates his 1964 contract.

"Probably the biggest award I've won," responded an already trophy-laden Sandy Koufax after he learned of his unanimous selection for the Cy Young pitching award.

The Los Angeles Dodgers' strikeout artist, who won a Corvette sports car as the 1963 World Series star, said he heard about the award on his car radio.

"I knew I had a chance for it," the southpaw hurler said, "but there were other pitchers with an opportunity as well."

Koufax was doubtful about also receiving the National League's Most Valuable Player award from baseball writers because of the establishment of the Cy Young award in 1956 to honor pitchers.

major league pitcher of the year. The 27-year-old southpaw became the first unanimous choice, polling all 20 votes by representatives of the Baseball Writers Association of America (BBWAA).

In 1957, Warren Spahn of the Milwaukee Braves came within one vote of a sweep. The lone dissenting vote that year went to Jim Bunning of the Detroit Tigers.

The National League's Most Valuable Player for 1963 will be announced sometime next month. Koufax, queried about his chances of completing the "double," said, "I don't think the MVP will go to a pitcher."

## Yogi Will Not Tolerate Monkey Shines Now That He's Managing NY Yankees

NEW YORK (UPI) — Yogi Berra's the new boss and whether they like it or not, New York Yankee players already are resigned to the fact he's no longer one of the boys.

Everyone from former teammate Joe DiMaggio on down

seemed sure today the off-putting 38-year-old Yogi will tolerate no monkey business and will crack down anytime there is any need to do so.

"He's not the clown that some have made him out to be," said DiMaggio, who played on the same club as Berra for six seasons.

"The men will play for him. They like him. He'll get the most out of them. He'll do a good job."

Yankee players always loved to kid Yogi. Two of them, Mickey Mantle and Whitey Ford, even sent him a wire moments after co-owner Dan Topping named him the new manager Thursday.

**Applied For Release**

"We are hereby applying for our unconditional release. We want to become professional golfers."

It was signed "Mickey and Whitey."

The congenial Berra is a born gregarious. He loves to talk with everyone and anyone. Even when he was catching, he liked to ask rival hitters how their kids were doing in the Little League.

The big question in most minds now is whether Yogi suddenly can detach himself from the Yankee players as Ralph Houk did before him and as any manager must.

Phil Rizzuto, one of Berra's closest friends, thinks he can although he concedes it will be difficult.

"Yogi has a tough transition to make from being buddy-bud-

dy with the ballplayers to being their leader," said the one-time Yankee shortstop.

"I know personally that all the players respect Yogi," he added. "Besides, he won't stand for any horsing around but I think the players think too much of him to do that. Yogi is on the spot — he has to win and he has a lot of obstacles to overcome."

Berra took a cut, and considerable ribbing about it, also, to accept the Yankee manager-ship. He earned \$45,000 as a player-coach last year and will work for \$32,600 next year, the same salary paid Casey Stengel and Houk in their first year as manager.

"The one-year contract was Yogi's idea," explained Topping.

"That's right," Berra corroborated. "If I can't do a job, I'll quit. If I'm good, I'll stick around a little longer."

## Beavers Set For Syracuse

CORVALLIS — Oregon State's determined Beavers went through more heavy drills as they continued to prepare themselves for a big effort against Syracuse.

When the Beavers meet the Orangemen this Saturday, in one of the top intercollegiate of the day, it will mark the first appearance of a west coast school at Syracuse University's Archbold stadium. Game time is 10:30 a.m. (PDT).

Coach Tommy Prothro's Beavers concentrated on defense this week in hopes of holding off Syracuse's vaunted rushing game. The Orange leads the nation in rushing offense.

Also receiving considerable attention in practice sessions was pass protection. Although Oregon State did a fine job of protecting their passer last week against Washington State, there have been times, specifically against Washington's Huskies, when the pass protection fell down badly. And Syracuse likes to red-dog and rush their big line against a passing attack.

Oregon State will wear their black (home) uniforms for the game. Syracuse prefers to wear white at home and requested to do so this Saturday. On the other hand Prothro favors his "black bandit" home uniforms. It may look odd to the un-oriented game observer, but the change in procedure was agreeable to all.

**Elk Hunting Outlook Excellent For County**

PORTLAND (UPI) — This weekend's hunting prospects, compiled by the Oregon State Game Commission:

**Northwest:** Prospects good for opening of elk season in north coastal area; most animals in dense cover. Duck hunting good in coastal bays; pheasant and quail hunting fair.

**Southwest:** Elk hunting excellent in Coos-Douglas area and poor in Rogue management unit. Waterfowl hunting fair in upper Coos Bay, poor in Rogue River Valley.

**Central:** Elk widely scattered and hunting fair in Mt. Hood National Forest, best along Badger, Fifteenmile and Eightmile creeks; Waterfowl hunting slow along Columbia River; pheasant hunting good with dogs in Wasco, Sherman and Jefferson counties; chukars plentiful but hard to find in Deschutes and John Day canyon.

**Northeast:** Elk hunting poor in Heppner and Wheeler units, poor to fair in Umatilla County, good in Baker and Union counties. No snow, ground dry, stalking difficult. Best areas Walla Walla, Umatilla, Chesnimus, Sled Springs and Wenaha units. Waterfowl hunting poor except good in Walla Walla County.

**Southeast:** Elk hunting slow until storms occur. Pheasant hunting good in Ontario, Vale, Nyssa, Adrian and Harper areas of Malheur county; poor to fair elsewhere.

# Notre Dame's Fightin' Irish Favored Over Stanford In Renewal Of Rivalry

A series that ended in bitterness resumed Saturday after a 21-year cooling off period when Notre Dame comes to Stanford for a nationally televised inter-collegiate game.

The Fighting Irish, who upset Southern California 17-14 earlier this season, are 12-1-2 point choices to drop Stanford to its fifth straight defeat.

The teams last met in 1942 and the Irish handed Stanford such a rugged 27-0 lashing that the Indians cancelled a 1943 rematch. But the game wouldn't have been played anyway, as the Indians dropped their football program that season because of the war.

Three other inter-collegiate clashes and one Big Six contest feature the rest of the weekend program. Fourth ranked Illinois is a 10-point favorite to down UCLA tonight in Los Angeles while on Saturday Syracuse is rated seven points ahead of Oregon State and it's Army by 13 over Washington State.

Southern California, opens defense of its Big Six title when it takes on California at Berkeley. The Trojans who moved back into the UPI's top ten after stunning Ohio State last Saturday, are 13-1-2 point selections over the Bears.

This marks the third meeting between Notre Dame and Stanford. The Irish are seeking not only their third straight win over the Indians but also their third victory of the season against Big Six opposition. So far they have downed Southern Cal and UCLA, 27-12.

Illinois, undefeated and onced by Ohio State, invades Los Angeles with a team that is rated "big and powerful with good balance," by the UCLA scouts. The Bruins (1-4) are heartened by the fine quarterbacking which Mike Haffner turned in last Saturday against Notre Dame but seem to be up against too much power.

Oregon State, facing a typically tough Syracuse team that has won four out of five, has been working to give quarterback Gordon Queen as much defense on passing as possible. But coach Tommy Prothro expects trouble with Syracuse's "big rush."

Army, also a winner in four out of five, tuned up for wobbly Washington State by bombing hapless Wake Forest, 47-0. The Cougars have lost two in a row including a 13-8 upset by San Jose State after battling Iowa to a 14-14 tie.

The Southern Cal-California game matches two of the West coast's top quarterbacks. It is Pete Beathard for the Trojans and Craig Morton for Cal. Beathard led tenth-ranked Southern California to a 32-3 rout of Ohio State last Saturday while

Merton hit on five touchdown passes for Cal's 34-13 win over San Jose.

Oregon, sparked by the dazzling Mel Renfro who looked his best last Saturday in leading the Ducks to a 28-12 win over Arizona, rates a 3-1-2 point edge over the Washington Huskies in another leading west coast game.

San Jose seeks to "get well" this Saturday at a vastly improved Idaho which just got through routing the University of the Pacific, 64-6. The blasted Tigers aren't supposed to stand over Arizona, rates a chance at Utah State, which just worked over Montana State, 62-6.

## Four Horsemen To View Irish Tilt With Stanford

SAN FRANCISCO (UPI) — The Four Horsemen of Notre Dame came riding into California today — together in the west for the first time since 1925.

That was the year they crushed Stanford, 27-10, in the Rose Bowl.

Saturday they will attend another Stanford-Notre Dame football game and the odds favor the Irish to win by about the same score.

"That was nearly 40 years ago, that Pasadena game," Harry Suhlreher, the quarterback, recalled. "But there have been wonderful times since that day."

What has it meant to be a member of the Four Horsemen?

"It's like this," said Don Miller, the halfback. "I was United States District Attorney for Southern Ohio for 10 years. I spoke every day to Kiwanis, Lions Clubs and other meetings. But during that time I never was introduced as the district attorney, but always as a member of the Four Horsemen."

But it took Miller, the attorney, to sum it all up. "It was a lucky day for us when Grantland Rice showed up at the Polo Grounds in 1924 to see us play the Army," said Miller. "We should all get down on our knees every night and pray in thanks to the day that Rice gave us the nick-name."

To "Sleepy" Jim Crowley, the other halfback, it was the same. "Being a member of the Four Horsemen opened a lot of doors to us. That's how we got into the coaching business. I did well as a coach, taking Fordham teams to the Cotton and Sugar Bowls, and getting an invitation to the Rose Bowl that we had to turn down because we already had accepted the invitation to the Cotton Bowl.

"But I'm never remembered as a coach. I'm remembered as a member of the Four Horsemen."

Elmer Layden, who intercepted two of Ernie Nevers' passes to clinch the victory for Notre Dame in the Rose Bowl, agreed.

"It's a wonderful tag-line," said Elmer. "I hate airplanes. But I flew all the way out here for this reunion with the other members of the Four Horsemen — and to renew acquaintances with some Stanford men that I met in 1925."

## Gamelands Go On Sales Block

Ten parcels of land totaling 1,618 acres declared surplus by the game commission at its meeting in Portland yesterday will be advertised for bids and sold immediately.

Phil Schneider, state game director, said that although some of the lands have marginal fish or game values, the commission decided to sell as part of its reduced spending and operations costs because of the financial outlook for the next two years. The sale will reduce the commission's tax load by \$1,731 plus moderate maintenance costs on some of the properties.

Schneider said that public agencies will have the first chance at purchasing the surplus lands. Following notification to these agencies the lands will be advertised and sold to the highest bidder. Some properties will be sold while others are up for trade or exchange.

The ten parcels include: McKenzie Hatchery, Lane County; Hermiston Game Farm, Umatilla County; Sauvies Island Salvage Headquarters; Central Point Screen Plant, Jackson County; Marshallfield Hatchery Site, Coos County; Big Creek Hatchery, Lane County; Eagle Ridge, Klamath County; a small parcel adjacent to Summer Lake Management Area, Lake County; North Fork Game Range, Umatilla-Morrow counties, and Eel Lake Tract fringe, Coos County.

The McKenzie Hatchery is already deactivated, while operations at the Hermiston Game Farm and the Central Point Plant will be transferred to the E. E. Wilson Management Area near Corvallis where hunter or fisherman access is desired. Strip areas will be maintained.
