

Indians Smash South Eugene 21-0

Homecoming Highlighted By Vital Win In Loop Play

Posting their 20th consecutive victory in Midwestern League grid action, the Roseburg Indians took a major step towards winning their third straight district crown Friday.

Displaying their talent for the home fans, the Indians posted a decisive 21-0 homecoming triumph over the South Eugene Axemen Friday to increase their record to 7-0 for this season.

Roseburg's victory string in District 5-A-1 competition now extends back to Oct. 28, 1960, when South Eugene upended the Tribe, 26-13.

Only two stumbling blocks now stand in the path of the Indians winning their third consecutive league championship, on an end sweep and raced 51 yards to the South Eugene 20 line, while the regular season will draw to a close Nov. 8 when the Sheldon Irish invade Finlay Field.

Friday when the Indians found their running game more or less stymied, they took to the air. Quarterback Jim Beamer led the charge as he completed four out of five attempts for 85 yards and one TD. Jerry Remick, alternating as field general with Beamer, connected on three of four pass attempts for another 63 yards.

While Beamer and Remick were handling the throwing, ends Gary Heeter and Doug Fenton displayed uncanny pass catching ability. Heeter, the league's top receiver, snared three passes for 102 yards, while Matson caught three, including one for a TD.

Bob (Smokie) Burgess, Roseburg's fleet halfback, carried the nine times for a total of 52 yards. Burgess carried only twice in the second half, seeing limited action because of a minor leg injury. Burgess, the league's top rusher, has now gained 659 yards on 60 carries.

Fullback Mike Leep picked up an additional 44 yards for the winners as he used his straight-ahead power to advance, and Ron Leep carried once for a brilliant 51-yard gain.

Defensive standouts for the Indians were Mike Leep, Jess Hart and Dick Gwaltney. Mike Leep was the top tackler, being credited with bringing the South Eugene ball carriers down 13 times. Hart totaled 14 tackles for the night.

South Eugene's John Roche used his speed to riddle the Roseburg defense for 83 yards on 17 carries, while fullback John Porter gained 46 yards on 10 carries in the first half before suffering an injury and watching the remainder of the game from the sidelines.

The Indians began their first scoring march near the end of the first quarter after stopping an Axemen drive on Roseburg 38. The South Eugene punt started the Indians on the offense on their own seven-yard marker.

The big play for the Tribe came just at the end of the first period when Beamer faked back to throw from the

South Eugene 32 and spotted Heeter in the clear, deep in the opponents territory. Heeter made a spectacular stretching catch for a 9-yard gain, giving the Tribe a first down on the Axemen's 19.

After two successive losses, Beamer hit Matson with a strike in the left corner of the end zone. Alan Young split the uprights with his PAT kick. The TD came with 11 minutes and 12 seconds remaining in the first half.

Late in the second quarter the Axemen were halted after reaching the Roseburg 18. This time the Indians went all the way in nine plays, with the tally coming with one minute and 43 seconds remaining in the half.

Ron Leep broke into the clear and Matson moved the ball to the one-yard stripe. Beamer powered his way over on a quarterback sneak and Young kicked the extra point.

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Frosh Edge Rooks 8-6

EUGENE (UPI) — A two-point conversion pass from quarterback Tom Jernstedt to end Steve Bunker gave the Oregon Frosh an 8-6 football victory over the Oregon State Rooks before an estimated 2,500 persons Friday.

The decision left Oregon with a 2-0 record and Oregon State with an 0-1 mark.

The Frosh scored in the first period on a two-yard touchdown plunge by halfback Tim Temple and Jernstedt's conversion pass to Bunker.

The score was set up by a 27-yard pass interception run-back by halfback Jim Suklosky. The Rooks tallied in the final period on a three-yard run by fullback Pete Pifer but a conversion pass attempt from quarterback Bob Grim to halfback Jack Lowery was knocked down.

Oregon rolled up a 17-12 edge in first downs and a 330-191 margin in total yardage.

Sutherlin Dumps Vikings 39-6 In UVL League Game

Sutherlin's all-out defensive effort Friday night netted the host Bulldogs a lopsided 39-6 Umpqua Valley League triumph over the Myrtle Creek Vikings.

Ken Edwards set the pace for the winners, scoring three touchdowns and passing for a fourth. Edwards racked up two tallies on pass interceptions, then got a third on a punt return.

While Edwards was outstanding on offense and defense, quarterbacking the Sutherlin team, other offensive standouts receiving special mention from coach Cy Perkins were Mike Ouellette and Alan Grauf for their running. In the line Bruce Leatherwood, Pat Peipert, Mike Thompson and David Sikstrom led the Bulldogs.

Perkins praised his entire defensive unit, stating that the charge was spearheaded by ends Steve Cannon, Edwards, Vern Liesinger and Randy Denley.

However, the victory was costly to the Bulldogs as halfback Don Goertzen suffered a thigh injury and will probably be out of action next week when the Bulldogs take on the Glendale Wildcats.

Edwards got the Bulldogs off to a fast pace when he intercepted a Viking pass and threaded his way through defenders for 35 yards to draw first blood. Grauf ran for the PAT.

The invaders came roaring back as John Benson provided the scoring punch with a one-yard plunge.

From that point on it was Sutherlin all the way. In the second period Edwards grabbed another Myrtle Creek pass—this time racing 30 yards for the six points. Ouellette added the PAT. Edwards added another six points just before the halftime intermission when he galloped 30 yards with a punt, and again Ouellette ran for the extra point.

In the third quarter the Bulldogs scored 12 points as Grauf intercepted a pass and ran 22 yards for a TD and Ouellette

Glendale Pirates Upset Glide In Vital UVL Tilt

Staging an upset, the Glendale Pirates celebrated homecoming Friday by knocking the Glide Wildcats out of contention for the Umpqua Valley League grid crown.

The Pirates came through with a determined defensive effort to stun the invaders, 19-6. The victory was the first in two years for Glendale, and only the second in the last 49 games played since joining the UVL.

Glendale opened the scoring in the second quarter when Hubert Stewart tossed a 34-yard pass to Clate Williams for six points. This ended the scoring for the Pirates until the deciding fourth quarter when the home team broke loose for 13 points.

Fighting from behind, the Glide crew managed to tie the count at six-all midway through the third period. Speede Anderson climaxed the Wildcats' lone scoring drive when he dove into the end zone from the one-yard marker.

Sensing victory, the Pirates took over in the final stanza to upend the Wildcats. Glendale's winning TD came as Wayne Troxel drove into the end zone from six yards out and Chester Buck ran for the extra point.

Late in the game the Pirates added an insurance tally when Stewart scored on a one-yard quarterback sneak.

Stewart was praised for his job as field general by coach Bill Baxter. Also coming in for special recognition was Bill Hubler, whom Baxter rates as the

"hardest running back in the UVL."

Line standouts for the Pirates were right tackle Allen Anderson and center Frank Elst. Defensively Baxter stated that it was a "great overall team effort."

The Pirates recorded 18 first downs while Glide was held to eight. Rushing the home team picked up 346 yards and the invaders had 103 yards. Glendale completed two of six pass attempts for 42 yards and intercepted two Glide aeriels. The Wildcats took to the air only three times and did not register a completion.

Glendale punted three times for an average of 18 yards per-kick, while the Wildcats averaged 22 yards on four punts. Each team recovered all its own fumbles. Penalty-wise, the Wildcats had four for 20 yards and Glendale had three for 25 yards.

The loss was the second for the Glide crew, and knocked them out of the running for a chance at the UVL championship as the Douglas Trojans soared on undefeated. Douglas has a 4-0 record with one league game remaining, while Glide, Riddle and Sutherlin have 2-2 marks. Glendale is now 1-3 in league play.

Limiting the invading grid-ders to minus rushing yards, the Oakland Oakers scored a 27-7 non-league victory over the Lowell Raiders Friday.

Oakland wasted little time in breaking into the scoring column. Jon Lamoreaux grabbed the opening kickoff out of the air, fumbled the ball momentarily, then took off behind a solid wall of blockers and rambled 72 yards for the first six points.

The next time the Oakers got their hands on the ball they marched 60 yards in nine plays to grab a 13-0 lead. Kerney Manley provided the final punch on a two-yard plunge and Lamoreaux ran for the PAT. Lamoreaux and Manley led the sustained drive, ripping off big hunks of yardage on the ground.

Late in the first period the Oakers started another drive on their own 49, and early in the second quarter hit paydirt again. Keith Crenshaw charged for gainers of 16 and 12 yards to set up the TD. Alan Cherry carried over from the seven-yard line, then ran for the PAT.

The Oakers kicked off and Lowell ran one play before Larry Frank tossed a 49-yard TD pass to Larry Kintzley. Bill Nichols kicked the PAT for the visitors.

The third quarter was strictly a defensive battle, but in the final period the Oakers started moving again. Early in the fourth quarter the Raiders were forced to punt from inside their own 10. The ball rolled dead on the Lowell 36,

scoring punch with a two-yard run.

The Raiders took the ensuing kick and went from their own 22 to the Oakland six before being stopped. Kirk Nallris rambled for 25 yards and Bill Parker took a 39-yard aerial from Frank to put the Raiders in a threatening position.
