Divorce Suits Filed

Howard R. vs. Marian P. Nelson. Married June 13, 1958, in Reno, Nev. Cruelly charged. Plaintiff would award custody of minor child and \$35 monthly support to plaintiff.

Arnell Maxine vs. John Howard McBee. Married at Port Orchard, Wash., Oct. 9, 1951. Cruelly charged. Plaintiff asks daughters and \$40 monthly support for each, with defendant to have custody of their two sons. Separation from bed and board sought by plaintiff, who also asks for attorney fees and court costs. Show cause order issued as to temporary child custody and support.

Diana Gale vs. John Pippin. Married at Roseburg June 4, 1963. Plaintiff asks \$75 per month expense during pregnancy then \$75 monthly as child support, with award of child custody. She also asks award of household furnishings, attorney fees and court costs and restoration of her former name, Diana Gale Johnston.

Elouise Essie vs. Robert Raymond Smith. Married May 13, 1940, in Clovis, N. Mex. Cruelly charged. Plaintiff asks custody of their three minor children, reserving to the court a determination of support when he is employed; award of 1953 automobile and household goods, with 1951 automobile going to defendant.

Bernice vs. Jimmy Cecil Miller. Married Aug. 31, 1957, at Woodbin, Ga. Cruelly charged.

Helen L. vs. Leonard K. Liles. Married at Sutherland Aug. 26, 1951. Cruelly charged. Plaintiff asks custody of their two minor children and \$35 monthly support for each. She also asks award of 1958 automobile, piano and certain dishes.

Viola vs. Jess Pollock. Married at Reno, Nev., Sept. 4, 1946. Cruelly charged. Plaintiff asks custody of two minor children, \$40 monthly support for each, \$40 monthly support for herself as alimony, and attorney fees. She asks award of 1947 trailer house and 1963 three-quarter-ton truck registered in the name of defendants but which she claims was bought with her money. She would award painting equipment and tanks and 1956 automobile to defendant.

Show cause order issued as to temporary child custody, support, alimony and attorney fees.
