Nicklaus, U.S. Win Golf Titles

PARIS (UPI) — Jack Nicklaus won the individual championship and the United States took the team title today in the Canada Cup and International Trophy golf matches, but unless everyone finished the tournament the victories would not stand up.

Playing only nine holes instead of the scheduled 18 because of a heavy fog which shrouded the course, Nicklaus shot a four-under-par 32 which gave him the individual crown with a total of 237. It was five strokes better than runners up Gary Player of South Africa and Sebastian Migue of Spain.

In the team race the U. S. team of Nicklaus and Arnold Palmer finished with a total of 482 against 485 for runnerup Spain.

There was an "if" connected with the U.S. triumphs. Under the rules which shortened the tournament from the scheduled 72 holes to only 63, it was stipulated that all teams must finish or the scores would revert to the 54-hole total.

Some of the teams teed off shortly before Nicklaus and Palmer finished, and there was some question whether all would be able to complete play because the fog was getting denser.

If this happened scores would revert to the 54-hole totals and there would be a sudden death playoff involving Nicklaus and Player for the individual title and the United States and Spanish teams for the team championship as they were tied going into today's play.

riors for second place. Defense was the key to Drain's triumph over the Saints, with the rugged Warriors holding the host team to a mere 12 yards total offense for the game. All of St. Francis' yardage came by rushing.

The winners opened the scoring in the second quarter, marching 77 yards in 16 plays. Mark Thomas climaxed the drive by plunging into the end zone from one-yard out.

Coming back after the half-time intermission, the Warriors displayed their strong offense again — this time going 61 yards in 12 plays. Jerry Smith came up with the pay-off run from the four-yard line.

Drain's final two points came in the fourth quarter on a safety. The St. Francis punter went back to kick, but the snap from center sailed over his head and bounced out of the end zone.

With the Saints stopped cold as far as offense was concerned, they finally got on the scoreboard by turning an errant Drain pass into a TD in the final period. Scott Taylor grabbed the Warrior aerial and raced 57 yards.

St. Francis' lone offensive thrust of the game ended after reaching the Drain 29. Drain was inside the Saints' 15 three times, in addition to the drives that netted TDs.

The Warriors racked up 12 first downs, compared to two for St. Francis. Rushing the winners gained 220 yards and added 14 yards on one of five pass completions. St. Francis gained 12 yards rushing and attempted two passes. The Saints picked off one Drain pass.

Each team lost the ball once via the fumble route. Drain punted twice for an average of 27.5 yards, and St. Francis punted six times for a 25.7 average. The Warriors were penalized three times for 35 yards and St. Francis was set back 58 yards on five penalties.

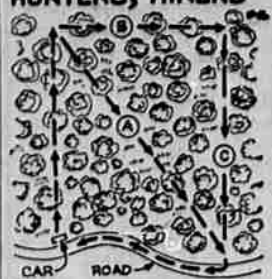

Syracuse Blasts Beavers, 31-8

CORVALLIS (UPI) — "That's the best football team we've played this year," Oregon State Coach Tommy Prothro explained.

Prothro referred to his Beavers' 31-8 beating at Syracuse. "They're physically strong, perhaps as strong as any team I've ever seen," he continued. "They have good speed and their linemen are agile."

The defeat was the second in six games for Oregon State. Mistakes played a key part in the Beavers' loss—three fumbles and three intercepted passes—but Prothro refused to take anything away from the winners. "We made mistakes, sure," he said. "But I'm inclined to think that they're a great football team. Give them credit for making us err."

Ahead In Yards
 Despite the lopsided score, the Beavers were impressive. They rolled up 317 total yards to 305 for their opponents.

Oregon State scored in the second period to take an 8-7 lead on an 80-yard touchdown run by sophomore fullback Charlie Shaw and a two-point conversion run by sophomore Marv Crowston.

Syracuse led 15-8 at halftime and added two touchdowns in the third period and a field goal in the final period.

"Burke (Vern) is simply marvelous and Oregon State's offense keeps you on edge all the way," Syracuse Coach Ben Schwartzwalder said.

Burke, the Beavers' star senior end, caught seven passes for 154 yards.

Oregon State will meet Stanford here next Saturday. The Indians upset Notre Dame 24-14 Saturday.

Crunican Wins District CC Title Marshfield Ties Axemen For Team Championship



MIKE CRUNICAN, Roseburg cross country ace, came across the finish line first in the District 5-A-1 meet Saturday at North Eugene. The Indian flash was timed in a record-breaking 8:32.9 as he edged defending champion Steve Bingham of Marshfield. The Marshfield Pirates and the South Eugene Axemen tied for top team honors with 49 points each.

Mike Crunican provided the Roseburg Indians with their share of glory in the District 5-A-1 cross country meet Saturday at North Eugene.

Crunican kept his unbeaten record intact as he raced home ahead of the pack. In winning the individual crown, Crunican was clocked in 8 minutes, 32.9 seconds over the 1.8 mile course. Crunican's winning time shattered both the district and course records.

The former district record was held by Steve Bingham of Marshfield at 8:53, while the course record at North Eugene belonged to Leon Henderson of the Highlanders with a 8:51.7. While Crunican was winning the individual honors, the Marshfield Pirates and the South Eugene Axemen were battling to a deadlock for the team championship. Both the Pirates and the Axemen ended with 49 points, followed by North Eugene with 75 points, Sheldon with 89 points and the Indians with 124 points.

Marshfield, boasting a crew of four juniors, two sophomores and only one senior, had five men place in the top 17 to tie the favored Axemen.

The Pirates were led by Bingham, defending district champ, who came in second with an 8:34.0 clocking. Teammate John Woodward was third at 8:37 and North Eugene's Henderson finished fourth with an 8:47.

Geoff Hollister led the Axemen with a fifth place finish, with Steve Stageberg, sixth, Paul Weiseth, ninth, and Charles Mitchell 10th.

The first five finishers in the varsity race topped the former district record.

The teams representing Marshfield, South Eugene and North Eugene, plus the top eight individual runners qualified for the state meet this Saturday in Salem. Crunican and Springfield's Bob Hoffman were the only two runners to qualify for the state meet that were not on one of the top three teams. Hoffman finished eighth in the race.

Crunican was the only Roseburg varsity runner to finish in the top 25.

In the Jayvee meet South Eugene's Charles Pletka won top honors with a clocking of 6:58.7 over the 1.4 mile course. However, Marshfield's Jayvees, came out with team honors with a score of 39 points.

Roseburg's Jayvees, led by Darrell Elliott finished third with 50 points.

SD Chargers Upset In AFL

 The letters "DD" mean daily organized when they beat the double to most of the sports world but to the Oakland Raiders' American Football League rivals they indicate "double danger."

They stand for Cotton Davidson and Clem Daniels, a pair of transplanted Texans who are leading the Raiders out of the despair born of one victory in the 1962 season and only three in 28 games leading up to the current season.

The Raiders scored the greatest victory since the club was organized when they beat the San Diego Chargers, 34-33, Sunday and stalled the Chargers' runaway to the Western division title.

The Houston Oilers took a one-game lead in the Eastern Division with a 28-7 win over the Kansas City Chiefs in Sunday's only other AFL game.

In Saturday night's games the Denver Broncos and New York Jets played to a 25-35 tie and the Buffalo bills downed the Boston Patriots 28-21.

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
