## Gary Powers Takes Bride

POUND, Va. (UPI)—Francis Gary Powers, the former spy pilot whose high-flying U2 was brought down deep in Russia in 1960, planned to bring his bride of two days to this mountain village Monday for a visit with his parents.

The former Central Intelligence Agency pilot, who became a central figure in a major cold war crisis, was married in Catlett, Va., Saturday to Mrs. Claude Edwards Donney, 28, who also worked for the CIA.

It was the second marriage for both. Their earlier marriages ended in divorce.

Powers' parents did not attend the ceremony Saturday. His father, Oliver Powers, said they were not invited, but then added: "It was too far for me to drive."

"I've met the girl," the elder Powers said. "She's real nice and I'm very glad."

Powers was brought down May, 1960, 1,200 miles inside Russia. He was sentenced to 10 years in a Soviet prison but was released after 20 months in exchange for convicted Russian spy Rudolf Abel.

Powers, a test pilot with the Lockheed Aviation Corp. at Burbank, Calif., is expected to return to work next week, according to his father.

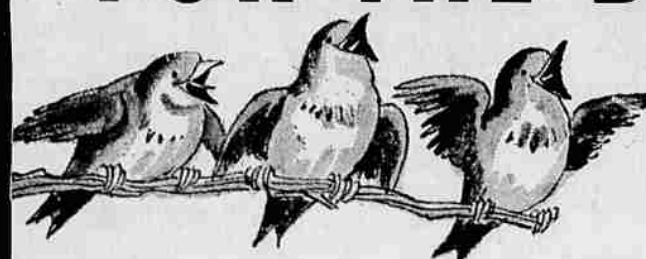
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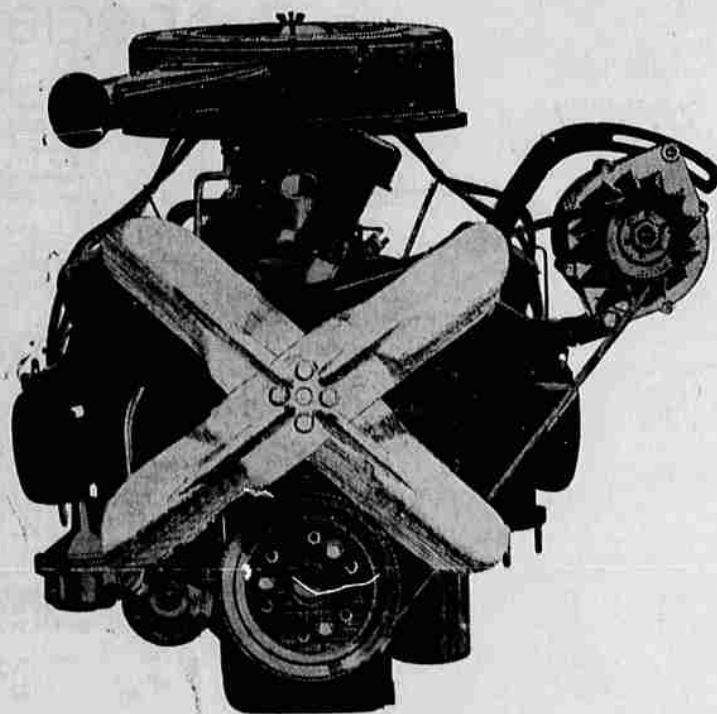
