

Tentative Agreement Believed Reached By Hassan, Ben Bella

BAMAKO, Mali (UPI)—Algerian sources claimed today that President Ahmed Ben Bella and Moroccan King Hassan II had tentatively agreed to demilitarize the disputed area on their frontier pending further talks.

The report, which was not immediately confirmed by other delegations here, came shortly after the two chiefs of state broke an agenda deadlock and finally began negotiating their border conflict.

Meeting with Ben Bella and Hassan in the dispute which was critically affected North African unity. Conference chairman Emperor Haile Selassie of Ethiopia and host Mali President Modibo Keita. The four-power conference opened this morning.

An initial deadlock over the agenda prevented the two quarrel government leaders from meeting face to face on their arrival Tuesday and had threatened to wreck the meeting before its start.

Algerian conference sources claimed that any decision agreed to in principle at Bamako would be submitted to the 32-nation Organization of African Unity (OAU) for detailed discussion and final approval.

The Algerian claims were received with caution by observers. Morocco so far has refused to pull its troops back

from the region around Hassi Beida and Timyoub, 500 miles southwest of Colomb Bechar, and from the region of Tindouf, 350 miles farther to the south. King Hassan's regime claims its troops merely reoccupied territory belonging rightfully to Morocco.

The demilitarized zone apparently would mean the creation of a temporary no-man's-land or buffer zone, while the OAU or another international group would attempt to draw a permanent frontier line along the disputed stretches of the 700-mile common border between Algeria and Morocco. The area includes possibly valuable mineral resources which are still untapped.

UNICEF Drive Slated Tonight

Future Homemaker of America girls of Roseburg High School, some 25 or 30 of them will be out tonight "trick or treating" for one of their favorite projects, the United Nations Children's Fund. It will be the sixth year for such participation and during this period the girls have collected over \$1,500 to aid needy children of the world.

From a small beginning in 1950 when the pupils of a Sunday School class renounced their Halloween "treats" of candy and apples in favor of coins which they would contribute to the welfare of less fortunate contemporaries in other parts of the world, the UNICEF program has grown to be a national institution. It is endorsed by the President of the United States and other national figures.

Local householders are asked to have their spare change ready when UNICEF young folks come to call. The FHA girls, one of many such groups to conduct drives in the county, this year out of their club treasury purchased commemorative bookmarks to give contributors to the fund. All UNICEF workers will wear or carry identifying insignia.

In Roseburg, the FHA drive will begin after school today and continue into the evening hours. Children in the southern part of the county will be out Halloween night making solicitation under the sponsorship of the Tri-Cities Ministerial Alliance. It is expected that children will seek funds in Ridge, Canyonville, Myrtle Creek and Tri-City. Churches participating are Methodist, Church of the Nazarene, All Souls Catholic, First Christian and Presbyterian.

Monday night in Roseburg the Youth Fellowship of the First Methodist Church covered some areas of Roseburg in a church-sponsored drive.

Police Chief Cautions Drivers On Halloween

City Police Chief Truett warned motorists today of the dangers of Halloween. It wasn't goblins, witches and ghosts the chief warned drivers to look out for, but their tiny trick-or-treat imitators.

"Some Halloween costumes make it as difficult for the child to see as to be seen," the chief commented. Not only are the dark costumes hard for drivers to see at night, but masks and hoods cut down the child's side vision and make it hard for him to see the motorist as well.

"Excitement just adds to the danger," Chief Truett said.

"If it's necessary to drive on Halloween," the chief said, "drivers should be extremely cautious and alert for trick-or-treaters."

"Perhaps the best place to be on Halloween is in front of the TV set with the car locked up in the garage; safe from would-be window soapers," he added.

Deputy U. S. Marshal Paul Thornberg, on a Secret Service warrant issued Oct. 7 in Ohio, came to Roseburg to take charge of Clouse and take him to Portland. Clouse waived a hearing on his return to Ohio before U. S. Commissioner Claire Mundorf Tuesday, The United Press International reports.

Darling Defines Forest Benefits

The tangible and intangible benefits of the Umpqua National Forest to residents of Douglas County were defined Tuesday night by Don Darling in a talk for the Melrose Dads' Club.

Darling, who is editor-writer for the Umpqua forest staff, discussed forest values and their impact upon the community in a talk entitled "Multiple Forest Benefits."

He noted that from 1906 to 1960 Douglas County received \$10 1/2 million in receipts from all National Forest lands within its boundaries. In 1962, this county's share of Umpqua forest receipts was about \$1 1/2 million.

Darling noted further that the Umpqua forest provides 900,000 acres of watershed which furnish 7 1/2 million gallons of water daily to many of the county's principal cities.

The intangible values mentioned by the speaker include the opportunities for recreation and esthetic enjoyment which the forest provides.

Darling also projected slides from a series known as the "Gem of the Cascades" which features the greater Diamond Lake recreation area.

Two Canyonville Men Sentenced For Theft

Stan Robson and LaVerne Jackson Mulholland, 40, both of Canyonville, have been sentenced to serve 30 days in the Douglas County jail and fined \$100 and \$4.50 costs each on charges of petty larceny.

A two-day meeting in Seattle gathering key March of Dimes workers from five northwestern states will be attended by four Roseburg residents.

They are Gordon Wood, National Foundation chapter president for Douglas County; Bob Curtis, March of Dimes chairman; Mrs. Jack Norris, Mothers March chairman, and Don Baile, Dimes drive publicity chairman.

The session opens Thursday. Volunteers attending will hear medical authorities describe the impressive gains which are being made in the March of Dimes fight against the two great cripples — birth defects and arthritis.

Wood said a high percentage of funds raised in the traditional January March of Dimes will help finance a growing national network of nearly 70 medical treatment centers where significant progress has already been made in rehabilitating victims of birth defects and arthritis.

Unification Group Plans To Submit Recommendations To City In January

The Roseburg Area Unification Committee (Unicom) voted Tuesday night to have all subcommittees complete their reports by the January meeting and recommendations made to Roseburg city officials.

Unicom was organized earlier this year at the request of Roseburg Mayor Thomas Garrison to study the facilities of various governmental organizations in the area — needs of the various areas — and cost of unification (the most probable form of which is annexation to the city) for all parties involved.

The purpose of these committee studies is to determine if annexation is feasible and desirable, or if some other type of unification would better serve the purpose. The committee is also to determine if the areas

involved can continue adequate services to their residents without unification.

The committee also voted Tuesday night to have the steering committee (comprised of general chairman Ross Meyers and chairmen of the five subcommittees) define the area involved in the study for final boundaries. In the original studies, the various subcommittees started working with the boundaries of School District 4, with plans at that time to cut the boundaries down to feasible proportions as is now being done.

The area will be divided into possible unification blocks so the advantages, disadvantages, costs, etc. of annexation can be detailed for residents into each specific area. This would also give the committees a point from which to work in determining possible division of assets and liabilities which would

be involved if annexation took place in an area now served by a separate fire district, sewer district, water district, etc.

Development Urged
The main committee report given at Tuesday night's meeting was by Claude Baker, chairman of the parks and recreation subcommittee. Baker reported on a survey of Gaddis Park, and recommended that various civic organizations within the area be encouraged to speed up development of the park.

He noted the tremendous projects these service clubs have carried out at Stewart Park and said similar work could be done in Gaddis Park. He pointed to improvement of the swimming and fishing areas, along with development of a recreational baseball field and picnic facilities as the prime potential of the park.

Florence Man Found Innocent

Lyonel Chapman, 56, of Florence was found innocent on trial in Roseburg Municipal Court before Judge Warren Woodruff Tuesday night. He was charged with driving while intoxicated on arrest by Roseburg City Police.

Judge Woodruff has sentenced Gary Lee Huntzinger, 18, Roseburg, to 30 days in the city jail and fined him \$150 and \$5 costs for driving a motor vehicle with his driver's license suspended.

Terry Jay Hachler, Howard Lee Millard and Robert Eugene Aldred, all of Roseburg, were fined \$45 and \$5 costs each on charges of street racing by Judge Woodruff.

Total of 32 traffic cases, including the trial of Chapman, were handled in traffic court Tuesday night. Six were for basic rule violation, nine non-stop, and the others miscellaneous.

Trial Opens For Watson

The trial of James Walter Watson, 23, Winston, began at 10 a.m. today in the circuit court of Judge Don H. Sanders with the selection of jurors.

Watson is charged in a Grand Jury indictment with robbery by force and violence not being armed with a dangerous weapon. He is accused of beating and robbing Harlan Everett Payne of Star Route, Tennille, Saturday night, Aug. 24.

Police reports indicate Watson, a woman companion, Darlene June Whitaker, 22, Roseburg, and Payne had been drinking in a Winston tavern. They left together and drove to the steel bridge south of Dillard on Highway 99.

Payne has claimed he was beaten and robbed and thrown over an embankment. Watson, who has pleaded innocent to the charge, has maintained that Payne suffered injuries when he fell over the embankment after getting out of the car.

Payne after a time made his way up the embankment and hitchhiked to the Winston police station. Watson and Mrs. Whitaker were arrested early that Sunday morning at a Winston cafe.

Mrs. Whitaker has pleaded guilty to a charge of being an accessory after the fact and has been placed on probation.

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A Secret Service spokesman said several arrests have been made in the Midwest in connection with passage of the bogus bills.

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
