University Mothers Hear Talk By Danish Student

Mrs. Burton Randall, assisted by Mrs. Glen Scott and Mrs. Dave Geddes, entertained members of the University of Oregon Mothers Club at her beautiful home on NE Klamath Ave. Monday night. It was the first meeting of the group for the fall season. A dessert supper was served at 7:30 p.m. with the program and business meeting following.

Mrs. E. V. Lincoln, 1963-64 president, welcomed new U of O mothers present for the first time. For the evening's program, Soren Theilgaard, a young architecture student fresh from Denmark, took club members on a tour of his native Copenhagen by means of colored slides and a descriptive narrative in faultless English. Theilgaard has been in this country a little over a month, coming for his sophomore college year at the University of Oregon on a foreign student's scholarship from the university. He filled in at Monday night's club meeting for his roommate, Dan Dodd of Winston, originally scheduled to speak, who was preparing for Tuesday examinations. Dodd's mother, Mrs. Paul Dodd, introduced Theilgaard prior to his talk.

Theilgaard, with pictures and words, portrayed Copenhagen as an ultra-modern city despite its heritage of history and its many ancient buildings preserved as a part of the country's culture. He described Copenhagen as a city of apartment dwellers and showed pictures of blocks and blocks of newly-constructed apartment houses designed by the nation's most famous architects. Progressiveness of Denmark education was exemplified by Theilgaard himself. Not quite 19, he has studied languages since the age of 6 and speaks and writes, besides his native tongue, four other languages. He described the educational system in Denmark and showed pictures of the schools. Following the program, club members planned for the rummage sale to be held at the Woman's Club on Saturday, Nov. 2, and Mrs. Lincoln introduced officers and committee chairmen. 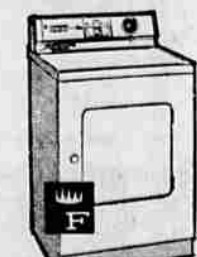
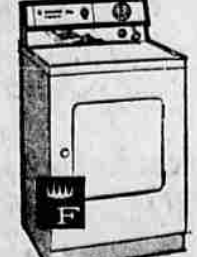
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
