U.S. Ousts Three Red Spy Suspects

Kennedy Tells Philadelphians America Moves

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — President Kennedy, who campaigned three years ago on a pledge to get the country moving again, Wednesday night told a Democratic fund-raising dinner that "America is on the march."

In a five-hour visit that netted the Democratic party treasury \$450,000 and gave a boost to Mayor James H. J. Tate's chances of election to his first full four-year term, Kennedy dwelt on the gains made in the 33 months of his administration.

The president arrived at 4:56 p.m. EST, was whisked to a downtown hotel, attended a reception for 200 Democrats who paid \$250 each for the privilege, dined alone in his room, addressed 4,000 party faithful at a \$100-a-plate dinner at Convention Hall, and was airborne for Washington at 10:04 p.m.

The Chief Executive referred only slightly to the racial issue which threatens to play a major role in next Tuesday's mayoral election here.

Praises Democrats
But he praised Tate, Rep. William J. Green, D-Pa., the Philadelphia Democratic city chairman, and the people of Philadelphia whose support in the 1960 presidential election swung Pennsylvania's 32 electoral college votes to him.

Bad Airlock Slows Mine Rescue Try
PEINE, Germany (UPI) — A mechanical flaw in the rescue rig today condemned three trapped iron miners to spend another night in their air-bubble 262 feet underground.

The mining company manager said the three men who have spent seven days in the flooded mine could not be rescued before Friday.

Rescuers originally had hoped to bring the miners to the surface today.

Manager Rudolf Stein of the Iseeder Mine Company said a balky airlock was holding up rescue efforts.

With drilling halted 65 feet from the trapped miners, rescue workers struggled to fasten the airlock atop the borehole through which they planned to bring the men out in a torpedo-shaped rescue capsule.

Unless the airlock seal is pressure-tight, the men could drown in a sudden rush of flood water from below when the giant American-made drill breaks through to them and allows high pressure air in their chamber to escape.

The rescue drilling was being conducted in two partially-completed emergency shafts—each 28 inches wide. It had been held up earlier to await the hardening of concrete lining around the steel shaft casings.

Castro Threatens Death To Invaders

HAVANA (UPI)—Fidel Castro in at least 10 raids against Cuba.

The CIA in Washington had no comment either on Castro's speech or the vessel.

Castro did not identify by nationality the five men he said were captured in the Oct. 21 landing attempt, which came the same night the American-owned freighter J. Louis said it was attacked by Cuban planes in an area close to where Castro placed the landing attempt.

Castro said the landing incident "unveils the policy of the United States and the procedures which they employ and the cheap ideology with which they try to defend their social system."

Apparently going on what he had learned from interrogating captured exile raiders, Castro named the vessel "Rex" as the "mother ship" of an Oct. 21 landing attempt on Cuba's south coast, described the vessel and said it was based at West Palm Beach.

A vessel named the Rex and painted blue, as Castro said, was found tied up at the port of Palm Beach, just north of West Palm Beach. It was registered from Nicaragua, whose government is strongly anti-Castro and, unofficially, has befriended anti-Castro Cuban exile groups.

Castro said the Rex was the CIA's boat and had been used

Snowfall Hits Plains States

A blustery fall storm brewed over the Central Plains today and heavy snow fell in Colorado and Wyoming.

The temperature dipped to 13 degrees at Ely, Nev. Both Tallahassee and Ocala, Fla., recorded 32-degree readings.

Seven inches of snow fell during the night at Leadville, Colo., more than 2 inches were reported at Lander, Wyo. Up to 3 inches of snow fell in eastern Maine.

The weather bureau said the storm which brought rain and thundershowers to the plains "gave indications of spoiling the All Hallows day for many sections of the country."

Fierce Algeria Fighting Rages 48 Hours To Depart

RABAT, Morocco (UPI) — Fierce new fighting raged today between Algerian and Moroccan forces along their disputed border despite a cease-fire agreement that comes into effect Friday.

Moroccan King Hassan II returned home from Bamako, Mali, where he signed the cease-fire arrangement Wednesday with Algerian President Ahmed Ben Bella.

An announcement said that Algerian troops launched attacks at three points in the western Sahara in the past 24 hours and said fighting is still going on.

The battles took place to the north of Colomb Bechar, Algeria, near the village of Ich, at Djebel El Hammar in the Ksar Es Souk Province 180 miles southwest of Colomb Bechar; and at Ain Char, about 80 miles west of Figitug. All are points along the disputed border in areas where unexploited mineral resources reportedly have been found.

Government sources said all three attacks were pushed back and that the Algerians suffered heavy losses. Moroccans at Ain Bechar reportedly captured 40 Algerian paratroopers.

The sources said all three battle sites were "clearly in Moroccan territory." The battle of Ich was 600 miles to the north of Hassi Beida and Tinnoub, the tiny desert oases which were the scenes of original clashes between the two countries three weeks ago.

Chinese Resume Soviet Attacks

TOKYO (UPI) — Communist China today resumed its attacks on Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev, ignoring the call for an ideological cease-fire.

Red China's latest blasts were contained in two lengthy articles broadcast by the Communist New China News Agency and monitored in Tokyo. One summarized an article in the Albanian Communist party newspaper and the other came in the form of a 1,000 word "editor's note" in China's Peoples Daily Newspaper.

The Albanian article called an open letter published by the Soviet Communist party central committee last month "a declaration of betrayal."

The editor's note, accompanying some extracts of Russia's arguments in the ideological dispute, branded them "so ridiculous that they make repulsive reading."

It said the Chinese newspaper will not publish any more of them because they are too long and "badly written." The extracts will be put out in book form instead, New China said.

The Soviet mission responded by calling the action a "deliberate provocation" against "those who sought better relations between the United States and the United Nations."

Poll Shows Strong Sales Tax Support

A sales tax with certain exemptions and a cigarette tax are drawing strong support in a countywide poll.

A ballot was published in Tuesday's News-Review asking readers to indicate their preferences of ways to solve the state's tax problems. The ballot will appear again today and Saturday.

The ballot was published at the request of Douglas County legislators to help them decide what actions they should take in the forthcoming special session of the legislature, starting Nov. 11. The results will also be compiled in a state-wide poll being conducted by the Oregon Junior Chamber of Commerce.

162 Ballots Received
The first flood of responses from the ballot totaled 162.

Five "yes" and "no" questions were included. In the first, the choice was made on a sales tax without exemptions. Voters, so far, were strongly against it (74-24). But with exemptions, such as food and drugs included, the trend was favorable (77 in favor, 46 against). Also, drawing strong support was a cigarette tax (79-21). Practicality was one shown an interest in increasing the state income tax or levying a state property tax. The vote against the in-

come tax increase so far is 102-6 and against the property tax, 103-3.

A strong ground swell was also noted for no tax increases at all. Sixty-two said they wanted no increase.

Although the poll was designed for simplicity, many people made separate comments. Several insisted that any new tax be designed as offset to the income tax. One voter said: "I am in favor of a sales tax if it replaces the income tax." Other comments called for no tax increases until the Legislature cuts back the salary increase it gave itself this year.

Lottery Requested
Some of the writers ignored the choices offered on the ballot entirely and called for a state lottery. One said: "There are too many taxes now. We work for four months a year for the federal government. We pay a tidy sum in state taxes, plus \$45 a month in property tax. Is there no end to it? ... I've never drawn unemployment or aid of any kind and I'm sick, sick, sick of taxes. Let's have a state lottery, if we need be—we could at least have fun while being robbed." Several voters also said too much was being spent on schools.
