

# Baker's Famous Quorum Club Holds Open House For Press

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Capitol Hill's suddenly famous Quorum Club, located in a suite that was once a Nixon-for-president office, held open house for newsmen today. The purpose was to show there's nothing sinister or ultra-secret about its operations.

The club fell into the news spotlight because former Senate Democratic Secretary Robert G. (Bobby) Baker, now under investigation for his non-Senate business dealings, was an original member.

But the only thing approaching excitement in the three-

room drink-and-dine snuggery this morning was the traffic created by photographers and reporters. Thomas and William Pickford, co-owners of the Carroll Arms Hotel which houses the club across the street from the Senate office buildings, answered questions frankly.

Tom said Mrs. Ellen Rometsch, the 27-year-old German beauty whose name has cropped up in stories about the Baker case, "never worked here for a minute." And, to the best of his knowledge, she never visited the club as a guest, he added.

Have there been any withdrawals from the club membership of some 180 persons as a result of all the Baker case publicity, he was asked.

"Zero," he replied. "We have had an increase of about five members since the publicity."

The hotel owns the facilities and leases the layout to the club, and the hotel gets any profit from the food-and-drink business.

Only about 25 per cent of the members are lobbyists, Bill Pickford reported, and only 90 of the 180 members are resident in the area. Four senators and two House members are members, he said.

Lyle Snader, an Association of American Railroad employee now president of the club, was not on hand at the time. The Pickfords fielded all the newsmen's questions.

During the 1960 presidential campaign period, the rooms now occupied by the Quorum Club were rented out to the Nixon-for-president organization, Tom Pickford reported. Before that, they were a hotel suite.

Featured speaker at the planning meeting Friday will be Manville Heisel, past president of the Crater Lions Club, which has handled radio and television auctions for United Fund in that area for 10 years. The auction in Roseburg is scheduled from 4 to 6 p.m. Nov. 17.

# Estes' Lawyers Request Reversal Of Conviction

AUSTIN, Tex. (UPI) — The Texas Court of Criminal Appeals must now decide whether bankrupt farm financier Billie Sol Estes got a fair trial when he was convicted of fraud and sentenced to eight years in a state court at Tyler last year.

Lawyers for Estes claimed Wednesday he did not, and asked the court to reverse his conviction.

Prosecutors said he did, and asked the court to dismiss the appeal.

John Cofer, representing Estes, charged that the jury that convicted Estes was prejudiced against him; that he was victimized by newspaper publicity and that television reporting of the trial was unfair to Estes.

John P. Dennison of Pecos, another Estes lawyer, argued that the decision should be reversed because of discrepancies between the indictment and documents offered as proof.

Estes also faces 15 years in federal prison on another conviction. He is appealing that sentence, too.

Prosecutor Leon Douglas said Estes got a fair trial and was sentenced to eight years "because that's what the evidence indicated."

Douglas said Cofer's arguments about excessive newspaper publicity did not stand up because "they're saying that if you commit a crime serious enough to get publicity, you're safe because you could never be tried."

Cofer said the decision to allow television coverage of the trial was a "sad criticism of our courts that man can't walk into a courtroom without being humiliated and exposed to the world for the purpose of selling soup or soft drinks or promoting a political candidate."

# Three Named For School Budget Group

The Douglas County Intermediate School Board has appointed three new budget committee members to work on the 1964-65 budget for the former Rural School District which includes all of Douglas County.

Named to the positions were Don Reed of Roseburg, LaVerna Murphy of Umpqua and Harold Boucock of Yoncalla. Holdover budget committee members are Lefe Aikin of Riddle, Keith Dies of Sutherlin, Don Martin of Myrtle Creek and Hugh Whipple of Drain.

These lay members with the intermediate board make up the budget committee. Their job will be to prepare the budget for the county intermediate school office, special services departments and the expenses of the intermediate board itself.

Under the new budget law, a budget director had to be selected also. The board named Kenneth Barneburg, Douglas County School superintendent.

The board has scheduled a special meeting for Nov. 7 at which it will discuss the instructional materials center study made by the committee headed by Henry Ruark, director of educational media for the state Board of Education.

# Bid Opening Set On USFS Parking Lot

The Forest Service regional office will open bids Nov. 13 for bituminous plant mix, surfacing of parking areas at the Forest Service Warehouse on East Diamond Lake Boulevard.

The surfacing improvements will be made to parking areas at the rear and along the west side of the building, local Forest Service officials said.

Officials said improved surfacing is needed around the building as it is a main servicing center for Forest Service vehicles used on the Umpqua National Forest. The building also quarters a radio repair shop, provides storage and is center for several other Umpqua forest activities.

# Watson Gets Prison Term On Assault - Theft Count

A jury found James Walter Watson, 23, of Winston guilty of assault and robbery not being armed with a dangerous weapon, at the conclusion of a day-long trial before Judge Don H. Sanders Wednesday.

Judge Sanders sentenced him to serve 18 months in the Oregon Correctional Institution, when he appeared for sentencing at 9:30 a.m. today.

Watson was accused in the Grand Jury indictment with beating and robbing Hartan Everett Payne of Tenmile on Aug. 24.

Testimony brought out at the trial was to the effect Watson, a girl friend, Darlene June Whitaker, 22, Roseburg, and Payne had been drinking in a Winston tavern, that they left to get something to eat, with Watson driving Payne's car.

Watson allegedly drove to the steel bridge south of Dillard, and there beat Payne, knocking him over an embankment then robbing him. He was allegedly left there. Payne, after regaining consciousness, made his way up the bank, and hitchhiked to the Winston Police Station.

Watson, who was arrested at 3 a.m. on that Sunday morning with Mrs. Whitaker in a Winston restaurant, claimed Payne fell over the bank, causing his injuries. He denied the charges. He took the stand as the only defense witness.

Witnesses included Payne, Mrs. Whitaker, who has pleaded guilty to being an accessory and is on probation; Winston police Chief George Jacobs; and patrolman James McClendon and David Burdett.

The trial opened at 10 a.m. The jury took the case at 4:10 p.m. and returned its verdict at 5:58 p.m. Deputy Dist. Atty. Philip Washburn tried the case. Defense attorney was Randolph Slocum.

# Tax Suit Hits Teamster Boss

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Internal Revenue Service (IRS) has charged that Teamster President James R. Hoffa and his wife owe \$20,295 in additional income taxes for 1959, it was disclosed today.

Hoffa challenged the claim and has asked for a trial on the issues in federal court in Detroit.

The Teamster leader's latest run-in with the federal government came to light when he filed notice with the U.S. tax court that he would fight the IRS determination.

The government said that a union-paid insurance, legal fees, hotel expenses and transportation for Hoffa fell in the category of personal income and that he should have paid taxes on it.

In their answer, the Hoffas claimed these payments were not subject to taxation on grounds they were either tax-exempt or ordinary and necessary expenses connected with his business as a union officer.

The IRS said the Hoffas's taxable income for 1959 was reported as \$71,407.25 and a tax of \$33,708.73 was paid by the union chief and his wife.

The government contends their taxable income should have been listed at \$100,519.77. The tax on that would be \$54,001.85.

The tax proceeding is civil, not criminal.

In addition, the government said that Hoffa claimed \$10,000 too much in a capital loss carryover deduction from 1958 to 1959 in connection with the sale of the Hoffas' interest in Joll Properties. Hoffa said the amount deducted was correct.

The legal fees apparently were paid in connection with Hoffa's federal trial in New York City on wiretapping conspiracy charges. He was acquitted after the second trial. The first ended in a hung jury.
