LA's Sandy Koufax Selected NL's 'Most Valuable Player'

BOSTON (UPI) — Sandy Koufax hit a \$50,000 to \$60,000 "double" today — a Cy Young award and a most valuable player award in one season. The 27-year old Los Angeles Dodgers fireballer won the "second half" of the double Wednesday when the Baseball Writers Association of America selected him as the National League's MVP. Earlier, he was named from fifth through 10th, by out-fielder Hank Aaron of the Milwaukee Braves was third with 135 and relief ace Ron Perrault of the Dodgers was fourth with 130. They were followed, in order, by outfielder Willie Mays of the San Francisco Giants, infielder Jim Gilliam of the Dodgers, first baseman Bill White of the Cardinals, outfielder Tommy Davis of the Dodgers, third baseman Ron Santo of the Chicago Cubs and outfielder Vada Pinson of the Cincinnati Reds.

Nearly Unanimous
A 25-game winner with a 1.88 earned run average, 11 shutouts and 306 strikeouts, Koufax was named on 19 of the 20 ballots cast by veteran members of the BBWAA. Fourteen of the writers made him their No. 1 selection, three chose him second and he got one third and one

fifth, for 237 of a possible 280 points. Shortstop Dick Groat of the St. Louis Cardinals was second with 190 points, slugging out-fielder Hank Aaron of the Milwaukee Braves was third with 135 and relief ace Ron Perrault of the Dodgers was fourth with 130. They were followed, in order, by outfielder Willie Mays of the San Francisco Giants, infielder Jim Gilliam of the Dodgers, first baseman Bill White of the Cardinals, outfielder Tommy Davis of the Dodgers, third baseman Ron Santo of the Chicago Cubs and outfielder Vada Pinson of the Cincinnati Reds.

Very Surprised
"I didn't think a pitcher would get it," said Koufax when BBWAA National Secretary Hy Hurwitz informed him of his tri-

umph. "I feel Groat would be up there but I'm amazed that Gilliam didn't finish higher than sixth. Jim never gets what he deserves. He deserved to be higher." The sophisticated, Brooklyn-born Koufax capped his brilliant season by scoring two victories in the Dodgers' four-game World Series sweep of the New York Yankees. He set a series single game record of 15 as the outstanding major league pitcher of 1963. Koufax's 11 shutouts were the most achieved by a left-hander in one season during the modern era and his 306 strikeouts are a National League record. Walter Johnson, Rube Waddell and Bob Feller are the only other pitchers who have struck out 300 or more batters in one season.

While Vancouver goalie Marcel Paille led his team to an overtime 5-4 win at Denver, San Francisco net-minder Bob Perrault was the hero when the Seals won at Portland, 2-1.

All six teams in the league are within five points of each other, but the Seals would seem to be in the driver's seat since they have forged into first place while on the road. Vancouver trailed 4-2 at Denver Wednesday night with 11 minutes gone in the final stanza but Phil Maloney's unassisted goal with 1:03 left in the contest tied up the score. In the overtime stanza, Buddy Boone scored after a power play by Maloney and Jimmy Baird. But the real hero was Paille who had to block 34 shots while Denver goalie Al Millar only stopped 15. Perrault's performance was even better.

B Grid Titles At Stake In Weekend Encounters

With one league championship already sewed up, two more Douglas County teams will be out to clinch conference crowns and state playoff berths this weekend. The Douglas Trojans have already captured the Umpqua Valley League crown and are awaiting their state quarter-final game Nov. 15 or 16 against the winner of the Rogue Valley League champs. Phoenix's top rated Pirates are currently atop the Rogue Valley standings. The six UVL teams will wind up the 1963 season this week with Douglas warming up at Myrtle Creek against the Vikings Friday night, while a red-hot battle shapes up for second place are the Riddle Irish, the Glide Wildcats and the Sutherlin Bulldogs. Friday the Irish will entertain the Glendale Pirates and the Wildcats will travel to Sutherlin to battle the Bulldogs. All UVL games will start at 8 p.m. Drain's Warriors, still shooting for the Emerald League crown, will host the Central Linn Cobras. The Warriors boast a 6-1 league record, and need only a defeat handed to the Junction City Tigers for a chance at the playoff berth.

This week's spotlight will be on the county B teams. In Bico-Trico B League the Yoncalla Eagles could grab the loop crown with a victory over the second place Oakland Oakers who will invade Yoncalla Friday afternoon. Elkton Elks will entertain the Lowell Raiders in the other league counter Friday. Both games will start at 1:30 p.m. Saturday the Monroe Blue Dragons will be at Powers to face the Cruisers at 1:30 p.m. The Southern Oregon Eight-Man League title will definitely be decided Friday when the Canyonville Tigers invade Camas Valley to clash with the high-flying Hornets. Both teams sport perfect 3-0 conference records, and whichever team wins will be headed for the district eight-man playoffs. Kickoff time at Camas Valley is 1:30 p.m. Also in eight-man loop action Friday the Butte Falls Loggers will take on the Days Creek Wolves at 3 p.m. on the Canyonville Field.

Drain, boasting one of the most powerful offensive attacks in the state in A-2 competition, will be favored to capture their seventh league win over the invaders from Central Linn. The Warriors have a strong group of runners headed by Mark Thomas, Jerry Smith and Frank Backus. In the forward wall the Warriors have good size and speed, making them tough for the opposition. While the Warriors will be battling the Cobras, other Emerald League encounters will find Elmira at McKenzie and

Myrtle Creek, fielding a young team, has found the going rough throughout the season. The Vikings have a 1-8 record for the year, with their lone victory being a league counter over Glendale. Though the Vikings lack the experience, they will be gunning for an upset before the home fans Friday. Glide and Sutherlin will enter Friday's battle with even UVL marks. Both have 2-2 records in league play. The Wildcats feature a group of hard-running backs, and when they are operating at full strength will play a hard-nosed defensive game. The Bulldogs have been improving with each outing, and presently boast a rugged offensive attack backed by a spunky defensive unit.

Riddle's Irish, with quarterback Mike Markham back in action to handle the passing, will be favored to upend the invading Pirates. Markham gives the Irish a potent TD punch with his pin-point passing. The favored crew also has a host of good running backs and are a rugged defensive outfit. Glendale has a strong offensive team with a hard-running backfield paced by Bill Hubler, Hubert Stewart, H. B. Clark and Chester Buck. Until last week the Pirates had been bothered by defensive mistakes, but in their upset victory over Glide they proved they could be stingy. With a top defensive effort the Pirates could come up with their second upset in a row.

Elkton, with its chances impaired by injuries, will attempt to break back into the winner's circle this week against the winless Lowell 11. The Elks have a 3-2 league record, and will be led by John Levenhagen and Ken Adams in Friday's encounter.

Drain Favored
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In the Southern Oregon Eight-Man circuit the deciding game at Camas Valley rates as a battle between the Hornets' speed and the Tigers' power. Camas Valley runs a wide-open attack using the fleet Terry Volkman, Mike Priest, Jim Kiser, Terry Buel and Don Lawson to head the charge. Canyonville, the defending league champs, nipped the Hornets, 20-19, in a non-counter earlier in the year, and will be out to repeat that performance. The Tigers rely more on power, but also have fair speed. Steve Gardner, Jim Ringen, Roger Kimble and Mike Heath will head the Tigers charge Friday.

While the Hornets and the Tigers are battling for the league crown, the Days Creek Wolves will be trying to get on the score board for the first time this season. The Wolves have been shut out in six straight outings. Friday the Wolves will be battling the Loggers of Butte Falls in a return engagement. In the earlier game Butte Falls posted a 19-0 decision. The Prospect Cougars are idle this week.

UVL Play Ends
Douglas clinched the UVL title last week by topping the Riddle Irish while the Glendale Pirates were upsetting Glide. The Trojans will enter Friday's game with a perfect 4-0 league mark and a 6-1 record for the season. The newly crowned league champs boast good size and mobility on defense, with quarterback Dan Withers and fullback Jim Heard setting the pace on offense. Heard and Withers are the top two point-makers in UVL competition.

FACES TOUGH TEST
INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (UPI) — A.J. Foyt, the national driving champion from Texas who captured the Indianapolis "500" in 1961, faces his most grueling run of the year today when he faces the board of directors of the U.S. Auto Club to answer charges of punching a fellow driver.

The incident, which occurred at the Williams Grove, Pa., speedway, was denied by Foyt, who has offered to take a lie detector test. If found guilty, Foyt could be fined \$1,000 and suspended for a year.

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
