

Fidel Castro Fired As Leader Of Latin-America Penetration

LONDON (UPI) — Cuban Premier Fidel Castro has refused to line up formally with the Soviet Union against Communist China, but apparently runs no risk of losing Soviet aid, diplomatic sources said Thursday.

Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev, however, was reported to have decided against leaving Castro in charge of Communist plans for penetrating Latin America, the sources said.

Booster Night Azalea Event

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According to diplomatic dispatches reaching here, Castro, who pledged full support last summer to the Soviet attacks on Peking, refused to make a formal declaration of support more recently when Moscow began lining up the world's Communist parties to be counted.

Taking Up Sides
A summit conference of the parties supporting the Moscow line is reported under preparation in Moscow. These talks during next month's celebrations of the Russian revolution anniversary could begin the process that leads to China's expulsion from the Moscow-led bloc.

Communist, theoretical organ of the Soviet Communist party, reported a few days ago that 65 parties have declared themselves in favor of Khrushchev's peaceful co-existence and opposed to China's militant foreign policy.

This count left more than a score of Communist parties unaccounted for. Some, like Albania, North Korea, and apparently North Viet Nam, support the Peking line.

Others prefer to stay neutral, and a third group has declined to commit itself for the present.

Remains Uncommitted
Cuba is in this last group, according to the reports in London.

There was no hint of Soviet retaliatory action in the form of an aid cutoff, the sources said. The Soviets value Cuba too highly as a staging area for the Communist penetration of Latin America to let it go.

Castro was believed confronted with a dilemma between his revolutionary aims — which are akin to Peking's — and his dependence on the \$1.6 million daily Soviet aid.

One other sign of his sympathies for Peking is his refusal to sign the nuclear test ban treaty concluded by the Soviets with the West.

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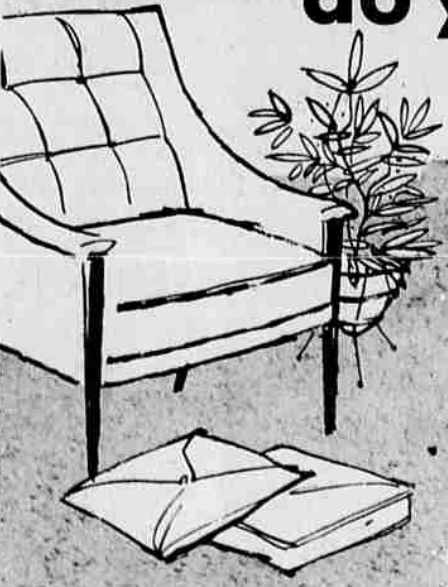
