

Texas Solon Draws Reprimand For Terming Colleague 'Pinko'

WASHINGTON (UPI) — There's no quicker way to make a congressman see red than to call him "pinko."

Rep. Ed F. Foreman, R-Tex., at 29 the youngest member of the House, discovered that Thursday night when he was reprimanded and ordered to take his seat by House Speaker John W. McCormack, D-Mass., for terming a colleague a "pinko."

Foreman, who describes himself as a "concerned Conservative American," had attempted to "clarify" his reported charge that about 20 of his colleagues are "pinkos." A similar charge led to an altercation of sorts earlier this week with a fellow member of the Texas delegation, Democrat Henry B. Gonzalez.

"For some of you who may have been called pinkos in the newspapers," Foreman began, "I will try to explain just who was and who wasn't covered in those charges."

A brace of his irate colleagues rose to the attack. Rep. Ross Bass, D-Tenn., assailed "sanctimonious groups" and "certain members" of the House who have been traveling around charging that other members have been voting against the Constitution. He said he hoped somebody labeled pinko would sue.

Rep. Wayne L. Hays, D-Ohio, said Foreman himself was using Communist tactics.

Foreman later attempted to continue his explanation. "The fact of the matter is," he said in a prepared speech, "I have only referred to one member of this body as a

pinko. On Friday, Oct. 18, during a speech in San Jose, Calif., I referred to the gentleman from California as Don "Pinko" Edwards." He referred to Rep. Don Edwards, D-Calif., who threatened to sue Foreman if he did not retract his charge.

In the speech he didn't get to give, Foreman said that after his San Jose address a reporter asked him why he called Edwards a Pinko. "Because of his down-the-line, ultra-liberal, left-wing voting record," he said he replied. Then the reporter asked if Foreman thought there were other members in the same category. Foreman said yes, and identified them as 20 members who voted against appropriations for the House Committee on Un-American Activities.

'Blank' Shell Injures Youth

Robert Havel, 13, knows now that a "blank" shell is still a dangerous shell.

He found an ammunition box partially filled with .30 caliber shell blanks in the hills back from Happy Valley Road the other day.

With a boy's curiosity, he took the box home and put one of the shells in a vice. He placed a nail against the detonator of the shell and swung a hammer. There was an explosion as the impact set off the detonating powder in the shell.

Robert was injured, but fortunately, not too seriously. A physician removed two fragments from his arm. The boy is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Havel of Happy Valley Road.

Inquiries by the Douglas County Sheriff's Department disclosed that the container was the property of the Roseburg National Guard unit. Guardsmen claimed the container at the sheriff's office Thursday.

Guard officials indicated the container might have fallen off a truck during a "field problem" conducted in the Happy Valley area last spring.

The incident was quite an experience for the Happy Valley youth. Mrs. Havel said she thinks her son has learned a lesson about playing around with "blank" shells.

Tri-City Church Sets Saturday Paint Job

Eugene Man Held For Taking Auto

Because he lingered too long over coffee, Eugene Shirley, also known as Eugene Caver, 37, of Eugene, was apprehended by local authorities and booked at the Douglas County jail on a charge of taking and using an automobile without authority.

City police said Norma T. Boughton, 1236 SE Jackson St., Roseburg, reported to officers that her car was missing from where it had been parked in the 700 block on SE Pine St., sometime between 10:45 p.m. Thursday and 2:05 a.m. today.

Officers searched the town for the car, then contacted a deputy sheriff who stated he had checked out a car on NE Stephens St. that fitted the description earlier in the evening. He said the driver asked him the way to Eugene, but as he appeared to the deputy to have been drinking, the officer suggested he'd better get some coffee before driving.

He stated the man parked the car and went into a cafe on NE Stephens outside the city limits. When this information was given to police, a check was made, and the car was found to be still parked there about 3:45 a.m.

While the city officer was conferring with Mrs. Boughton about going to Sutherland to have a complaint made out in the court of Justice of Peace Ward Watson, the man came out of the cafe, got into the car and started to drive off. The officer stopped him and booked him at the county jail.

The sheriff's department reports Shirley fits the description of Eugene Caver, who has had numerous arrests in this area under the latter name. He also had in his possession a card relative to a report to a California probation officer.

Industry Park Seen For City

Roseburg will someday have an industrial park, and it may be established "sooner than you think," according to Del McKay, member of the Payroll Development Committee.

He was a member of a panel of committee members who outlined the progress of the committee to date at the weekly Roseburg Rotary Club meeting Thursday.

Park Needed
McKay said the committee had been cognizant of the need for an industrial park, but the primary purpose is "to start slow in an effort to expand our industry already here." He noted that 33 other Oregon communities now have industrial parks. Then, with tongue in cheek, he said it looks like West Coast Airlines might provide the park site for Roseburg.

Sharing the rostrum with McKay were Dave Pratt and Aaron Boe.

Pratt explained that, in line with the first job of the committee, promoting industries already here which have growth potential, salutes are given monthly to industries in this category. Emphasizing the importance of small beginnings, he said that if 100 industries already in the county add a new worker each, the economy will be boosted considerably.

Prunes Important
Talking about the October "industry of the month," he said Sunray Prunes of Myrtle Creek is taking the best possible advantage of one of the county's major potential crops. "This is the greatest prune growing area in the whole country," he said. He noted that it is the hope to eventually reestablish a food processing plant here.

Boe explained the purpose of the "industry of the month" is to get people "locally and regionally" acquainted with the county's products.

The committee is sponsored by the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce.

Dorothy Moore Appeals Case

Dorothy Bell Moore, 37, Myrtle Creek, convicted Oct. 24 in Circuit Court of unlawfully attempting to obtain public assistance, has filed written notice of appeal to the Supreme Court.

Mrs. Moore, mother of seven children, currently is free in bail of \$2,500 from a sentence of one year in the Douglas County jail.

The state brought out evidence in the trial that Mrs. Moore was receiving public assistance while her husband was receiving industrial accident payments and two of her sons were working. She denied she was benefiting from these sources.

Attorney James McGinty has filed notice of withdrawal from the case as attorney for Mrs. Moore.

Grand Jury Indicts Suspects In Service Station Burglary

The Douglas County Grand Jury Thursday returned five indictments, including three for alleged participation in a service station coffee shop burglary.

Don Cameron Walker, 20, Gary Lee Maddox, 18, and David Edward Jobson, 18, all of Portland, were indicted for burglary not in a dwelling in connection with the burglary of Frank's Chevron Coffee Shop Oct. 14. They are alleged to have forcibly broken the outer

door of the building to gain entry.

Items Found

Arrest of the trio, along with a fourth person who has not been charged, was made by Myrtle Creek police with the assistance of sheriff's deputies. They were in the area working on slash burning, but remained there several days after the work was finished. Police reported finding in their car items fitting the description of articles stolen from the coffee shop.

David Romaine Wood, 20, Roseburg, was indicted for forgery in connection with a \$60 check passed at the Drive 'N' Save market Oct. 22. The check bore the signature of E. C. Beckius, made out payable to Wood, on the Douglas County State Bank.

Richard Hans, in custody in California, was indicted for obtaining money by false pretenses. He is accused of passing a \$10 worthless check at the Fullerton Rexall Drug Store in Roseburg on Sept. 3, in payment of an open account and the balance of \$6.60 in cash.

Attorney William Jayne was appointed to represent Janos Vanos, 25, of Dallas, Tex., charged with burglary not in a dwelling in connection with the

burglary of the Idle Hour Tavern early last week. Vanos was arrested with a companion in Crescent City and brought here to face the charge.

Donald Lee Ireland, 34, Springfield, is booked at the county jail on a non-support charge. Ronald James Winkler, 20, of Wolf Creek is booked on a Marion County warrant charging him passing a non-sufficient fund check. Paul Leonard Johnson, 31, Oregon City, is booked for forgery. Grady Wayne Snelling, 19, Winston, is also being held on a forgery charge, on arrest by Winston police. Another booking is that of Fred Simmons, also known as Leroy Simmons, 22, of 1334 SW Kendall St., Roseburg, on a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses. Bail on the latter two has been set at \$1,000 each.

CV Teacher Hurt In School Mishap

A Camas Valley Elementary School teacher is confined to her home today ruefully contemplating the aftermath of a Halloween celebration Thursday at the school.

According to school officials, Mrs. Dorothy Matheny, third and fourth grade teacher, was guiding her students out of the building and across to the cafeteria for refreshments following a Halloween party in the classroom when she tripped and fell down the steps. A broken wrist and cut nose and lip were the result. To compound the accident, Mrs. Matheny also smashed her glasses in the fall.

She was taken to a Winston doctor by her daughter, Marilyn Matheny, also a teacher at the school, for treatment. Suturing was required for the nose and lip cuts. Mrs. Matheny will be away from her duties for about a week, according to school officials. The accident occurred around 2:30 p.m.

BLM Calls For Bids For Falling Of Snags

The Bureau of Land Management today called for bids for the contract falling of approximately 47,385 dead trees (snags) in the Roseburg, Eugene, Medford and Coos Bay BLM districts.

The work is set aside for small business concerns only, and any contracts awarded for special projects in the schedule, which may be partially or completely supported by appropriations from Accelerated Public Works funds, will require at least 80 per cent performance by residents from the counties concerned.
