Bitter Fighting Renewed In Moroccan Border Tiff

FIGUIG, Morocco (UPI) — The Algerian spokesman said Bitter fighting exploded again today on the Algerian-Moroccan border and each side charged the other with breaking the midnight cease-fire agreed on in Mali Thursday.

The Moroccan accused the Algerians of launching a new offensive at 6 a.m. against this border oasis town, 37 miles northeast of the Algerian desert base at Colomb Bechar.

The Algerians charged the Moroccans unleashed attacks almost exactly the same hour against the village of Beni Ounif, about a mile from here but on the Algerian side of the border.

The charges and counter-charges were made after both Algeria and Morocco had announced that the cease-fire was being observed.

Orders Firing Halted — Algerian President Ahmed Ben Bella said late Friday night he had ordered his forces to respect the cease-fire.

The Moroccan army commander in the Figuig area said he had given similar orders to his forces.

Hours after the fighting should have stopped, however, both sides reported it had resumed.

Mortar shells were falling in downtown Figuig at 7 a.m., and Moroccan sources said an estimated 3,000 Algerian troops about a mile outside of town were attacking with tanks, mortars and recoilless rifles.

An Algerian spokesman at Colomb Bechar charged that the Moroccans were attacking in force at Beni Ounif.

UPI Reporter Recounts Rebel Assault On Palace

EDITOR'S Note—The following delayed dispatch from Saigon was written by a UPI correspondent who witnessed the marine attack on the presidential palace, climaxing the coup against the South Vietnamese government.

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (UPI)—The 11-year reign of South Vietnamese President Ngo Dinh Diem ended today when thousands of rebel marines stormed the presidential palace.

The attack climaxed an hours-long battle with Diem's personal palace guard. The end came shortly after sunrise when rebel troops blasted holes in the fortress-like palace with cannons and poured into the building.

Screaming with apparent joy, the marines began ransacking the palace and searching for Diem and his adviser—brother Ngo Dinh Nhu, who were reported hidden in a concrete basement bunker.

(Rebel-held Saigon Radio, in a broadcast heard in Singapore, reported that Diem and Nhu had surrendered and then committed suicide.)

Surgeon Thinks He's Found Virus Causing Cancer

PORTLAND (UPI)—A British surgeon told the Oregon Society of Pathologists Friday night he believes he and his colleagues have found the first cancer traceable to a virus.

Dr. Denis Burkitt reported on his work with children in African hospitals. He said African lymphoma, found mostly commonly in children about seven years of age, appears to have the characteristics of a virus-caused cancer.

The tumors cannot be treated by surgery, but the Mulago Hospital at Kampala, Uganda, has had great success in chemotherapy through the use of Cytosin.

The cancer affects children of all races in Africa, but is not found at higher altitudes where the temperature drops below 60 degrees or in areas of sparse rainfall.

VOGHERA, Italy (UPI)—Narcotics squad officers said Friday night they took into custody three men who had agreed to sell 6.6 pounds of cocaine to a plainclothes officer for \$24,000.

When the officer showed up for the sale, police said the men handed him three sacks of a white powder which a laboratory analysis showed was bicarbonate of soda. The three men then were charged with attempted fraud.

Huge Federal School Works Bill Is Ready

WASHINGTON (UPI)—After years of frustration, backers of federal aid to education today had a \$1.2 billion program for college classroom construction ready for congressional approval.

The legislation authorizes a three-year "bricks and mortar" program of grants and loans totaling \$1,195,000,000 for the nation's more than 2,100 colleges and universities, including about 800 church-connected schools.

The big federal aid measure was completed Friday after two days of closed-door sessions by House and Senate negotiators who resolved two prickly church-state issues to reach agreement on a compromise bill.

Rep. Edith Green, D-Ore., a leading House negotiator, said she expected the House to vote on the compromise bill sometime next week.

If approved by Congress, it would be the first general college aid program ever enacted. A similar bill got up to the wire last year but bogged down at the end, largely because of a dispute over providing federal funds for religious institutions.

The outlays in the bill are designed for construction of classrooms needed to meet the flood of new students who are expected to more than double within the next decade.

There are no funds for teachers' salaries. Two-thirds of the cost of classroom facilities must be put up by the states or schools in the case of the federal grants, and one-fourth the cost in the case of loans.

Nov. 24 Wayne McMurry from Coquille, Eugene district lay leader and also superintendent of the Coquille schools, will conduct the services.

Starting Dec. 1, Gal Carnine will conduct the services every other Sunday. The Rev. Mr. Ashenbner will supply a preacher for the other Sundays until conference time in May, according to Mrs. Thrush.

Doors Open To Negroes At Baylor

WACO, Tex. (UPI)—Baylor University, the world's largest Baptist school, voted Friday to desegregate. It was not announced when Negroes will be permitted to attend classes.

The vote of the Baylor University trustees was not unanimous.

A spokesman said the decision was reached "by amicable and Democratic procedure."

Baylor will integrate under the direction of its president, Abner V. McCall, "by practical means designed to minimum disruption of the educational program of the university," a spokesman said.

Hilton E. Howell, chairman of the trustees, said consideration of integration was begun "with prayer for divine guidance."

McCall said he expected "complete cooperation of the students and faculty in implementing integration."

The statement released by the university said Baylor has no official written policy in its charter or by-laws concerning race or color as a written criterion for admission of students.

Baylor was founded in 1845 and chartered by the Republic of Texas and is the state's oldest institution of higher learning which has remained in operation since its founding.

It was among the first co-educational colleges in the United States.

Of the nine other Baptist colleges in Texas, three have Negro students enrolled—Hardin-Simmons of Abilene; the University of Corpus Christi and Wayland Baptist College in Plainview.

The six other Baptist schools in Texas are Howard Payne of Brownwood, Decatur Baptist College, Mary-Hardin Baylor College in Belton, Houston Baptist College and East Texas Baptist College of Marshall.

Mishaps Take Lives Of Four

Accidents claimed four lives in Oregon Friday, a hunting fatality and a logging death.

Madgie Laney, 46, Klamath Falls, was struck and killed by a car on State Highway 39 about 10 miles south of Klamath Falls.

State police said she was crossing the highway when she was hit by a vehicle driven by Elmer Frisvold, 52, Tulelake, Calif.

Michael Latendresse, 17, Medford, died in a one-car accident in Medford. City police said the St. Mary's High School student was a passenger in a car driven by Stephen Erb, 17, Medford, which went out of control, hit several mail boxes and struck a utility pole. Erb was injured.

Sanford Nance, 51, Portland, was shot and killed while elk hunting about 40 miles northeast of John Day near the community of Granite. He was the state's 18th hunting season fatality.

State police were investigating but have been unable to determine who fired the fatal shot. Floyd Ferguson of John Day, an employee of the San Juan Lumber Co., died when a falling tree struck the cab of a truck he was operating about 20 miles north of John Day near the community of Tinker Creek.

In addition, Grayce A. Drump, 55, Grants Pass, died of a heart attack Thursday after hunting elk 35 miles east of John Day.

Judge Woodruff cited Cantrell's previous record for offenses against the law for the severity of the penalty.

Power Line Job Awarded

Bonneville Power Administration Friday awarded one contract for construction on the Alvey-Tahkenitch 230,000-volt transmission line in Lane and Douglas County and opened bids on another section.

The contract for a 36-mile section of the 73-mile line went to Mark W. Chisum Inc. of Portland. Contract includes construction of access roads, placement of culverts, gravel and gates as required, installation of footings, erection of double and single circuit towers, H frame, wood pole structure, stringing of conductor and installation of counterpoise.

The section will begin at Alvey and terminate near Richardson, both in Lane County. The contract was for \$397,447.

Meanwhile, it opened bids on the second schedule, a 36.1 mile stretch from Richardson to Tahkenitch substation on the Douglas County coast. It includes the same kind of work, with the addition of construction of a steel bridge across an access road on Fiddle Creek.

The low bidder on this section is Tye Construction Co. of Kirkland, Wash. Its bid was \$563,129.

The transmission line will be initially energized at 115,000 kilowatts in October 1964. It will increase Columbia River power to Oregon coastal points, including International Paper Co.'s new mill near Reedsport.

Car Fire Cuts Short 'Trick Or Treating'

The automobile, a late model foreign car, suddenly caught fire, and the engine and wiring were completely destroyed, according to Mrs. Walter Coats, correspondent.

Patent Volume Increases At Roseburg VA Hospital

For the third consecutive year, the Roseburg Veterans Administration Hospital has shown an increase in number of patients treated, according to Dr. Frank Merker, director of the hospital.

He reports that 1,421 patients were treated during the 1963 fiscal year at Roseburg. This was 483 more than in fiscal 1960. By years, the increase was 128 more in 1961, 78 more in 1962 and 277 more for 1963. The large increase in 1963 was due mainly to the opening of the general medical and surgical unit at the hospital.

Turnover Increases
The Roseburg VA Hospital's turnover rate for fiscal 1963 was nine per cent, up 1.9 per cent from the previous year. The turnover rate for all VA neuropsychiatric hospitals in the system is 8.1 per cent.

Merker said the pattern at Roseburg follows that of all VA hospitals. On the national level the number of patients has increased substantially, without a corresponding increase in beds.

He said VA hospitals treated 712,800 patients during 1963, a

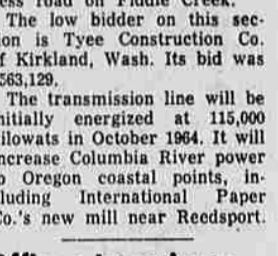
None Hurt In Crash Of Auto, School Bus
