

Polish Cardinal Issues Challenge To Government

VATICAN CITY (UPI)—Polish Catholic Primate Stefan Cardinal Wyszyński, in a strong challenge to his nation's Communist government, has told priests to become martyrs rather than serve political ends that conflict with their religion.

Wyszyński, here for the Ecu-menical Council, Monday night made a forceful speech in St. Peter's Basilica which virtually amounted to a call to Polish seminarians to defy a government action ordering them into military service.

News of the Polish government order leaked out Friday. Wyszyński was reported at the time to have sent a strong protest to the Polish regime, which in recent months has been increasing its harassment of the Catholic Church.

In one of his sharpest clashes with the government to date, the Warsaw archbishop Monday night denounced attempts to turn the clergy into "chaplains of the party or of a certain political orientation."

He warned that "the healthy religious instinct of believing people has always reacted against every policy of dependence of the priests on a secular power. The people fear every 'caesarism,' every totalitarian nationalization of consciences."

The 62-year-old cardinal, most outspoken voice of the "church of silence" behind the Iron Curtain, spoke at a ceremony marking the fourth centenary of the Council of Trent which established seminaries to train young men for the priesthood.

Pope Paul VI and 6,000 seminarians from all over Europe attended the ceremony.

Adventists Aid Building Job

Volunteers are working to complete the Seventh-day Adventists' new elementary school building on NW Calkins Road as each week those who can do so gather to supplement the work of the contractors. The concrete floors have been poured, and the windows and outside doors will soon be in place.

Because building costs have proved more than at first contemplated and the church must bear the entire cost, work has been slowed down until more funds were available. It is now estimated the project will cost about \$80,000. Adventists do not seek nor accept financial assistance from the public school funds. Their own funds are used in order to make a Christian education available to their children from the first grade through academy and college. For those who desire it, there are two Seventh-day Adventist universities — at Loma Linda, Calif., and at Berrien Springs in Michigan.

At present it is impossible to predict just when the building can be ready for occupancy, according to Dick Callis, who is supervising the building project. However, according to Callis, it will be completed as soon as funds are available so that work can be carried on.

woven coverlet made by Polly Hart Lane, the wife of Gen. Joseph Lane. It was donated by Mrs. Mildred Hogan Hannon, now a resident of California.

Mrs. Hannon is a granddaughter of Emily Lane Flood and the daughter of Sheriff Hogan, a former Douglas County peace officer. Her great-grandmother, Polly Lane, made the coverlet in the 1820's, according to Lane family tradition, and the material is still in a fine state of preservation.

The coverlet is made of wool and is closely patterned with a blue and white design. It is an excellent specimen of the work of pioneer housewives, who commonly processed the wool from their farm flocks of sheep, spun and dyed the yarn, and wove it into cloth on household looms.

Among the numerous other new relics on display at the Lane House is a spinning wheel used by the wife of a Douglas County pioneer in the manufacture of yarn for family use. The spinning wheel was a wedding gift to Mrs. Ebenezer Stephens who was married in Tennessee and brought the wheel with her across the plains when she and her husband migrated to Oregon and settled on the Calapooia. The old spinning wheel was donated to the Historical Society by Mrs. Stephens' granddaughter, Margaret Clark Sheldon, now a resident of the Forest Glen Manor.

Douglas County Historical Society spokesmen said they are very grateful for the donation of historic relics to add to its collection of artifacts related to the history of this area. While the Lane House now contains many items of the pioneer period, the society welcomes the donation of other material, and is desirous of obtaining early photographs, diaries, pioneer correspondence, and similar documents for the archive files. Material of this type proves very valuable to students and researchers interested in Douglas County history.

Several large groups of pupils have recently visited the Lane House on field trips, the fourth and fifth grades of the Eastwood school. These conducted tours are made on week days, and the Lane House can be opened for such visits by making advance arrangements with Mrs. V. J. Micelli, president of the Historical Society.

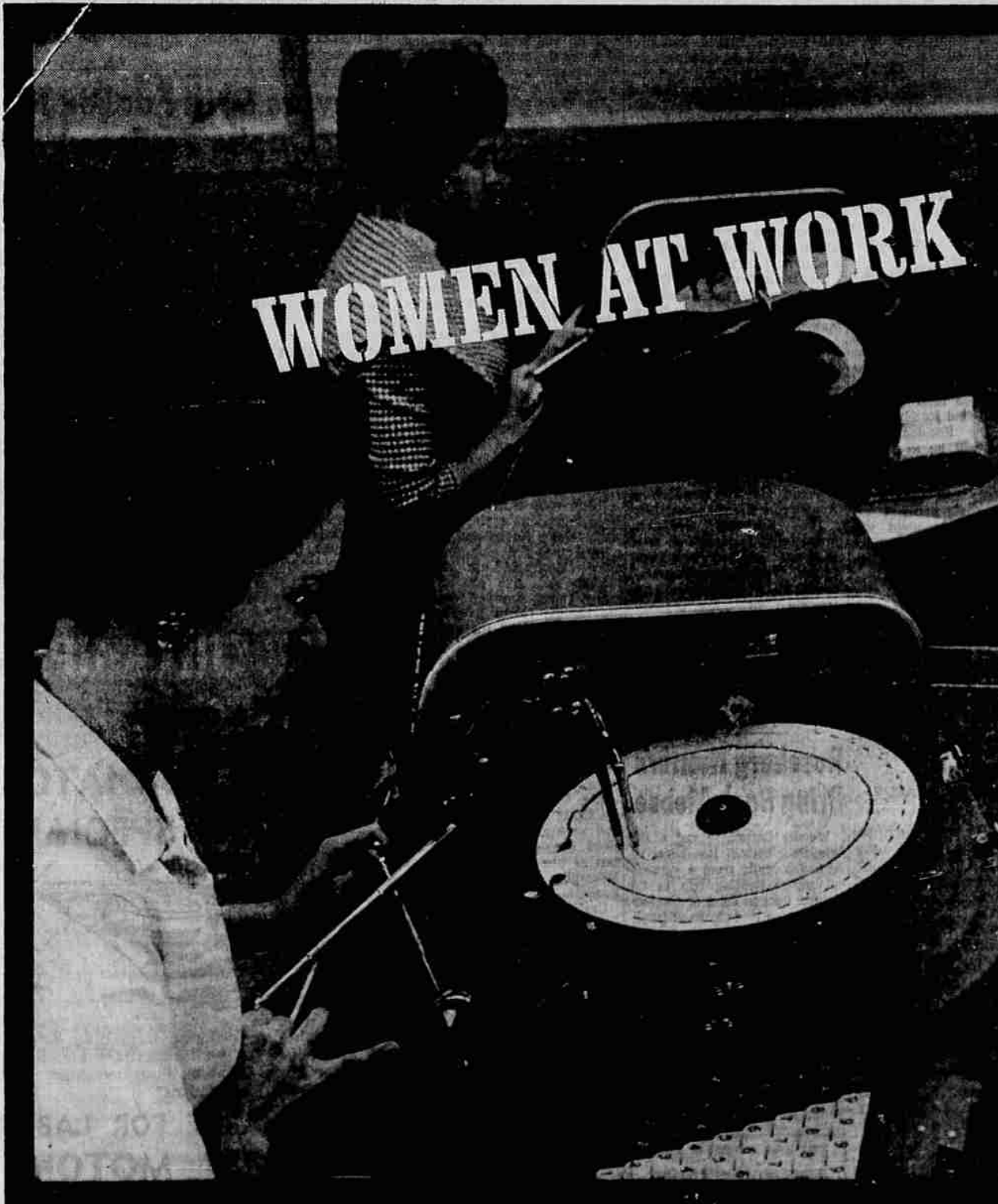
