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Rockefeller Announces Candidacy

Invites Barry To Primary Election Duel

NASHUA, N.H. (UPI) — New York Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller formally announced today his candidacy for the Republican nomination for President. He then flew to New Hampshire which holds the first-in-the-nation presidential primary in March.

Rockefeller made public at Albany, N.Y., his long expected decision to run for president. He assailed the Kennedy administration and challenged Sen. Barry Goldwater, another potential Republican presidential candidate, to oppose him in state primaries.

Rockefeller denounced President Kennedy for "failures at home and abroad."

The New York governor said he decided to run "because I believe that vital principles are at stake in the next presidential election."

The day of "smoke-filled rooms in American politics is over," he said in a 1,300-word prepared statement to newsmen and a nationwide television audience.

"It is my sincere hope that the other candidates will make use of the same opportunity (primaries) so that all of their views will be clearly known," he said. "The New Hampshire primary presents an excellent opportunity to do so, forthrightly and undiluted by fence-straddling or double talk of any kind."

S. Viet Nam Junta Waits Recognition Of United States

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (UPI) — The ruling military junta today awaited official diplomatic recognition by the United States, committing itself to an early return of democratic government and all-out war against the Communist Viet Cong guerrillas.

Junta Chairman Lt. Gen. Duong Van Minh Wednesday signed a decree establishing a "council of sages" to serve as advisers "on all questions regarding the system of private ownership and fundamental liberties" in South Viet Nam.

Minh, head of the revolutionary government which overthrew the late President Ngo Dinh Diem and his adviser brother, Ngo Dinh Nhu, also promised an end to press censorship and a return to complete religious freedom.

The brothers had been accused of discrimination against the country's Buddhists. They were Roman Catholics.

"Accidental Suicides"

Diem and Nhu have been listed as "accidental suicides," but reliable military sources assert they were assassinated by junta troops.

This capital city began to show signs of normalcy with the reduction to three hours nightly of the curfew established after the coup. Earlier this week, 17 persons were wounded by terrorists who tossed grenades into downtown crowds.

Truckers Seek \$600 Million Pay Increases

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Teamsters' President James R. Hoffa expressed confidence today that his union would win most of the \$600 million worth of wage-benefit increases it seeks from the trucking industry in a new nationwide contract.

Hoffa said the demands he outlined Wednesday were not unrealistic. He predicted the final settlement would be close to the union's 90-cent-an-hour package proposal.

The controversial Teamsters' chief declared he would not call a national truck strike to enforce the demands although he left open the possibility of "selective" area strikes if the contract talks become deadlocked.

Hoffa said that trucking firms would have to raise their freight rates to meet the union's demand for a three-year contract providing average 45-cent hourly pay increases for 450,000 drivers, helpers, warehousemen, mechanics and clerical workers.

The Teamsters' proposal started the ball rolling in the first nationwide trucking industry negotiations—a longtime Hoffa objective. The union now negotiates either area-wide or city-wide pacts for over-the-road and local truck drivers and related employees.

The pay increases sought by the Teamsters are far above the settlements in other industries in recent years which have averaged about 7 or 8 cents per hour.

The size of the package demand far exceeds President Kennedy's suggested guidelines for wage increases—roughly 3 to 4 per cent—but Hoffa has long ago denounced the Chief Executive's proposal as government wage-fixing.

Hoffa also announced that the Teamsters would seek tighter restrictions on "piggybacking" or movement of truck trailers on railroad flat cars.

Gaunt Faces Show Strain Of Ordeal

PEINE, Germany (UPI) — Rescue workers brought 11 men safely to the surface today from the underground shaft where they had been trapped for two weeks in a flooded iron mine.

A giant, American-made drill chewed its way through the final barrier of earth to reach the men, who had been entombed since a huge sedimentation basin on the surface collapsed Oct. 24 and poured 19 million gallons of water down the shafts.

There were 129 men in the mine at the time. Most escaped immediately. Three were plucked from another underground tomb last week.

The 11 rescued today were discovered Sunday after they had been given up for dead.

Of the remainder, 10 bodies were located in the chamber reached today. Another 19 are missing and presumed dead.

Those brought up today included 10 miners and a young electrician who was trapped during his first trip into a mine.

When the rescue drill cut through to the 9-by-12-foot chamber in which the men had huddled since the disaster, there were fears that the roof of the gallery might collapse.

But the roof held, and a torpedo-shaped steel capsule quickly was put into operation to bring the men to the surface, one by one and in swift succession.

All were ashen-faced and haggard, showing the terrible strain of their long imprisonment underground.

It took six to nine minutes to bring up each man, in an order of rescue determined beforehand by doctors who ordered the most critically ill or injured out first.

The first man to reach the surface was miner Heinz Kull, 51. The last man up was miner Bernard Wolter, 28, who reached the surface at 2:19 p. m.

Kull's face was so sunken it appeared almost shriveled as he was lifted out of the eight-foot-long rescue capsule. He wore a black bandage over his eyes to protect them from the bright sun.

Russians May Seek To Impose New Controls On Berlin Road

BERLIN (UPI) — The East German Communists indicated today the Russians again may attempt to impose new controls on Western Allied convoys traveling on the Berlin highway.

The official East German Communist party newspaper Neues Deutschland, in an attack on American "arrogance and stubbornness," said "the autobahn of the (East) German Democratic Republic is no paradise for provocateurs and troublemakers."

It made the statement in an attempt to justify the 41-hour blockade of a Berlin-bound U.S. Army convoy at a Soviet checkpoint because the American soldiers refused to leave their trucks to be counted.

A small U.S. convoy of 22 men in 10 vehicles was sent in to Berlin from West Germany without incident today.

Passed Quickly

The Russians quickly passed it through checkpoints at each end of the 110-mile highway to Berlin. No trouble had been expected because the Russians never have asked such small convoys to dismount to be counted, and they did not today.

It was considered likely the East German statement reflected the Russian viewpoint.

If so, new highway incidents may be unavoidable because American officials have said the Army will not submit to new controls and that convoys with less than 31 passengers will not dismount.

Informed Western sources said new Western Allied convoys will be sent along the same highway soon to test Soviet intentions.

Neues Deutschland said the Soviet army "nipped in the bud" the "American provocation" at Marienborn Monday.

That American convoy was stopped at 9:01 a. m. Monday, and released early Wednesday.

Neues Deutschland accused the U.S. Army of carrying out a "planned provocation." It took the same stand as Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev in Moscow by saying the Americans finally submitted to controls.

Khrushchev said Russia believes the question of Berlin access could spark a war with the West.

Western officials maintained flatly that the convoy did not give in to Russian demands.

They said it was possible Khrushchev felt a Russian demand had been satisfied because the Soviet control officer had been able to count the 20 troops traveling as passengers while they were seated in the trucks.

The Russians have always been free to do this, Berlin commandant Maj. Gen. James H. Polk said Wednesday. The men did not dismount, lower the tailgates of the trucks or stand up to be counted, Western officials said.

Jury Indicts Spy Suspects

WASHINGTON (UPI) — A federal grand jury has indicted two men, arrested last week as spies for Russia, on charges of conspiring to transmit information to the Soviets about the command and control system of the Strategic Air Command (SAC), the government announced today.

The Justice Department said John William Butenko, 38, an electrical engineer from Orange, N.J., and Igor A. Ivanov, 33, a chauffeur for a Russian firm in New York, were named in a three-count indictment. It was returned in U.S. District Court at Newark, N.J.

Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy said the indictment also named three members of the Soviet mission to the United Nations as co-conspirators but not defendants.

They are Yuri A. Romashin, third secretary of the mission; Gleb A. Pavlov, an attaché; and Vladimir I. Olenov, a staff member.

Burglars Hit Grade Schools, Local Store

Law enforcement authorities this morning were investigating reported burglaries at the Firestone Store in Roseburg and at two elementary schools in northern Douglas County.

Small amounts of cash and several items of office and educational equipment were taken at the Curtin and Scotts Valley elementary schools, officials at those schools reported.

All three burglaries occurred Wednesday night.

Roseburg City Police are investigating a break-in at the Firestone Store, 1807 NE Diamond Lake Blvd., where an undetermined number of tires was stolen. Investigating officers said entry was made by forcing open a rear door of the building with a pry bar. The tires were of various sizes.

Eugene Gustafson, principal for the Yoncalla and Scotts Valley elementary schools, said a projector, adding machine and \$37.81 in lunch money were missing this morning from the Scotts Valley building. A window in a rear door was broken to gain entry, the principal said.

Also missing were a small radio and an electric mixer. The money was taken from a teacher's desk. Officers from the Douglas County Sheriff's Department and Yoncalla City Police were investigating. Two years ago this same school was burglarized. Items missing after that break-in included a projector and tape recorder. Gustafson said on both occasions the school's typewriter has been ignored.

The typewriters weren't ignored at Curtin school. Yoncalla School District Supt. Vernon Todd said items missing at that school this morning include two typewriters, an adding machine, a microscope, drafting equipment and \$13.20 in cash taken from desks in the various school rooms.

Entry was made by forcing open a side entrance door. The sheriff's department is investigating.

Youth Wounded In Hunt Mishap

PENDLETON (UPI) — Ronald Bishop, 18, Athena was reported in fair condition at St. Anthony Hospital after he was wounded in a shooting accident Wednesday.

Deputy Sheriff Paul Jones said Bishop and three other youths stopped their car on Pine Creek Road just east of Athena to go bird hunting. Paul Broad, who was sitting in the back seat, picked up his 12-gauge shotgun and it discharged as he started to leave the car.

The charge went through the front seat upholstery and struck Bishop in the side. He underwent surgery shortly after being admitted to the hospital.

The other youths in the party were Gary Blom and Claude McDonald, also of Athena.

Mark's Austerity Program Would Cut 522 From Rolls

SALEM (UPI) — Approval of the governor's austerity program would result in 522 state workers being laid off and 749 now vacant positions being eliminated, the Joint Ways and Means Committee was advised today.

All 14 members of the Budget drafting committee were on hand, backed by more than a dozen other legislators, to get a running start on the special session which convenes Monday.

It did not appear lawmakers were headed for any quick solution to the state's fiscal problem.

There were suggestions for alternate revenue programs, rigid economy, reductions in dedicated fund agencies — but no agreement on which course might be followed.

The Ways and Means members today launched two days of hearings into the governor's recommended austerity program: state revenues, and proposed cuts in basic school support.

The Ways and Means members, many wearing their meal-cleaver tie clasps, came to Salem ahead of time at their own expense, at the request of Senate President Ben Musa and House Speaker Clarence Barton.

Sen. Ward Cook, D-Portland, said the committee was meeting early to "become oriented." Rep. Ross Morgan, D-Gresham, said the group "may lend a hand in determining where cuts should not be made."

Rep. Stafford Hansell, R-Hermiston, got to the core of the issue shortly after the meeting opened when he asked "how are we going to go. Shall we go along with the governor, or adopt our own plan?"

Other committee members were hesitant to make any policy decision until after the conclusion of the hearings.

Question Posed

A major question was posed by legislative fiscal officer Kenneth Bragg who asked "are we making temporary cuts, or are we making permanent reductions in the level of state service?"

Finance and Administration director Freeman Holmer said the budget cuts proposed by the governor are temporary. He said it would have to be decided before the 1965 legislature whether permanent long range reductions should be made.

"I expect the governor will ask the 1965 legislature for further reforms," Holmer commented.

Rep. John Mosser, R-Portland, said the voters didn't understand the difference between dedicated fund and general fund agencies, but wanted economies in all parts of state government.

Sen. Len Newberry, R-Ashland, fired back "I oppose messing with dedicated funds."

As the meeting began Sen. Edward Fadely, D-Eugene, handed out copies of his alternative to the governor's austerity program.

Russia Removes Secrecy Wrap From Touted Sky 'Fly Swatter'

MOSCOW (UPI) — The Soviet Union today unveiled the vaunted Soviet anti-missile missile which Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev once said could "hit a fly in the sky."

A squadron of three of the silver-painted rockets, fitted with huge fins at mid-fuselage and tail, was hauled through Red Square on open trucks for this year's military parade on the anniversary of the Russian revolution. The fins apparently provide maneuverability.

Minutes earlier Soviet Defense Minister Marshal Rodion Malinovsky had described the Soviet Union's might in a brief speech which warned that any aggressors would meet a "crushing retaliatory blow."

Frol Kozlov Absent

The parade was held in frosty weather in front of Khrushchev and other top government and Communist party leaders. They had solemnly mounted the Lenin mausoleum as the ancient clock in the Kremlin struck 10 a. m.

Conspicuously absent from the black and red marble monument was Frol Kozlov, a member of the Soviet Presidium who was taken ill six months ago. He has been reported to have suffered a stroke, and did not attend another demonstration in Red Square last May Day.

The unveiling of the new Soviet anti-missile missile was the highlight of this year's celebration and followed the first showing last year of a Polaris-type naval rocket. The Polaris-type was back again today, in larger numbers and bearing a naval crest.

Khrushchev told a visiting group of American newspaper editors last year that Russia had such a fast and accurate rocket that it could shoot down a "fly in the sky."

The silvery, multi-staged weapon appeared to be between 50 and 55 feet long, somewhat shorter than the Russian ballistic missiles that once were installed in Cuba. The latter also were displayed today.

The 10-minute roll-past of military hardware included lesser ground-to-ground and surface-to-air missiles and rockets, along with giant tanks and self-propelled cannons. Members of the Moscow military garrison and cadets marched in review. Then, banners and portraits of Lenin waving in the air, came the vanguard of hundreds of thousands of Russians who marched across the square to the blare of martial music and exhortations from loudspeakers.
