Regular Season Ends For A-2, B Grid Teams

Three league champions have been crowned, and a fourth will be decided Saturday with the Drain Warriors going into the final weekend with high hopes for the Emerald League title. The Warriors' hopes rest on the outcome of two games—their battle at Pleasant Hill against the Hillbillies and the clash at Elmira between the Falcons and the sitting Junction City Tigers.

An Elmira win over Junction City, coupled with a Drain victory over the Hillbillies would give the local team a tie for the league championship and the District 5-A-2 playoff berth. If Elmira and Drain post victories, the two will both have 8-1 league records, while Junction City would drop back to third from the league lead with a 7-1-1 record. This would give the Warriors a chance in the state playoffs as they boast the lone win over Elmira.

Drain will take on the Hillbillies at 1 p.m. Saturday, with the Junction City-Elmira game scheduled for 1:30. The Douglas Trojans, winners of the Unquapa Valley League crown and one of the District 5-A-2 state playoff berths this year, will warm-up for their quarterfinal battle Saturday when they host a rugged Bandon 11 Saturday at 8 p.m. Also on tap Saturday is a non-league game at Glide between the Wildcats and the Gold Beach Eagles at 2 p.m.

Three non-leaguers involving UVL teams will be played Friday night, with Riddle's Irish entertaining the Coquille Red Devils, Sutherlin's Bulldogs hosting the Myrtle Point Bobcats and the Myrtle Creek Vikings meeting the Pacific Pirates on Knox Field. All Friday games will start at 8 p.m.

A battle to decide the second place team in the Bico-Trico B circuit is on tap Friday at Oakland when the Powers Cruisers invade to test the power of the Oakers. Both teams boast 3-1-1 league marks. Kickoff time at Oakland is set for 1:30 p.m. The other league game Friday will find Monroe at Lowell for an 8 p.m. encounter.

Yoncalla's Eagles, fresh from clinching the Bico-Trico B League crown by virtue of a 6-6 tie with Oakland, will warm-up for their initial playoff battle by traveling to Toledo to meet the Siletz Warriors in a non-counter at 8 p.m. The Eagles' first playoff game will be Nov. 22 or 23 against the winners of the District 1-11-man B title.

In Southern Oregon Eight-Man League play two games are on tap, though neither will have any bearing on the conference championship which is already in the hands of the Camas Valley Hornets.

The champion Hornets will host the Butte Falls Loggers at 1:30 p.m., while the Days Creek Wolves, fresh from their first victory of the season, will entertain the Prospect Cougars at 3 p.m. on the Canyonville field.

Drain Favored
Drain's Warriors, boasting one of the most potent offensive attacks among the state's A-2 powers, will be strong favorites in their Saturday crucial at Pleasant Hill. The Warriors have an explosive backfield with Mark Thomas, Frank Backus, Jerry Smith and Gordon Jensen leading the charge. Roger Rutledge combines with Thomas and Jensen to give Drain a potent aerial attack. Defensively the Warriors are big and tough.

While Drain is favored, the deciding game between Elmira and Junction City is rated as a toss-up. Other league games will find Creswell at Central Linn Friday, while McKenzie will be at Harrisburg and Oakridge will battle St. Francis at Eugene's Civic Stadium Saturday.

UVL BATTLES
The UVL teams wrapped up loop action last week, and except for Glendale, the teams have a full slate of non-counters on tap this week. The Trojans of Douglas, winners of the league title, ended with a 5-0 conference record, and boast a 7-1 mark for the season.

Douglas' offensive attack will be led by the top two point-makers in the UVL, fullback Jim Heard and quarterback Dan Withers. The Trojans will be facing one of their sternest tests of the season as the invading Tigers have plenty of heft and skill. Bandon finished in second place tie in the Sunset Six league behind second ranked Brookings.

Riddle's Irish have a well-balanced offense with the threat of plenty of passing in the form of Mike Markham. Markham has top receivers in Gary Paetz and Art Fisher, while running threats are Tom Morrison Paetz and Larry Ruckel. The Irish tied with Glide for runner-up spot in the UVL, fourth place tie in the Sunset Six circuit.

Sutherlin's up-and-down Bulldogs and Myrtle Creek's Vi-

kings both face tough Sunset Six opponents in the form of Myrtle Point and Pacific. Myrtle Point boasts the only win over Douglas, while Pacific has been successful on two invasions into the UVL ranks, topping both Sutherlin and Glendale early in the season.

Glide's hard-running backs will face a rugged forward wall as they take on Gold Beach Saturday. The Wildcats, ending loop play with a 3-2 record, are led by Steve and Speede Anderson, Dan Forrest, Bob Paulson and Tim Rondeau. The Wildcats field a scrappy defensive unit.

B Games Slated
At Oakland the host team will throw a group of talented ground gainers at the invading Cruisers. Heading the Oaker charge will be Kerney Manley, Keith Crenshaw, Jon Lamoreaux, Alan Cherry and Randy Manley. The Powers 11 has emerged as one of the powers in Bico-Trico B action, sporting a determined defense and the running of Mick Griffith. In rolling to their current 3-1-1 records, both teams have lost to Elkton and tied Yoncalla in league play.

Yoncalla's Eagles will again rely on their rugged defensive unit as they take on Siletz in a non-counter Friday. The Eagles have held the opposition to a mere minimum in the scoring department, and as a result have emerged victorious in many low-scoring games. Heading Yoncalla's play will be Don and Dick Langdon, Don Wiley, Roger Carney, Jim Byron and Jim Wiley.

Camas Valley, returning to the throne of the Southern Oregon Eight-Man League after an absence of one year will spotlight speed in the game against Butte Falls. The highly touted Hornet attack features the running of Mike Priest, Terry Volkman, Don Larson and Terry Buel.

Days Creek broke loose last week after suffering six straight shutouts to topple Butte Falls, 21-0. The Wolves will be gunning for their second upset in a row when they meet Prospect. The Wolves will be paced by the power of fullback Robert Van Norman and the signal calling of Charles Porter.
